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Tigers begin warm-up today

The Bangladesh national cricket team will begin their tour of India with a two-day warm-up game against India A at the Gymkhana Ground in Hyderabad today.

The visitors will want to utilise this opportunity to the fullest considering that they played their cricket in bouncy and windy conditions in New Zealand in the last month. While the conditions in Hyderabad will no doubt be similar to those of Bangladesh, they will still need to work on readjusting to a subcontinental pitch following their monthlong New Zealand tour.

Aside from the 15 chosen players in the team, Bangladesh have taken along with them an extra pacer, Abu Jayed, to play the warm-up game. It seems like the Bangladesh team management does not want to disclose their pacers to the Indian team prior to the one-off Test which is scheduled to begin on February 9.

There is a good possibility that the team management will rest two pacers in this practice match and play them directly in the Test in order to maintain the element of surprise. However, it remains uncertain who those two pacers will be.

As of now, there are four pacers in the team -- Taskin Ahmed, Shubhashis Roy, Shafiul Islam and Kamrul Islam Rabbi. Going by Kamrul's good performance in New Zealand, it is almost a certainty that he is going to find a place for the Hyderabad Test.

As far as the batting order is concerned, it will not be a surprise if the team management gives all their main batters SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

'MOLESTING HOTEL INTERN'

Saudi diplomat faces caning in Singapore

A Saudi diplomat has been sentenced to a caning by a judge in Singapore for allegedly molesting a hotel intern.

Bander Yahya A Alzahrani, who works

for the Saudi Arabia Embassy in Beijing, faces four strokes of the stick after being found guilty of groping the 20-year-old woman in an en-suite bathroom.

Caning is legal in Singapore for sexual abuse, vandalism and rioting offenders, as well as for foreigners who have overstayed visas by more than 90 days.

The same corporal punishment can be dished out for convicts in Alzahrani's native Saudi Arabia.

According to the Straits Times, the court heard the father of three was on holiday with his family when he started kissing the intern on her neck and face in a Sentosa hotel on 14 August last year.

The popular island resort attracts around 20m people each year and boasts a 2kmlong sheltered beach, two golf courses, 14 hotels and a Universal Studios theme park.

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'Lost continent' discovered

It might sound implausible, but deep at the bottom of the Indian Ocean, a research team, led by South Africa's University of the Witwatersrand, has found pieces of an ancient continent.

The lava-covered piece of continent, dubbed 'Mauritia,' was found under the popular island of Mauritius.

According to the report published this week in the journal Nature Communications, the piece of crust is left over from the breakup of Gondwanaland, a super-continent that existed more than 200 million years ago.

Abul Kashem 'recharges' his life!

Innovative business idea allows him a steady income

A little bit of creative thinking has allowed Abul Kashem to earn a steady livelihood from a business he set up at Roumari upazila Bazar in Kurigram.

Kashem set up an outlet at the local bazar to provide mobile phone recharging services to people from nearby villages who do not have power supplies in their homes. He sits in an open space of the banana market area in the bazar from 10:00am to 11:00pm every day providing this service.

Every day, an average of 90 people charge their mobile phones at Kashem's outlet where he can provide up to 250 charging points at the same time.

Each mobile phone takes around two to three hours to fully charge its battery and Kashem charges Tk 5 per phone for this service. This way he earns around Tk 350 to Tk 450 every day.

"I set up my outlet by using power from the electricity supply connection at Badol Shah's shop in the banana market. I pay him Tk 50 daily for this service," said Kashem.

Abul Kashem, 35, son of late Elahi Bakash of Naodapara village in Roumari upazila used to run a grocery store before he came up with this idea to earn more money.

Rural people who have no electricity power supply in their houses are his main customers. They charge their phones once every two days or so.

"This business is now the only source of my income and I can maintain my family of eight -- my mother, wife, five children and myself -- with my earnings," he said.

Kashem recently talked to The Daily Star when he set up a shop temporarily in Kurigram town for four days. He set up his outlet near a mini Tablighi Ijtema held in Kurigram Government College ground late last year.

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
