

HOPING FOR A GREENER PLANET

Tree plantation campaign by NSUEC

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Earth Club of North South University (NSUEC) successfully organised their tree plantation campaign for the first time, Yamaha Presents "Plants for Future" (PFF) on December 11-12, 2016. Earth Club planted around 85 saplings on NSU campus. The main purpose of this event was to bring a sustainable solution to air pollution and make Dhaka greener than before.

The first day of the event was a field preparation day. On the second day, the Treasurer of NSU, Professor Dr. Gour Gobinda Goswami and Director of Student Affairs, Professor Dr. Emdadul Haq inaugurated the tree plantation campaign. Faculty Advisor of Earth Club, Mohammad Moshir Rahman and ACI Motors' Brand Executive, Zahidul Islam was also present.

To make Dhaka greener, 500 saplings will be planted in different places of the city by the Earth Club. The club has already planted 85 saplings on December 12 and more saplings of fruit, timber, flower, medicinal species etc. will be



planted within the next month. The club will take care of those saplings for the next 6 months.

Sheguptaroh Soha, a student of environmental science, said, "PFF was an excellent initiative taken by the Earth Club. Trees are very important for our

environment and by planting trees we are actually helping our next generation. People should think more often about the environment and this event is such an example."

The tree plantation campaign was appreciated by the citizens as well as

leading environmentalists. Shehta Zarab, Joint Secretary of Earth Club, explained when asked about the event purpose and its future plan: "We took the initiative of planting 500 trees in different places of Dhaka, which is a giant step for any university club. It's not something that just affects hundreds, thousands or even millions; we believe it affects the 7 billion people on earth in the long run. We are glad we could do it and as for the future, we are hoping to increase the number of trees and target more places. We hope everyone becomes more concerned about the environment."

Alongside this event, NSUEC also organises other events such as "A Tree for Free", "Champions of Earth International" (a green idea generation competition), "Environmental School Campaign and Encounters" to create a massive response in order to fight pollution and to spread awareness about environmental issues.

Now that we have the more space-consuming ideas out of the way - let's focus on some easier ones. Stack the common room with board games such as Scrabble or Pictionary. Your school authority should like this idea because of the educational benefits. Card games, espe-

cially UNO will prove very useful, since a large number of students can play at once. This somewhat solves the problem of too many students getting bored in free periods or P.E. class. Don't forget chess, and snakes and ladders. Here's another idea for effective space usage – hang a dart board on one side of the wall. Learn to improve your aim and challenge your friends.

You probably can't play actual football or basketball games, but don't cross out the idea of tournaments off your list just yet. If your school's willing, you can consider holding intra-school tournaments at a separate

venue, such as Gulshan Youth Club, but if this isn't possible – turn back to table tennis. All you'll need is that game room for an effective table tennis tournament for the whole school!

Be creative and don't let space be a restriction, and you'll find waking up for school isn't all that annoying anymore.
