Boycott classes, exams for indefinite period

A section of Rajshahi University of Engineering and Technology (Ruet) students went on an indefinite strike yesterday demanding cancellation of the "33 credit system".

The announcement came at a demonstration programme where around 150 students of 2014-15 and 2015-16 sessions staged a sit-in in front of the Shaheed Minar from 8:00am to 3:00pm. They also boycotted all the classes and examinations yesterday.

They also submitted a memorandum to the university vice-chancellor.

Earlier on August 2015, demanding cancellation of the system, students besieged the vicechancellor's office and organaised a demonstration programme.

According to the university sources, a student has to achieve minimum 33 credits out of 40 according to the "33 credit system". If the student fails to do so, he or she will not be allowed to move up to next session and has to retake the whole year.

Whereas previously, students were allowed to attend classes and examinations of the next session even if they get less than 33 credits. They could obtain the credits by taking examinations later. But the Ruet authorities cancelled the system in 2013-14 academic year.

According to the university sources each course represents three to five credits.

Ruet Vice-Chancellor Prof Rafiqul Alam Beg said, "The credit system was introduced in 2013 for the students' own good. Demanding withdrawal of the system is illogical."

The students had not consulted with him about the matter before the demonstration, said the VC, adding, "Decision regarding the issue will be made after a meeting of the academic council."

Textbooks should teach road safety

JS Speaker Shirin Sharmin tells Nirapad Sarak Chai event in Dhaka

Road safety issue should be included in textbooks at school level to make children aware of it, said Jatiya Sangsad Speaker Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury.

"A person should be aware about traffic rules and regulations since childhood. So, the significance of obeying traffic rules and bad impact of violating rules should be taught from school level," she said. Besides, a campaign for road safety should be conducted

at school level across the country, she told the 7th grand rally of Nirapad Sarak Chai at the capital's Mohanagar Natya Mancha yesterday. Shirin Sharmin also urged all the lawmakers to prioritise

the road safety issue in their activities. "People at grassroots level will be more aware about road safety, if you (MPs) conduct campaign and discuss the issue."

Drivers must keep in mind that they will not violate traffic laws to accelerate vehicles' speed, which is one of the major reasons behind accidents.

Addressing the programme, Dhaka North City Corporation Mayor Annisul Huq expressed his dissatisfaction at the culture of impunity over road accident.

There were hardly one or two incidents of punishment in the last 24 years. The culture of impunity encourages reckless driving and violation of traffic rules, he said.

There should be a law forcing road transport businesses and vehicle traders to establish training institutes for drivers, the mayor suggested.

Nirapad Sarak Chai Chairman Ilias Kanchan urged the political parties to put the road safety issue high on their agenda.

# Pro-ruling party lawyers appointed prosecutors

Chief Justice SK Sinha tells programme expressing unhappiness over legal aid lawyers' performance

Lawyers loyal to the ruling government are now being appointed as assistant public prosecutors (APP) in every district instead of the prominent ones, observed Chief Justice SK Sinha yesterday.

"Earlier, in every district, famous and renowned lawyers used to be appointed as APP in criminal cases. This post was dignified. The system continued for a long time. But it's not being implemented now-a-days," he said.

"Now [appointment of] APP means a panel list made by the ruling party, whoever in power, none from outside is appointed. Earlier, four to five prominent lawyers were in such panels. I'm not criticising eminent lawyers. This is an ethical question. We are losing tradition. If we can maintain this tradition, those who are not getting proper judgment will get served in a better way," the CJ added.

He made the remarks while addressing as the chief guest at a programme on "Meeting with panel lawyers of Supreme Court Legal Aid Committee hapless. He also announced to create a Rahman also spoke.

For providing legal aid services, now panel lawyers are being appointed, the CJ said. "How much are these lawyers giving services, it is also a question," he observed.

"When prominent lawyers defend against these panel lawyers in the concerned cases, there's no balance indeed," Sinha said.

"I'm not saying this to hurt anybody. Prominent and experienced lawyers defend one side while somehow not famous or inexperienced ones defend the other, which is not balanced. The government funded money is being spent but the deprived people are not getting due justice. This has made me worried," he added.

The CJ stressed training for the panel lawyers and sought everybody concerned in the legal aid services to work properly to ensure justice for the who can defend the deprived.

Sinha urged the media to work in this regard to make people aware of the legal aid services. Mentioning his recent bitter experiences at Juvenile Correction Centre in Gazipur, he said the law enforcement agencies are violating norms in some cases.

Earlier, Supreme Court Legal Aid Committee Chairman Justice M Enayetur Rahim said legal aid services should be available to all, even for those who are not entitled to pay income taxes.

MJF Executive Director Shaheen Anam also echoed him and said her organisation is working to ensure rights of the underprivileged people.

But the CJ disagreed and said the legal aid services should not be open to all because many people have crores of money but do not pay income taxes.

Schoolboys kill fellow from another institution

Four teenagers, including two schoolboys, hacked a tenth-grader to death while injured three others over previous rivalry at a field in Barisal city yesterday, said police. A student of Sahid Abdur Rab

Serniabat Secondary School, Saydur Rahman Hridoy Gazi, 16, son of Md Ziaur Rahman Sahin of Chinguria village of Pirojpur, was declared dead at Barisal Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital. Injured Golam Sajid Rafi escaped

from the hospital after 2:00pm, said police. Other two injured only needed first-aid.

Police arrested Sayed and Sahin, students of Govt Technical School and College, and its former students Miraj and Sakib.

According to police, Hridoy and his associates, armed with sticks and rods, clashed with Sayed and his 10 friends, who were already carrying knives and machetes, as the latter group entered the Poresh Sagar field.

The two groups had been fighting for long over various issues to establish supremacy.

Additional Police Commissioner Abul Kalam Azad said Sayed confessed to the involvement of his own and his friends in the killing.

Six months ago, they had a fight over using the field adjacent to both of their schools.

On January 18, a group of lawyers vandalised a Chittagong court after it rejected the couple's bail petition in a human trafficking case, filed by special branch of police with Patenga Police Station.
