Three honoured for rising high

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Tower, Aga Khan Award winning Jeddah International Airport and many other landmarks. In the competition for best business ideas, team Brain Castamere from the

Institute of Business Administration of Dhaka University became the champion. The team's project was on "bioplastic", a material made from sugarcane for the packaging industry. Team Inspirebels became first runner-up with its project on growing

mushrooms on discarded paddy straw. The team members said they want to export the mushrooms. They said their project would reduce air pollution and alleviate food shortages as well as bring in foreign currency. The demand for mushrooms,

grown on paddy straw, is high in the western world and some countries in Asia and this is the best time to grab the European, Russian and the US markets, they said. The project would reduce unemployment and help farmers get better prices for the straw, team members claimed.

Team Unpredictable from Rajshahi University was the second runner-up.

Its project was on farming edible insects to lessen food shortages, protect the environment, and earn foreign currency. The team members said the demand for edible insects in the western world was on the rise. Primarily, they would make food items from crickets, mealworms and grasshoppers.

The farming of edible insects would also create an opportunity for employment, they claimed. Around 10 crore people eat edible insects and its global market was worth \$15.9 billion, they

The dreams of today's youths are different, said Dhaka North City Corporation Mayor Annisul Huq. "Don't undermine your ability," he

asked the youth. It is crucial to have confidence, he said, adding that dreams, not failures

AMAZING BANGLADESHIS

FAZLUR RAHMAN KHAN, architect and structural engineer He was born on April 3, 1929 in Dhaka.

Considered the "Father of tubular designs" for high-rises, Khan more than any other individual, ushered in a renaissance in skyscraper construction during the second half of the 20th century.

He has been called the "Einstein of structural engineering" and the "Greatest Structural Engineer of the 20th Century" for his innovative use of structural systems that remain fundamental to modern skyscraper construction.

Although best known for skyscrapers, Khan was also an active designer of other kinds of structures including the Jeddah Hajj Terminal, McMath-Pierce solar telescope in Arizona of the US and several stadium structures. FR Khan died on March 27, 1981 at the age

of 52 in Jeddah of Saudi Arabia. His important works include DeWitt-

Chestnut Apartments in Chicago of US (1963), Brunswick Building in Chicago (1965), John Hancock Center in Chicago (1965-1969), One Shell Square in New Orleans of Louisiana (1972), 140 William Street (formerly BHP House) in Melbourne of Australia (1972), Sears Tower in Chicago (1970-1973) and US Bank Center in Milwaukee (1973).

His list of awards includes Emirates Glass Leading European Architects' Forum (LEAF) Award (2012) and World Architectural Community Award, 11th Cycle (2012).

Double blow

After the incident, the school authorities asked her not to come to school. Then they refused to take fees for her final exams that started on November 29.

"What is my fault?" she asked while talking to this correspondent. "My friends and neighbours started treating me as a 'bad girl'. Some people made insulting comments whenever they saw me out in the village. My family is worried about me. I don't know what to do now."

The girl now keeps to herself and avoids meeting her friends and neighbours.

Asked, headmaster Ayub Ali stood by the school authorities' decision and said they would not accept her in the class as "she is a girl of bad character and there will be a negative impact on other students". The school authorities decided not

to take her back to the school, he added.

Contacted, National Human Rights

Commission Chairman Kazi Reazul Hoque said, "It is a gross violation of human rights. She has the right to education, attend her classes and sit for exams."

"I think the education ministry should investigate the incident and take necessary actions against those responsible."

Bhadeshwar UP Chairman Kamruzzaman Bashir told The Daily Star, "I requested the school authorities, including the headmaster, several times to allow the girl. But they didn't pay heed."

Quoting the victim, he said one Fatema Akter from a neighbouring village lured the girl with the promise of a job in Habiganj town in July.

On July 20, Fatema took her on a human haulier and the two alleged rapist -- Zakir Hossain, 35, and Shomsher Uddin, 32, -- joined in. The vehicle plied different roads the whole day.

The two men took the girl to an unknown location and took turns to rape her. They dropped her in her village in an unconscious state the next day, he said.

The victim's father later filed a case with Bahubal Police Station. Police arrested Zakir and Fatema. Shomsher is on the run.

"My family is extremely poor. I just wanted to help my family by earning some money while continuing my studies," said the girl.

