

Jibon gives life to Sky Blues

A last-gasp brace from substitute Nabib Newaj Jibon helped Abahani post a 3-2 win over Sheikh Jamal DC in a dramatic and tempestuous JB Bangladesh Premier League encounter at Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

With one minute of regulation time left, the striker was thrown into the fray with the mammoth task of turning the game which Abahani were trailing 1-2. However, the national discard struck his first goal of the season, before adding a second in a three-minute span during the four minutes of added time to rescue his side. The result sees Abahani consolidate their lead at the top of the 12-team table with 46 points from 20 outings, six ahead of second-placed Chittagong Abahani who have three games left.

The Sky Blues now need only four points from their two remaining games against lightweights Uttar Baridhara and struggling Rahmatganj MFS to take an unassailable lead and ensure their fifth professional football league title.

After the final whistle, Sheikh Jamal's foreign duo of Emeka

Darlington and Landing Darboe reacted sharply and hurled abuse towards a Sheikh Jamal official and threatened not to play in Bangladesh again.

"You saw the match and I don't want to make any comments," was the curt reply after the match from Emeka, who was furious on the pitch after Abahani equalised one minute into stoppage time.

"We played well for 90 minutes but we could not keep the momentum in injury time," said Sheikh Jamal manager Kazi Joshimuddin Josy.

When asked if Emeka's furious outburst has to point towards his club throwing away the match, Abahani manager Satyajit Das Rupu said that such talks were 'rubbish'. He added that his side had been deprived of two penalties by referee Azad Rahman.

Missing two key players for the game -- Lee Tuck through suspension and Sunday Chizoba through injury -- Abahani fielded a depleted side but had the last laugh as winger Jewel Rana played a key role in their thirteen

triumph out of 20 outings.

The Jhenaidhah local opened Abahani's account in the 44th minute with a close-range header, before Landing levelled the margin three minutes into the second half with a driven shot after a poor clearance from Abahani keeper Shahidul Alam Sohel fell to his feet.

Abahani then kept up the pressure to restore their lead but were denied by either defenders of goalkeeper Mazharul Islam Himel, before Sheikh Jamal took the lead from a flowing counter-attack in the 81st minute.

Having survived a close-range shot from Jewel, Sheikh Jamal midfielder Malick Mendy gave a long ball to Emeka inside the Abahani box and the Nigerian cleverly chipped the advancing goalkeeper to give his team the lead.

Abahani bolstered their attacking line-up by sending on Wahed Ahmed and Jibon and the move proved pivotal as the tiring Sheikh Jamal backline failed to keep up.

Jewel, with his darting moves from the left flank, was the provider for both of Jibon's goals. He provided two crosses for Jibon, who took to the pitch after a five-match gap. Jibon first chested the ball from close range, before tapping in two minutes later to hand Abahani a dramatic victory.

Nacional slam video referee

South American champions Atletico Nacional questioned football's new video referee after the first ever penalty awarded under the system helped dump them out of the Club World Cup.

The Colombians felt aggrieved after Hungarian referee Viktor Kassai used the new technology for the first goal in their shock 3-0 defeat by Japan's Kashima Antlers on Wednesday.

In a ground-breaking moment, Kassai stopped play, ran to the side of the pitch and watched a replay, before blowing for the penalty which was converted by Shoma Doi.

Nacional were fuming as the foul in question, Orlando Berrio's trip on Daigo Nishi as he ran towards an airborne free kick, had gone virtually unnoticed by the players.

"That decision was crucial because we were in control and it unbalanced us emotionally," complained Nacional defender Farid Diaz.

Conte wants more

Antonio Conte told his Chelsea players to go and make it 11 league wins on the bounce with victory at Crystal Palace on Saturday as they threaten to run away with the title.

Rampant Chelsea are six points clear at the top of the Premier League following a 1-0 victory at Sunderland and face a Palace side on Saturday that is in deep trouble at the other end of the table.

Conte turned his mind to Palace within minutes of the final whistle on Wednesday.

"I am pleased for my players because they deserve this for their commitment and work-rate every day, in every training session, during the game," he said.

"Now for sure we have to continue. In three days on Saturday we will have another tough game against Crystal Palace."

"I hope we recover very well after this battle to try to arrive at Christmas in an incredible position in the table."

Chelsea may have a significant advantage over the other title contenders but they were not wholly convincing at the Stadium of Light and needed a 40th-minute goal from Cesc Fabregas to dispose of struggling Sunderland.

The Londoners are closing in on Arsenal's record of 14 successive victories, achieved over two seasons, as they prepare

for the trip to Palace and home games against Bournemouth and Stoke over Christmas.

They are matches that Chelsea will be expected to win, but the same was said about their visit to the Stadium of Light, where Sunderland have scored only 10 goals and now won just two of their eight home matches.

"I prefer not to look at the top of the table," Conte said, attempting to play down Chelsea title talk.

"We are doing something important up to now, but the league doesn't finish today. There are still three games before the halfway stage of the season."

Conte admitted Chelsea were not at their best but he was encouraged by the way they kept fighting to secure a tenth successive league victory.

Fabregas, still adapting to Chelsea's 3-4-3 system, added: "The performance was really good and I felt we were very, very strong."

"Now we want to keep winning. Hopefully we can continue like this and send out a strong message."

"People forget that it's only my second time in my career that I've played this system. My teammates have played it much more, but I'm getting used to it and feel very comfortable."

David Moyes, the Sunderland manager, is facing a fight to avoid relegation, but he believes the strong showing against Chelsea provides hope for the future.

Manchester City have been dealt a blow after German midfielder Ilkay Gundogan sustained a knee injury that manager Pep Guardiola fears will sideline him for "several months".

The Germany international had to be substituted in the 44th minute of City's 2-0 Premier League win over Watford at the Etihad Stadium on Wednesday after an accidental collision with Nordin Amrabat.

Guardiola revealed afterwards he had sustained suspected knee ligament damage.

"We are going to miss him for a long time," said Guardiola. "This is the worst news."

"I'm so sad. The doctors think he has ligament damage, but he doesn't know exactly (how serious it is)."

"We will go tomorrow (Thursday), but it doesn't look good. I think it will be several months. He is so sad about it."

Real cruise into final

Karim Benzema and Cristiano Ronaldo were on target as Real Madrid eased past Mexico's Club America 2-0 on Thursday to reach the Club World Cup final in Japan.

The Spanish giants will face shock finalists and local favourites Kashima Antlers in Yokohama on Sunday as they look to capture their second world title in three years.

"Our sole aim was to reach the final -- so it's job done," Real coach Zinedine Zidane told reporters after

watching his side extend their club record unbeaten run to 36 matches in all competitions.

"We didn't have a great rhythm in the first half but in the second half we created a lot of chances and Cristiano finally scored so I'm very satisfied," added the Frenchman.

"It was a long flight to Japan, but for Real Madrid the Club World Cup is an important tournament and we are here to lift the trophy."

Zidane's countryman Benzema said: "It was a hard game against a tough team. The conditions were difficult too with the long journey we've had but we played well and won the game -- now for the final."
