Members of Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) arrested a youth and seized 150 contraband Yaba tablets in Badalgachhi upazila of Naogaon on Tuesday.

Trawler service
for critical
patients

Local administration has introduced a 24-hour water transport service for critical patients who have to face many hurdles to cross the Sugandha river to reach Babuganj Upazila Health Complex in Barisal.

Babuganj upazila introduced the service from the first week of this month.

As the 50-bed hospital is situated in Dehergathi union far away from upazila headquarters, many patients from remote areas suffered a lot to cross the river to reach the health complex as there was no water transport available there, especially at night.

"Considering the issue, we decided to launch a 24-hour trawler service for patients on emergency basis," said Upazila Nirbahi Officer Dipak Kumar Roy.

Mustard boon for beekeepers

Around 180 tonnes of honey were produced in Jamalpur between mid-November and mid-December

Around 180 tonnes of honey were produced by the bees from the mustard crop in the district between mid-November and mid-December, making growers hopeful of getting a good earning.

This amount is six times more than that of last year, said sources at the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) in the district.

Fifteen farmers of the district, along with 45 farmers from Tangail and 15 from Sathkhira, had been engaged in honey extraction in the district since mid-November, said president of Jamalpur unit of Bangladesh Honey-growers' Welfare

Association Aminul Islam Siddiki.

Due to favourable weather, the number of farmers increased this year to 75, while there were only five farmers in the district and 40 in other districts last year, he said.

Farmers set up 9,000 bee-colonies near mustard fields in different villages of the district where there was good flowering, and got around 20 kg of honey from each colony in four weeks, the growers said.

The farmers said they were able to sell one-third of the honey to local people and wholesalers at around Tk 150 per kilogram, and are waiting for business companies to buy the rest.

"We will be able to make good

profit if the companies buy our honey for Tk 150 to Tk 200 per kg," the growers said.

"I got 25 maunds of honey from my 50 bee-colonies in Sabilapur village under Melandah upazila. I sold eight maunds to locals. Now I am waiting to sell the rest to a company at a good price," said Harunur-Rashid, a farmer in Madarganj upazila.

A number of growers said the same, adding that they have to spend about 50 percent of the earning to meet the cost during extraction and of feeding the bees during the off-season.

Deputy Director of DAE Dr Rafiqul Islam said mustard was cultivated on around 20,000 hectares of land in the district, and there

was good growth of the crop due to favourable weather.

As a result, honey farmers were encouraged to set their bee-colonies beside mustard fields across the district and were able to collect a large amount of honey, he added.

"We are motivating honey growers and crop farmers to increase cultivation of mustard as honey bees help to increase the output by more than 20 percent to 25 percent through pollination," he added.

Meanwhile, the growers from Tangail have started leaving Jamalpur for Tangail to set up bee-colonies near mustard fields as the flowering stage of the crop has begun.

ELECTION CODE VIOLATION

AL candidate blames
rebels in Jamalpur

Awami League (AL) supported chairman candidate in Jamalpur district council polls Advocate HR Zahid Anwar has alleged massive violation of the electoral code of conduct by the party's rebel candidate Faruque Ahmed Chowdhury, also general secretary of the district AL.

"Three other chairman candidates -- Faruque's wife Anjuman Ara Begum, district unit AL's Vice-president Sohrab Hossain Babul and Joint General Secretary Sarwar Jahan are merely dummy contestants, engaged in wooing voters for Faruque," he told a press conference at the party office in the town yesterday.

"Their aim is to provide electoral agents in polling centres to influence the polls in favour of Faruque.

"Their men are obstructing the election campaign by threatening my supporters, and attempting to purchase votes with money. They are pressurising the voters to cast votes openly in front of the agents of the four chairman candidates," Zahid said.

Expressing fear of rigging in the district council polls, Zahid alleged that a state minister and lawmaker, who is a close friend of Faruq, is working to ensure the latter's winning in the polls.

Teesta chars turn green

Many landless farmers producing crops

Char areas of the Teesta river are covered in green now as vast tracts of the dried-up riverbeds have been turned into crop fields by the landless char people who have been cultivating various crops there in recent years.

Char farmers are happy as the chars, deposits of alluvial silt, have given them the opportunity to cultivate various crops and vegetables.

According to sources in the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) and NGOs working in the char areas, over 25,000 hectares of dried-up riverbeds could be used to cultivate vegetables, wheat, maize, mustard, boro and other crops this season.

"Crop cultivation on these lands has been taking place as the drying up of the rivers has led to the emergence of massive silt deposits," said Lalmonirhat Sadar Upazila Agriculture Officer Enamul Haque.

Nurul Islam, 55, of Gokunda village in Lalmonirhat Sadar said, "I do not own land, but I have cultivated vegetables on one bigha of dried-up Teesta river bed in the

area. I got bumper production of vegetables from abandoned char land last year," he said, adding that many landless char people like him have got an opportunity to cultivate different crops on dried-up river beds this year.

"My ten bighas of char lands were abandoned for years in the past, but those have been giving me different crops for the last three years," said farmer Meher Ali, 60, of Kalmati char village.

Azzizul Islam, 62, a landless farmer of Char Teesta village, said they have been growing onion, garlic, maize, boro paddy, wheat and different vegetables in the abandoned char areas, and they are getting expected production. "Agriculture officials and NGO staff give us support for farming crops on char land," he added.

Deputy Director of DAE in Lalmonirhat Bidubhuson Roy said the dried-up riverbeds in certain areas have an eye-catching greenish look, and the char lands now contain more alluvial sediments as a result of the last monsoon, which has encouraged farmers to cultivate different crops.

Khirai an early winter windfall for farmers

Farmers in Chandpur say khirais produce a high yield and bring good profit

Delicious in salads, a good source of hydration and helpful in reducing body fat, crispy khirai, a small variety of cucumbers, are everybody's friend. But farmers in Chandpur's Matlab Uttar upazila are particularly enthusiastic about khirais these days, as the early winter crop of both local ushi and hybrid varieties delivers healthy profits.

"Khirais produce a high yield and good profit," says farmer Kabir Hossain of Baidyanathpur village. "It cost me around Tk 10,000 to grow khirais on 24 decimals of land, with an additional Tk 5,000 for labour."

"From the first week's harvest alone I have earned Tk 21,000," he continues. "I expect to realise another Tk 45,000 from the crop before the season is done."

Chandpur farmers have been busy with their khirais since mid-October when fields are ploughed and treated with pesticide,

ready for the khirai crop. Within a fortnight of seeds being sown the seedlings are visible; within a month both male and female flowers are in bloom: on track to produce succulent khirais ready for an early winter harvest.

According to Matlab Uttar upazila's Department of Agriculture Extension office khirai cultivation this season has exceeded targets, with khirais being grown in all unions and in particular in river char areas.

"Khirai cultivation can bring farmers a rapid return with a good profit from a small investment," says Mohammad Abdul Kaiyum Mozumdar, Matlab Uttar upazila's agriculture officer. "That's why growing khirais is attractive to them."

Farmer Abdul Hannan is exceptionally pleased with his crop. "I will grow khirais again after harvesting aman rice this season," he says.

The current market price for khirais in Chandpur is between Tk 30 and Tk 35 per kilogram.

ATTACK ON HINDUS

Police on Tuesday arrested a local Awami League leader's son and two others on charge of vandalising houses and business shops of Hindus in Manda upazila of Naogaon on Saturday.
