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EC FORMATION BNP 'broke secrecy' over its proposal

Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader yesterday said the BNP "broke the secrecy" about its proposal to President Abdul Hamid on forming a new Election Commission. He also termed a recent statement by a BNP leader "self-contradictory".

"BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir accused me of breaking the secrecy of the talks with the honourable president on the search committee to constitute the Election Commission, but his [Fakhrul] statement is definitely self-

contradictory," he said. Quader was speaking at a memorial meeting for AL leader MA Aziz organised by the Dhaka South city unit of the AL.

Myanmar seeks 'time and space'

Pledges action against rights abuses

Myanmar's deputy defence chief yesterday urged the world to give his government "time and space" to solve a crisis involving the Rohingya Muslim minority amid concerns jihadists could exploit the situation.

Rear Admiral Myint Nwe told a security forum in Singapore his government is "fully aware of the growing concern about the widespread reports on (the) situation in Rakhine state" where the Rohingya live, and was committed to address the issue and punish wrongdoers.

Since October Myanmar's army has carried out "clearance operations" in the north of the western state to root out insurgents accused of deadly raids on police border posts. At least 66,000 Rohingya have fled to neighbouring Bangladesh, alleging

rape, murder and torture at the hands of security forces.

Myanmar has long faced international criticism over its treatment of the Rohingya. Most people in the majority Buddhist community consider them illegal immigrants from Bangladesh.

"The government does not condone rights abuses against innocent civilians. Legal action will be taken in response to any substantiated claim," Myint Nwe said.

The admiral was responding to a keynote address by Malaysian Defence Minister Hishammuddin Hussein at the Fullerton Forum organised by the International Institute for Strategic Studies.

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No efforts yet to salvage sunken ship

Pollution feared in Sundarbans river

Ten days have gone but nobody seems to be in a hurry to recover MV Aichgati, which went down in the Pasur near the Sundarbans with 1,000 tonnes of coal.

An environmentalist said leaving the ship there for so long would harm the mangrove forest in the long run.

Officials concerned said if it was not recovered, silt would pile up over the vessel and it could reduce navigability at the estuary of the Pasur.

Sources said the capsized lighter vessel was old and most of its equipment was outdated. The goods and the vessel were insured and probably that's why the owner is not too keen on recovering the vessel.

Vessel owner Gazi Golam Faruq, however, refuted the allegation. "We've discussed with a company in Chittagong for recovering the vessel. It'll take some time," he told The Daily Star.

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Scientists develop 'fake news' vaccine

Scientists have created what they say is a vaccine against the kind of fake and hyper-partisan news that is spreading quickly across Facebook.

The researchers claim that by showing people lies, they can teach them to better see the truth. The solution works in a similar way to a real vaccine exposing people to a small amount of the problem to help them better respond to larger amounts of it.

The solution could help social networks and news organisations battle against fake news, which has been credited with helping the vote for both Brexit and for Donald Trump.

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2 Bangladeshis arrested in Malaysia for alleged IS links

Two Bangladeshis have been held in Malaysia for their suspected links to Islamic State (IS).

Malaysian Special Branch's Counter-Terrorism Division arrested four people, including the two Bangladeshis, in separate raids between January 13 and 19 in Kuala Lumpur and Sabah, New Straits Times, a local English daily, reported yesterday.

The suspects included a 31-year-old Filipino man and a 27-year-old Malaysian woman.

The Bangladeshis, aged 27 and 28, worked as salesmen, and were arrested last Thursday in Kuala Lumpur. They were suspected of having ties to suspected IS militants in Bangladesh and

Trump moves to withdraw from TPP trade pact

President Donald Trump moved yesterday to pull the United States out of the Trans-Pacific Partnership, making good on a pledge to scrap a deal he denounced as a "job killer" and a "rape" of US interests.

Embarking on his first full week in office, the 45th US president began rolling out his policy agenda after a tumultuous first weekend for his administration by signing a series of executive orders.

Among the first was a memo on withdrawing from the vast TPP trade pact, which aimed to set trade rules for the 21st century and bind US allies against growing Chinese economic clout.

"We've been talking about this for a long time," Trump

said as he signed the executive order in the Oval Office. "Great thing for the American worker what we just did." Promoted by Washington and signed by 12 countries in 2015, the TPP had yet to go into effect and US withdrawal is

likely to sound its death knell. Its signatories -- Australia, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore, the United States and Brunei -- together represent 40 percent of the world economy.

The real estate mogul's White House bid was fuelled in part by a pledge to overturn trade deals -- such as TPP and the North American Free Trade Agreement -- that he says have drained US jobs and destroyed its industrial heartlands.

Trump also signed two other orders, on freezing the hiring of federal workers and hitting foreign NGOs that help with abortion.

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
