



Cyber-attack forces Sundance closure

The Sundance Film Festival has been hacked. "Sundance Film Festival has been subject to a cyberattack, causing network outages that have shut down our box office," said a spokesperson for the festival. "No further information about the attack is available at this time,

but our team is working hard to get our system back up and running as soon as possible. All screenings will still take place as planned."

According to the festival's

Twitter account, a cyberattack forced the closure of its box office on Saturday. However, all movie screenings will go on as planned, according to festival organisers.

"Our artiste's voices will be heard and the show will go on," the festival added.

The cyber-attack occurred led a Women's March in shortly after Chelsea Handler Park City to protest the election of Donald Trump, at around noon Mediterranean Time. Roughly 40 minutes

later, online ticketing for future shows had been restored. It's unclear if the attack was related to crowds in Park City, holding empowerment signs and speaking out

Adele to perform at 2017 Grammys

British superstar singer Adele is joining the lineup of performers for the 59th annual Grammy Awards, which takes place February 12 from the Staples Center in Los Angeles.

The 10-time Grammy winner will perform a song from her juggernaut third album "25", which finished both 2016 and 2015 as the year's best-selling album in the United States and is the second biggest album of the millennium (behind, of course, her sophomore set "21").

There's a good chance Adele will hog the Grammys spotlight. She's also up for five categories: Album of the Year and Best Pop Vocal Album (for "25"); and Record of the Year, Song of the Year and Best Pop Solo Performance (all for "Hello").

The Londoner, who has performed at three previous Grammys, will join John Legend, Metallica, Carrie Underwood and Keith Urban on stage for music's biggest night.

The field this year is led by Beyoncé with nine nominations, while Drake,



Rihanna and Kanye West are close behind with eight nods each.

"The Late Late Show" leader James Corden will host the event, which is produced by AEG Ehrlich Ventures for The Recording Academy, and will be broadcast live on the CBS Television Network.
