BLAST AT CTG FLAT Two burn victims die

SSC examinee Tanima Afrin Chowdhury Ifti and her grandmother Samuda Khatun, who had suffered burns in a fire at a flat in Chittagong city on Friday, died at a hospital early yesterday.

Ifti and her 70-year-old grandmother were undergoing treatment with 100 percent of their bodies burnt at the burn unit of Chittagong Medical College Hospital. They breathed their last between 12:00 midnight and 1:00am, said assistant professor S Khaled of the CMCH burn unit.

Ifti's brother Ariful Islam, 27, also suffered burns in the incident and was transferred to the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Friday

Take me home

Appeals Bangladeshi woman; Sold twice, first by Bangladeshi father, then by Indian husband, she remains stranded at West Bengal shelter home for decade

Hearing-impaired Bangladeshi girl Nasima Khatun has been stranded in India for at least 10 years. The 25-yearold, now in a shelter there, cannot remember her Bangladesh address but wants to see her parents and siblings.

According to Nasima, she is from Paylabari of Barisal

and her father's name is Bechu Miah and mother's Ayesha Bibi. She has three brothers and three sisters. Nasima is in Baganda Janasiksha Prochar Kendra under Jangipara Police

Station in Hooghly, some 50km from West Bengal's capital Kolkata. The shelter authorities sent several letters to the address Nasima gave them but the letters returned undelivered.

BM Jamal Hossain, counsellor (political) of Bangladesh Deputy High Commission in Kolkata, said they were going to use the social media, including Facebook, to get information about her parents. They will open a Facebook page for Nasima where her photograph and other information would be uploaded.

Green activists, journos protest police attack

Pro-Sundarbans activists and journalists yesterday separately demonstrated against the police attack on Green activists and two journalists during Thursday's hartal protesting the Rampal power plant.

Several hundred newsmen formed a human chain in front of the National Museum demanding justice and that the home minister withdraw the comments he made over the incident.

Many of them covered their faces with black cloth while photojournalists and camerapersons kept their cameras on the ground.

They were holding placards that read: "Protest against brutal police attack", "We demand freedom of the press", "Free country, confined media", "Pen and Camera never bow down", "We want freedom to write".

They said the absence of punishment of the perpetrators was the reason behind the

PM slams anti-Rampal protesters

UNB, Chittagong

Blasting the critics of Rampal power plant project, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the plant would cause no environmental damage.

"The construction site of the plant is around 14 kilometres away from the outer boundary of the Sundarbans and

about 70 kilometres off the world heritage site. It is being set up in Rampal, not in the Sundarbans. So there is no possibility of causing any damage to the Sundarbans," she said.

The PM was addressing the inaugural ceremony of the 57th National Convention of the Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh (IEB) at its Chittagong centre.

She came down hard on the critics saying that they "never visited the power plant site" to get an idea about the impact on the Sundarbans.

"They are conducting a campaign sitting in the capital...

they never visited Rampal," she said. The government took all kinds of measures to protect the environment of the Sundarbans and its surrounding areas as well as to protect the habitat and biodiversity of that

region, Hasina told the programme. Referring to the construction of Barapukuria coal-fired power plant in Dinajpur, she said there was no negative impact on the densely populated and green area in Barapukuria although two sub-critical plants were set up there.

The land of the area "became more fertile and more rice
