## Slovenia to help Bangladesh in honey cultivation

Bangladesh can become a key player in honey cultivation and create more employment for people in rural areas, especially for women.

In this respect, Slovenia, a nation of beekeepers, wants to share skills and knowledge on beekeeping with the people of Bangladesh.

"On the other hand, you could substantially improve yields in agriculture because of better pollination," said Tanja Strniša, state secretary of the agriculture, forestry and food ministry of Slovenia, in an interview with The Daily Star during her visit to Dhaka last week.

This was the first visit to Bangladesh by any Slovenian leader after the independence of the nation in 1991. Bangladesh's State Minister for Foreign Affairs Md Shahriar Alam visited Slovenia in June.

### China-funded digital connectivity project gets green light

The government will bring two lakh small institutions under digital connectivity to boost trade and economic activity in remote areas.

The cabinet committee on economic affairs on Wednesday approved the proposal, with China's Exim Bank providing 94 percent of the Tk 8,500 crore project.

The digital connectivity project was included in a memorandum of understanding signed in October during Chinese President Xi Jinping's visit to Dhaka.

The connectivity will be provided to educational institutions, health centres, post offices and agriculture offices, according to the ICT ministry's proposal.

Bangladesh will set up 10,000 "points of presence" at business growth centres across the country to expand digital financial services and e-commerce.

Computer labs will be set up at 4,000 primary schools, 10,000 secondary and higher secondary educational institutions and 1,000 colleges.

Besides, various large-scale labs will be set up, including a regulatory lab at Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission, a multi-media lab for media workers and cyber security labs in universities.

Computer training labs will be set up at the offices of the deputy commissioner and upazila nirbahi officer so that staff can be trained to use the digital services.

#### China's mobile brand Infinix sets foot in Bangladesh

China's mobile handset brand Infinix is making a foray into Bangladesh, aiming to capture a share of the country's fast-growing smartphone market.

The company will roll out three models in Bangladesh this week, all of which will be priced at less than Tk 20,000, said Cooper Ma, country manager of Infinix Mobility Ltd.

"Actually, this market has big potential for us and that's why we are coming here with a big plan," he said, adding that the company studied the market for six months before deciding to step into it.

There are about 120 million active mobile connections in Bangladesh at present, according to the telecom regulator; and Infinix believes the market will grow faster than ever before.

All the models --Infinix Zero, Infinix Hot and Infinix Note -- will have state-ofthe-art technology with long battery support and best after-sales customer service, Ma said. For instance,

Infinix Note will have 4,500mAh battery, fast charging and aerospace cooling technology to avoid overheating.
