### 17 deaths a day on roads this year He said haphazard plying of motor-

were killed and 30 others injured in a head-on collision between a bus and a microbus in Narsingdi's Darikhali on Dhaka-Sylhet highway.

The 12-seater microbus, which was going to Kishoreganj from Kamrangirchar with more than 15 passengers, was reduced to a mangled heap of metal. Eleven people died on the spot while two others died in hospitals.

On Saturday night, 13 people were killed in a head-on collision between a bus and a lorry carrying LP gas cylinders to Faridpur's Nagarkanda. Both the vehicles caught fire on impact, and almost all the dead were burned beyond recognition, said fire service officials who visited the spot.

Eight more people were killed on February 3 when a truck helper, filling in for the trucker, lost control over the wheel and ploughed through a crowd in Alutila of Khagrachhari. The accident occurred on Chittagong-Khagrachhari road where thousands gathered to attend a funeral of a monk.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, urban transport expert Prof Shamsul Huq said road fatalities occur as Bangladeshi roads have all the elements required for accidents to hap-

ised and non-motorised vehicles, speeding, the tendency to overtake and a lack of monitoring of the authorities concerned are the reasons for recurring road crashes.

(2011-2020) with the goal to stabilise and reduce predicted levels of road traffic fatalities around the world. The issue has also been included in the adopted Sustainable Development Goals with a target to halve traffic "Strict monitoring while issuing deaths and injuries by 2020.

Being the signatory, Bangladesh is doing little to check road crashes and save lives. According to the 2015 global report

of the World Health Organisation, 90 percent of the road fatalities occur in the low and middle-income countries and road crashes, which are preventable, are the leading cause of death for people aged 15-29. Deaths of so many economically

active people place a huge burden on the victims' families and a country loses an estimated 1.6 percent of its gross domestic product (GDP) due to road crashes that put a heavy burden on the national economies, said the

Identifying reckless driving and owners' greed for profit as major reasons for road crashes, Roads and Bridges Division Secretary MAN Siddique claimed that no steps would be enough unless the issues were addressed.

Democratic Congressman Joaquin Castro of Texas confirmed the launch of a "targeted operation" aimed at arresting the undocumented.

Castro said the roundups were part of "Operation Cross Check" -- a series of large-scale raids that began in 2011 under Barack Obama.

The agency conducted the last sweep in March 2015, corralling 2,059 undocumented immigrants deemed threats to "public safety."

In New York, which hosts the country's largest population of undocumented immigrants -- 1.15 million, according to Pew -- a few hundred people demonstrated near the immigration services office.

Obama deported more immigrants than any of his predecessors, prioritising the expulsion of repeat criminal offenders or those convicted of serious crimes, including rape, child pornography and gang membership.

Undocumented migrants with repeated drunk driving convictions

were also targeted.

With his decree, Trump -- who vowed as a candidate to deport some three million undocumented immigrants with criminal records -- broadens the scope of the Obama administration's policy, dropping the distinction between convicted criminals and those who have simply been charged.

Activists have rallied around the case of Guadalupe Garcia de Rayos -- a 35-year-old mother arrested during a routine visit to Phoenix, Arizona who has become symbolic of Trump's hard-

The mother of two US-born children was caught in 2008 using a fake social security number and slapped with a deportation order. Authorities had not previously expelled her for practical reasons, however, as she posed little threat.

But by Thursday, she was in Nogales, the Mexican border town where she crossed into the US more than two decades ago.

Talking to this correspondent, a number of consumers and restaurant owners voiced concern about the strike.

"It's very bad news for me. I prefer meat to fish," said Sahabuddin Mia, a hardware trader, who frequents restaurants around his workplace at Farmgate.

Selima Aktar, an official at a private firm, said she keeps beef and mutton on the family's menu at least two days a week.

"I have been doing this for years to ensure protein intake for my family

members. If the strike continues, I will face problems," she said.

Anwar Hossain Belu, senior vice president of Bangladesh Restaurant Owners Association, said beef prices remained stable for the last one month. "The sudden strike will create a crisis in the market and lead to a hike in prices."

This is the peak season for weddings and picnics, and the strike would hurt both consumers and businesses, he said.

According to the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh, retail prices of beef were Tk 430-450 a kg in the last one week and those of mutton were Tk 580-650 a kg.

nuclear devices and ballistic missiles at an unprecedented rate in violation of United Nations resolutions.

A US official said the Trump administration had been expecting a North Korean "provocation" soon after taking office and will consider a full range of options in response, but these would be calibrated to show US resolve while avoiding escalation.

