Trump receives another blow

His pick for top security adviser turns down offer; Trump denies campaign had pre-election contact with Russia

Donald Trump's reported pick for national security adviser turned down the job just hours after the president defended the ousted Michael Flynn, saying he "wasn't wrong" for dealing with Russia. Retired Navy Admiral Robert

Harward's rejection of the key post late Thursday leaves Trump without a replacement for Flynn, the first high profile casualty of the US leader's tenure, and it added to a perception of disarray in his administration.

Harward told CNN he bowed out because of family and financial commitments, but several US media outlets reported that he was unhappy because he had no guarantees that the National Security Council -- and not Trump's political advisers -- would be in charge of policy. Members of the council currently include Steve Bannon,

Trump's controversial far-right former campaign manager. One Harward friend told CNN that he didn't want the job because of chaos at the White House.

Flynn, a close adviser on Trump's 2016 campaign, resigned after it was revealed that he held telephone conversations during the election race with Russia's ambassador in Washington about US sanctions.

Flynn was no stranger to controversy. His past included a paid appearance at a 2015 dinner sitting next to President Vladimir Putin and suggestions that Russia's seizure of Crimea and its support for Syrian leader Bashar al-Assad SEE PAGE 11 COL 5



First polls under new EC today

The newly formed Election Commission holds municipality polls in Rangamati's Baghaichhari Upazila today, three days after it took charge.

"This is the first election under the new Election Commission. We are giving a lot of importance to it," **Election Commissioner Brig** general (retd) Sahadat Hossain Chowdhury told journalists yesterday.

Earlier, he held a meeting with law enforcers and district election officials at the upazila parishad hall to discuss preparations for the election.

Issuing a note of warning, he said if anyone is found involved in any wrongdoing concerning the polls, the commission would take tough action.

The new EC headed by Chief Election Commissioner KM Nurul Huda took oath on February 15.

1,000 Rohingyas could be sent abroad

The UN refugee agency UNHCR is trying to rehabilitate 1,000 Rohingya refugees to Canada, some other European countries and the USA from Bangladesh, officials of the

UN refugee agency said.

"The UNHCR has sought permission from the Bangladesh government to rehabilitate the 1,000 Rohingyas to other countries," Shinji Kubo, the agency's Bangladesh country representative, told BBC Bangla service yesterday.

There are around 34,000

registered Rohingya refugees at two camps in Bangladesh, and the agency has selected 1,000 from them, said Kubo, adding that they have been SEE PAGE 11 COL 2

Samsung heir Hard to tackle air pollution

Non-compliant brick kilns operate, rundown vehicles run despite drive against polluters, leading to deterioration of air quality

Regulators are having a hard time curbing the worrisome rise in air pollution in the country largely because of a "culture of non-compliance" with laws.

Brick kilns operating with pollutant chimneys, rundown public transport plying the roads and construction and development work being carried out without maintaining the standards are making it next to impossible to rein in the pollution.

Bangladesh has experienced the

steepest rise in air pollution levels since 2010, according to the State of Global Air 2017 released by the Boston-based Health Effects Institute (HEI) just a couple of days ago.

Concentration of fine particles in Bangladesh increased from 65 micrograms per cubic metre of air (65ug/m3) in 1990 to 92 ug/m3 in 2015, said HEI, an independent research organisation that receives funding from the US Environmental Protection Agency.


"Such deterioration of our air quality

is all our own creations. These are totally man-made. No one in the society is complying with the environmental best practices," lamented SM Munjurul Hannan Khan, who oversees the government-run Clean Air and Sustainable

Development (CASE) project. Munjurul said a "culture of noncompliance" was exposing the people to such an unhealthy environment.

He said the culture allows noncomplying brick kilns to operate, worn-out and totally unfit buses and

Scientists discover

'eighth continent'

New Zealand is sitting on top of the geological entity, most of which sits underneath the South Pacific and so can't be seen, according to a major new paper.

The continent - known as Zealandia - is a distinct geological entity and meets all the criteria that are satisfied by the existing seven continents, the researchers said. It is elevated above the area that surrounds it, has its own distinctive geology, the area that it takes up is well defined and it has a thick crust - just like the seven masses we currently class as continents.

The new continent measures five million square kilometres and 94 percent of that is underwater, according to the new paper published in the Geological Society of America's journal, GSA Today. It is made up of three major landmasses: New Zealand's north and south islands, and New Caledonia to the north.

The first container ship, MV Nou Kollan-1, arrived from Kolkata at Pangaon Inland Container Terminal in Keraniganj yesterday.

The vessel berthed at the terminal under the Coastal Shipping Agreement between Bangladesh and India. The deal, signed during the visit of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Bangladesh in 2015, allows direct movement of ships at sea between the two countries.

It has helped improving the connectivity between the two neighbours by reducing shipping time from 30-40 days to 4-10 days.
