May braces for new Brexit Send GD battle over court ruling

British Prime Minister Theresa May faces a landmark court ruling on Tuesday that could put a dent in her Brexit plans by handing control of the process to restive lawmakers.

The Supreme Court will decide whether she can use her executive power to begin formal talks on leaving the EU, or whether she must seek prior approval from parliament. The 11 judges are widely expected to

back an earlier High Court ruling that the magnitude of Brexit means the process to instigate it can only be introduced through formal legislation.

May has promised to trigger Article 50 of the EU's Lisbon treaty, beginning two years of divorce talks, by the end of March.

In the event they lose the case, minis-

ters are preparing to rush emergency legislation through the Houses of Commons and Lords. Opponents would almost certainly table amendments to try to tie the gov-

ernment's hand in negotiations, for example on the rights of EU citizens already in Britain. But the vote on Article 50 should pass, because although May has only a

slim majority, the main opposition Labour party has agreed not to block it.

The Supreme Court ruling may yet create further complications, including whether the devolved governments in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland

must approve May's plans.

And this week May promised parliament a vote on the final Brexit deal -raising the prospect, however remote, that MPs could reject it.

The original High Court decision in November drew outrage from Brexit supporters, who accused the claimants of trying to undo the result of last June's EU referendum.

One tabloid newspaper condemned the judges as "Enemies of the People" -and tensions are still running high. But Jo Murkens, associate law profes-

sor at the London School of Economics, said the case was about the limits of the government's "royal prerogative" "It would be much easier if the prime

using prerogative power. The problem is that the courts have not allowed that since the 17th century," he told AFP. He said a ruling against the government would be unlikely to bind its hands, but would clarify "there is a
