Jica-funded projects on track again

Japanese consultants, contractors rejoining work in Bangladesh after a lull following terror attacks

With "satisfactory" improvement in law and order, Japanese consultants and contractors are rejoining projects in Bangladesh which they had left following a string of terror attacks, especially after the one on Gulshan cafe on July 1.

Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) assists in 35 projects and all of those had either stalled or slowed down due to the absence of consultants and contractors, project officials said.

They said work on some projects was in full swing with the return of the Japanese while progress was slow in some in their absence.

The government's security arrangements at the project sites and for the protection of the foreign consultants and contractors was the reason behind their return. In the last two months, the government lobbied hard to convince Japan that the measures were adequate to ensure security of its nationals here.

"We [officials of the projects, ministries concerned and law enforcement agencies] held a series of meetings with Japanese officials so that their confidence could be gained

EC FORMATION
Workers Party
proposes
constitutional
council

The Workers Party of Bangladesh urged President Abdul Hamid to form a constitutional council that will propose names for the posts of chief election commissioner and election commissioners.

The council would be comprised of the prime minister, opposition leader, Speaker, chief justice, and attorney general. The president will appoint the chief election commissioner and his deputies from the names suggested by the council.

A law is to be enacted in this regard.

An ally of the ruling Awami League-led alliance, Workers Party made the proposal as its 10-member delegation led by party President Rashed Khan Menon met the president at Bangabhaban yesterday to discuss the formation of the next Election Commission.

MAIDEN ZILA PARISHAD POLLS TODAY

Not much enthusiasm, plenty of controversies

The zila parishads are going to the first-ever polls today but the results have already been determined.

The grassroots leaders of the ruling Awami League are about to win most of the chairman and member posts in the long overdue election. Over a third of the 61 district council chairmen has already been elected unopposed.

The grassroots leaders of BNP did not enter the electoral race as they do not have the electorate needed to win the polls.

Some leaders of the Jatiya Party, the main opposition in parliament, and other small parties are contesting for chairman and member posts. But it is unlikely for them to score significantly as most of the voters belong to the AL camp.

Not the general people but the elected representatives of other local government bodies – upazila parishads, union parishads, municipalities and city corporations -- are the electorate of the zila parishad polls.

The electorate is entitled to exercise their franchise to elect a chairman and 20 members, including five for the reserved seats for women, to form a zila parishad in a district.

The election will, however, be competitive for the ruling party dissidents who defied the high-command decision and challenged the party-backed aspirants in around 30 chairman and one-fourth of the member posts.

The AL high command has made hectic efforts to keep the dissidents away from the electoral race but failed.

The competition already turned unhealthy in the run-up to the polling. Intense rivalries among the ruling party men have given rise to fear of violence on the election day.

FEMALE 'NEO JMB' MEMBERS

'Dragged into militancy by husbands'

Female members of "Neo JMB" got involved in militant activities under pressure from their militant husbands, Chief of Counter Terrorism Unit Monirul Islam said yesterday.

Police have no information about women joining the outfit willingly, he told reporters at the media centre of Dhaka Metropolitan Police.

"Females of local militant groups mainly provide service to their families, take care of their children and motivate them to join the outfit," he said.

Referring to statements of several suspected female "Neo JMB" members arrested recently, Monirul said some of them accompanied their husbands as they were worried about how the society would treat them if their husbands' involvement in militant activities came to light.

Abedatul Fatema, widow of Tanvir Kaderi, who was arrested during the Azimpur drive on September 10, in her confessional statement said she joined the

Defiant Israel pushes for more settlements

'Reduces' ties with UNSC states that supported landmark UN resolution

Israel could advance plans this week for thousands more settlement homes in annexed east Jerusalem in defiance of a landmark UN resolution demanding an end to such activity.

It would mark the first such approvals since Friday's UN Security Council vote demanding a halt to Israeli settlement building in Palestinian territory.

The resolution, which passed after the United States took the rare move of abstaining, infuriated Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu who lashed out at President Barack Obama and vowed not to abide by it.

Israel has accused US of orchestrating a "gang-up" against Israel on the UN settlement vote.

A Jerusalem planning committee is set to discuss issuing building permits for 618 housing units today in the mainly Palestinian eastern sector of the city, according to the Ir Amim NGO, which monitors settlement building.

Jerusalem deputy mayor Meir Turjeman, who also heads the committee, has reportedly also spoken of seeking to advance plans for some 5,600 other units.

Yesterday, he told AFP there were no plans to call off
