### Ctg jobs tripled as trade grew fast: BBS

Reynolds dies a day after daughter

Debbie Reynolds, the "Singin' in the Rain" actress who tap-danced her way into American hearts as a star of Hollywood's Golden Age, died Wednesday, grief-stricken over daughter Carrie Fisher's death a day earlier.

The 84-year-old suffered a stroke at son Todd Fisher's Beverly Hills home after telling him "I miss her so much, I want to be with Carrie," he was quoted as telling celebrity news

The number of employment in Chittagong almost tripled in 10 years after 2003 due to a rapid expansion in the district's wholesale and retail trade, says a government report.

A survey, conducted by the Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS) between March 31 and May 31 in 2013, found 19.68 lakh employed people in 3.8 lakh economic units in the district, says the Economic Census Report-2013 on Chittagong which was revealed yesterday.

In 2003, the number of employed people in the district was 7.04 lakh, 12.82 percent up from the number in 1986, when the first such census was conducted, the report says.

The District Statistics Office revealed the report in a meeting at the conference room of the deputy commissioner's office with Joint Director Emdadul Hoque of the Divisional Statistics Office in the chair.

Out of the 19.68 lakh employed people in Chittagong, some 5.84 lakh were females. The percentage of female workers increased significantly to 29.67 percent in 2013 from 8.7 percent in 2003, the report stated.

Of the employed people, 92.87 percent were engaged in permanent establishments, 3.59 percent in temporary establishments and 3.55 percent in economic households.

The BBS survey also found that the number of economic units in Chittagong was 3.80 lakh. The number was 1.95 lakh in 2003.

Of the economic units, 50.43 percent are located in the urban areas while the rest are in rural areas, said the report, suggesting the number of employment

Syria ceasefire  
agreed: Putin

Regime, opposition groups  
sign truce deal brokered by  
Russia and Turkey, agree  
to sit down for peace talks

Russia President Vladimir Putin yesterday announced a nationwide ceasefire deal to come into effect across Syria from midnight and that the warring parties had agreed to sit down for peace talks.

The deal brokered by Russia and Turkey could represent a major breakthrough in nearly six years of war in Syria and comes a week after rebel resistance was crushed in the second city of Aleppo.

Although on opposing sides in the conflict, Turkey and Russia have been working intensively to find a ceasefire after the fall of Aleppo, in a process that conspicuously does not include the United States.

Putin said in televised comments that Damascus and the "main forces of the armed opposition" had inked the truce agreement and a document expressing a readiness to start peace talks.

Israel's right wing bins  
Kerry speech

Says Palestinian state will be 'off the agenda' once Trump takes over

Israel's right wing yesterday dismissed US Secretary of State John Kerry's speech on the conflict with the Palestinians as a parting shot of little consequence, especially with Donald Trump soon taking office.

One minister repeated his assertion that a Palestinian state will be "off the agenda" once expected ally Trump takes over, while others from what is seen as Israel's most right-wing government ever mocked Kerry.

"Palestine will be taken off the agenda," Education Minister Naftali Bennett of the hardline Jewish Home party told the Ynet news site.

He repeated his call for Israel to annex most of the West Bank, which would destroy any hope for a two-state solution -- long the basis of negotiations and which Kerry passionately defended Wednesday.

Kerry's speech included forceful criticism of Israeli settlement building in the occupied West Bank and annexed east Jerusalem, warning that it was helping put the two-state solution in "serious jeopardy."

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu says he still supports a two-state solution, but he has also described his government as Israel's most pro-settlement, leading many analysts to question his sincerity.