The new administration is also likely to step up pressure on China to rein in North Korea, reflecting Trump's previously stated view that Beijing has not done enough on this front, the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

"This was no surprise," the official said. "The North Korean leader likes to draw attention at times like this."

The latest test comes a day after Trump held a summit meeting with Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, and also follows Trump's phone call last week with Chinese President Xi Jinping. "I just want everybody to under-

stand, and fully know, that the United States of America is behind Japan, our great ally, 100 percent," Trump told reporters in Palm Beach, Florida, speaking alongside Abe. He made no further comments.

Abe called the launch "absolutely intolerable" and said North Korea must comply with UN Security Council resolutions.

China is North Korea's main ally but has been frustrated by Pyongyang's repeated provocations, although it bristles at pressure from Washington and Seoul to curb the North and its young leader, Kim Jong Un.

China's foreign ministry did not immediately respond to a request for

comment.

Trump and his aides are likely to weigh a series of possible responses, including new US sanctions to tighten financial controls, an increase in naval and air assets in and around the Korean peninsula and accelerated installation of new missile defence systems in South Korea, the administration official said.

But the official said that given that the missile was believed not to have been an ICBM and that Pyongyang had not carried out a new nuclear explosion, any response will seek to avoid ratcheting up tensions.

Trump has pledged a more assertive approach to North Korea but given no clear sign of how his policy would differ from Obama's so-called strategic patience. In January, Trump tweeted "It won't happen!" after Kim said the North was close to testing an ICBM, but his aides never explained how he would do so. The missile was launched from an

area called Panghyon in North Korea's western region just before 8:00am (2300 GMT Saturday) and flew about 500 km, the South's Office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff said.

"Our assessment is that it is part of a show of force in response to the new US administration's hardline position against the North," the office said in a statement.

## AL men beat up doctor

Sparks doctors' protest; hospital in Sirajganj virtually closed for 4 hours

Some activists of ruling Awami League yesterday assaulted a doctor of Belkuchi Upazila Health Complex in Sirajganj for "refusing to admit a critically injured patient". Demanding punishment of attack-

ers, doctors and employees of the 50bed Belkuchi Upazila Health stopped work for around four hours from 8:30am. However, emergency medical services were available. Seriously injured Hasan Ali of

Konabari village in Belkuchi upazila was taken to the health complex around 8:00am. But on-duty doctor Shakhawat Hossain asked Hasan to go to Sirajganj General Hospital as his condition was critical. Hasan had a motorcycle accident, said Kamrul Hasan, Belkuchi upazila health offi-

At one stage, some AL men went to the hospital and insisted that their patient be admitted. As Shakhawat refused, they assaulted Shakhawat, alleged Kamrul.

"The patient's condition was critical and his treatment was not possible at the upazila health complex. So, the on-duty doctor asked them [AL activists] to take their patient to district general hospital, but they became angry and beat up the emergency doctor mercilessly on the hospital ground," said Kamrul.

Hearing the news, Sirajganj civil surgeon, superintendent of police, local lawmaker and local AL leaders rushed to the spot and assured the doctors of taking action against the culprits. Following the assurance, doctors

## College goer arrested for stabbing girl

Police yesterday arrested a college student in connection with stabbing a visually impaired schoolgirl inside a rehabilitation centre in Haribhanga area on Saturday.

The arrestee, Jahangir Hossain, 19, son of Shamsul Haque alias Hossain, of Sindurna village in Hatibandha upazila, is an intermediate level student of Lalmonirhat Govt College and also visually impaired.

Victim Mina Akhter, 14, daughter of Afaz Uddin and Anwara Begum of Saptibari village in Aditmari upazila, is a student of class-V at Haribhanga Dargarpar Govt Primary School.

Her mother filed a case with Lalmonirhat Sadar police on Saturday night.

Police said both the victim and the attacker were residential students of Visually Impaired Rehabilitation Centre run by NGO RDRS Bangladesh, which has 23 other such students.

Family sources alleged Jahangir on several occasions made illicit proposals to Mina. Refused by her, Jahangir stabbed her inside the centre on Saturday morning, police said.

Mina has been admitted in Rangpur Medical College Hospital.

"We are poor. We cannot afford the treatment of our daughter," Anwara said, adding, the NGO had assured them of bearing the treatment expenditures.

Ahsan Ullah, hostel superintendent of the centre, said the RDRS Bangladesh would bear Mina's treatment costs. Officer-in-Charge Rafiqul Islam of