Hasim Mia, president of the school management committee, said, "We've decided to issue a transfer certificate to the victim."

"Some people, who are out to tarnish my reputation, are insisting on allowing her to sit for the final exam. But it is not possible now as the exams have already started," he said.

A friend of the victim said she is a very good girl. "When I came to know about it [rape], I asked her but she was not in the state to say anything," she

"It is a matter of sorrow that our teachers did not allow her to sit for the

Bahubal Police Station's Officer-in-Charge Mohammad Moniruzzaman said he did not receive any complaints over the school authorities' decision.

Rasraj a victim

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hearing of Rasraj's appeal prayer. It fixed January 3 for re-hearing.

His mother Nomita Rani Das had to travel to Dhaka from Brahmanbaria on Friday to make an appeal: "Please release my son. He is innocent."

Four days before her appeal, Brahmanbaria district police disclosed the finding of an investigation that found Rasraj not involved in the crime.

The district police on November 28 said the controversial Facebook image that triggered a wave of communal attacks on Nasirnagar Hindus a month ago was not uploaded from Rasraj's mobile phone.

"The Forensic Department of Police Bureau of Investigation has confirmed it," Brahmanbaria Additional Superintendent of Police Iqbal Hossain said. Around a month ago, Fisheries and

Livestock Minister Sayedul Hoque, also a lawmaker of the area, had also told the press that Rasraj's did not do it. Attributing to an "intelligence report" the minister said: "Rasraj Das

religion on Facebook. According to an intelligence report, it was posted from Dhaka." The National Human Rights

Commission also said Rasraj did not upload the picture after its own investigation a month ago. But nothing helped Rasraj. He has

been languishing in jail after being arrested on October 29 under section 57 of ICT Act on charge of uploading the controversial image on Facebook. Local police moved to prosecute him.

On prayer of police, a Brahmanbaria court placed Rasraj on a five-day remand on November 2

allowing the law enforcement agencies to interrogate him. Police again sought permission from the court on November 7 to take him to remand for a second time, which was rejected. Rasraj was then denied bail and sent to

This incident shows once again the police's arbitrary exercise of power. Rasraj is the latest victim of the arbitrary use of policing powers of the state exercised by the law enforcement agencies.

Section 57 of ICT act gives the police sweeping authority to arrest anybody without warrant. The police enjoy judging powers if any person deliberately publishes or transmits false, obscene and derogatory information on a website or in any other electronic

The punishment is also harsh for committing any offence under section 57-a maximum of 14 year's of imprisonment and a maximum fine of Tk. one crore. Did police find any prima facie

evidence against Rasraj before arrestunder section 57 of the ICT Act? This draconian legal provision also

appears as a threat to freedom of speech and expression.

Human rights activists and media workers have long been demanding the scrapping of the provision saying it was against the people's fundamental rights guaranteed by the constitution.

A year ago, Indian police had been enjoying such sweeping authority to arrest a person for posting allegedly "offensive" content on websites under the cyber law. The Supreme Court of India last year struck down the provision in the cyber law saying it was

against the constitution. Interestingly, the original ICT Act of 2006 here did not give the police the sweeping authority to arrest anybody without warrant. Police had to seek permission from the authorities concerned to arrest any person under the law. But a change in the law in 2013 cut people's protection and empowered

Empowered by the amendment, Brahmanbaria police did not think twice before arresting Rasraj under section 57 of ICT Act and putting him behind bars.

Arrest of Rasraj plunged his family in a crisis no ordinary family could handle. His father on Friday narrated how they have been on the run for the last one month.

His father, mother and two brothers went into hiding following the attack on Hindus in Nasirnagar. They had been fleeing from one village to another for a month. Their fear was more real than others in their commu-

Should Rasraj and his family wait didn't upload that image demeaning ing him or filing the case against him for another month for his release from jail? Shouldn't the court re-fix the date for hearing of his bail prayer to ensure his release as soon as possible?

The other crucial question is: will anybody be held responsible for the untold suffering of Rasraj and his family members? If those who are responsible for it are not held accountable, such incidents may continue. Many people like Rasraj may have to

suffer from the arbitrary use of police powers under section 57 of the ICT Act as it happened in the past under the controversial section 54 of the Code of Criminal Procedure that had empowered police to arrest anybody on suspicion.
