PM defends holding of primary, JSC exams

AL-backed panel sweeps Juta polls

Change JU teacher recruitment process

Demands a section of teachers for excluding less meritorious candidates

A section of teachers of Jahangirnagar University on Wednesday demanded a change in the existing procedure for its teachers' appointment.

The demand was made during a press conference at the office of JU Journalists' Association (Juja).

They also demanded a review of the latest appointment of a lecturer of physics, which was approved by the syndicate on December 10. The teachers alleged that the appointment was made bypassing at least 10 "more qualified candidates".

In a written statement, Prof Shafiqul Islam of physics presented the qualifications of 11 candidates and alleged that the appointed lecturer was in the last position with a CGPA 3.62 out of 4.00, and he had no publication except for seven months' teaching experience in Haji Mohammad Danesh Science & Technology University.

"We had formally urged the department chairman and all of the syndicate members to re-evaluate the decision of the selection committee. But the less qualified candidate has been appointed. So we have been forced to inform the journalists."

Citing the recent report of Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB), Prof Naseem Akhter Hossain said, "The TIB report is the reflection of these anomalies."

Vice Chancellor Prof Farzana Islam said, "The selection board has selected the capable candidate for the post as the department chairman demanded appointment of a teacher who teaches electronics." "We have already brought some changes to the process through the syndicate. And more changes are in the pipeline," she added.

Memorial sculpture for slain blogger Avijit at TSC

A memorial named "statue of free thinking" is going to be built in Teacher-Student Centre area on the Dhaka University (DU) campus to uphold the memory of slain blogger and writer Avijit Roy.

DU Vice Chancellor AAMS Arefin Siddique yesterday inaugurated the construction of the statue at "Avijit Chhattar" near the main entrance of Suhrawardy Udyana where Avijit was hacked to death and his wife Rafida Ahmed Boni was critically injured on February 26 night.

The VC said, "The sculpture will symbolise right to expression and represents the people with secular views."

Sculptor Rasha will build the statue which will be unveiled on February 28, 2017. Prof Ajoy Roy, father of Avijit, was present.
