The second edition of the Jazz & Blues Fest Dhaka opened in Dhaka on Sunday night, with an enthralling set of performances to a moderate crowd at the rooftop of La Meridien Hotel. After Armeen Musa, Gary Husband and Oz Noy Group set the festival in fluid motion, Indian composer-violinist Deepek Pandit brought an unlikely instrument to the festival's genre and proved that genres

Armeen, the Berklee-graduate Bangladeshi singer-songwriter opened the festival with her jazzy repertoire original tracks like "Simultaneously" and "Frost" and the Bangla number "Jokhon Chole Jao", and covering Simply Red's '80s hit "Holding Back the Years" and the Hoagy Carmichael jazz standard "Nearness of You".

Gary Husband, the masterful keyboardist-pianist from UK, had performed in the first edition of the Jazz & Blues Fest in November 2015, but he was somewhat in the background, playing a more supporting role to the legendary John McLaughlin. This year, he played a solo set on the keys, demonstrating both technical dexterity and immense feel. The three-piece Oz Noy Group

was the third act on stage, with their performance exploring the diversity of the genre. Oz Noy, the Israealborn guitarist known for breaking the mold of instrumental guitar music, has played with artistes ranging from Harry Bellafonte to Jordin Sparks, and his range was on full display. He seamlessly blended



funk, blues, jazz and rock, controlling the energy of the space, with superb backing from organ-style keys and drums - and made a strong first impression, be it with the grooving slide-styled solos or slow, ballad-like compositions.

Mumbai-based violinist and composer Deepak Pandit, the final act of the evening, took the audience by a bit of a surprise as he took stage in a white Punjabi, but he brought along two other musicians who have played to this crowd before - drummer Gino Banks and bassist Sheldon D'Silva both part of the 2015 festival. Deepak explored the entire dramatic range of the violin, intertwining Eastern and Western playing styles, and created whirlpools of melodies that sucked

the audience in. He also gave ample space to his accompanying musicians to showcase their skills with big solos on the bass, drums and keys, and ended with a magnificent, introspective piece titled "Antaratma".

Blues Communications, the organisers of the festival, did an expectedly fantastic job with the overall arrangement, although they admitted it was not the ideal setting they would have wanted for the festival. After various permission-related complications restricted them from organising it at an open space like the last edition, it's commendable how they made the best of what was available.

Last night's performances at the three-day festival included the S.A.D Trio led by Bangladeshi guitarist Shafkat Ahmed Dipto, Danish tenor saxophonist Jakob Dinesen and an allstar tribute to the music od Miles Davis. Tonight on the closing eve of the festival will include Indian drummer-composer Ranjit Barot and Slang, Indian blues band Soulmate and the festival's headliner, Lurrie Bell and the Chicago Blues Band.

SAG AWARDS: "Hidden Figures", "Stranger Things" take top prizes

Fox's historical drama "Hidden Figures" won the SAG Award for top ensemble cast on Sunday in an awards show that also saw "Fences", "Moonlight", and "La La Land" receiving recognition.

"This film is about unity; this is what happens when we put our differences aside," said Taraji P. Henson - who plays mathematician Katherine Johnson — in accepting for "Hidden Figures".

The film won over "Manchester by the Sea", "Captain Fantastic", "Fences", and "Moonlight". Awards season frontrunner "La La Land" was shut out of the category as voters apparently considered it more of a two-hander than ensemble piece.

The winner of the SAG ensemble trophy has matched the Oscar best picture winner 11 times in 21 years.

Denzel Washington won the best actor award for "Fences" and castmate Viola Davis took the supporting award. Emma Stone took the best actress award for her role as a struggling actress in "La La Land" and Mahershala Ali took the supporting actor trophy for "Moonlight".

Netflix's freshman series "Stranger Things" won the drama series trophy, repeating Saturday's triumph at the Producers Guild of America Awards. It topped the final season of "Downton Abbey", which had won the past two years.

Lily Tomlin received the SAG Life Achievement Award, presented by Dolly Parton.

John Lithgow and Claire Foy won the drama series actor awards for Netflix's "The Crown" for their portrayals of Winston Churchill and Queen Elizabeth, respectively. "Orange Is the New Black" won the comedy ensemble trophy for the third straight year.

The evening was punctuated with an array of verbal attacks on President Donald Trump's ban on refugees and citizens from seven predominately Muslim countries from entering the United States. "This immigrant ban is a blemish and it is un-American," said Julia Louis-Dreyfus, who won the actress trophy for comedy series for "Veep" for the second time.

William H. Macy won the actor in a comedy series for "Shameless", winning the trophy a second time after taking the award in 2015. Sarah Paulson won the best actress for TV movie or limited series for "The People vs. O.J. Simpson: American Crime Story." Bryan Cranston took the best actor award in the TV movie or limited series category for his portrayal of Lyndon Baines Johnson in "All the Way".

International sculpture exhibition opens in Chittagong

A weeklong sculpture exhibition titled "International Celebration of Contemporary Sculpture" featuring works of country's sculpture artists started at Artist Rashid Chowdhury Art Gallery of Fine Arts Institute of Chittagong University (CU) on Sunday.

With the theme of 'Art in Public Spaces', Germany-based 'Sculpture Network' is organising the exhibition at 70 venues of 21 countries.

In Bangladesh, the exhibition is being held at two venues -- one at the Artist Rashid Chowdhury Art Gallery of Institute of Fine Arts of CU, and the other is Alliance Francaise de Chittagong Gallery.

A total of 50 sculptures by 47 artists are being exhibited in the exhibition, where the artists have used metal rods, metal pipes, ceramic, fiberglass, cloths, metal sheet, wood, paper, sawdust, stone, terracotta, glass, sand, coal and re-



cycled material to produce the sculptures with unique shapes and colours.

Bangladesh's venue coordinator and CU Fine Arts Institute's Associate Prof Pranab Mitra said sculpture is a three-dimensional art which draws quick attention. He said it is the largest platform for contemporary sculpture artists where the participants at the 70 locations are connected with each other virtu-

ally, and can communicate their impressions live over social networks.

"Every year, the exhibition is organised worldwide to support, encourage and promote the threedimensional art throughout the world at the end of January to celebrate international contemporary sculpture," added Pranab.

"I tried to express the eternal bond with mother and child

though my sculpture. I borrowed the idea from our ancient mother figure who provided security and assurance to a child", said Sameena M Karim, whose work "Matrika" expresses mothers' primal bond with child.

Another artist, Gonshai Pahlavi, made a sculpture named "Seed Yantra" with metal scraps where he tried to show that well-designed sculpture can be made by scrap materials.

CU Pro-Vice Chancellor (VC) Prof Iftekhar Uddin Chowdhury inaugurated the exhibition as chief guest on Sunday noon.

Fine Arts Institute's Prof Alak Roy presided over the inaugural ceremony of the exhibition where Alliance Française de Chittagong Director Raphael Jaeger, CU Fine Arts Institute's Director Shaela Sharmin were also present.

The exhibition will remain open from 10am to 8pm every day and will end on February 4.
