Bangladeshi citizens abroad will receive their Machine Readable Passports (MRPs) within seven days, Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal said yesterday. Bangladeshi nationals abroad usu-

ally receive their MRPs in two to three months after submission of their applications, as the passports were sent through diplomatic bags, the minister "We have now signed a deal with the

Federal Express (FedEx) courier service...which is able to send passports to our foreign embassies within three days and the Bangladeshis living abroad will get their passports within maximum seven days," the minister

No militants will be allowed to leave or enter the country, he said, adding that immigration officials were working on it.

Maj Gen Masud Rezwan, director general (DG) of the DIP, said they are providing passport and Machine Readable Visa (MRV) facilities from 71 passport offices of 64 districts, MRP-MRV wings of 65 foreign missions and seven visa cells.

A total of 1.64 crore MRPs and 4.5 lakh MRVs have been provided so far, he said, adding that revenue worth Tk 8,000 crore had been earned from it.

Police yesterday stopped a seminar on border killing organised in the capital by People's Movement for Democracy, a pro-BNP professionals 'platform.

Acting editor of Bangla daily Amar Desh Mahmudur Rahman was supposed to present key note paper at the seminar titled "Border Killing: Responsibility of the State" organised at Spectra Convention Centre. Forhad Mazhar was the moderator.

Attended by around a hundred people, the event started around 10:00am when some Gulshan police members took entry and requested organisers to cancel the seminar as they did not take permission from police for the event.

Police said they were instructed by the higher authorities, but did not mention who the authorities were.

Population density should match civic amenities

Experts tell discussion on new DAP

To implement Dhaka's detailed area plan (DAP), its population density has to be in proportion to the civic amenities, said leading urban planners at a discussion in the capital yesterday.

Size of a city and its growth rate are determined by the size of population, they said, adding, a healthy urban living depends on adequate civic service facilities -- health, education, water, drainage, open spaces and transportation.

Population density is not being effectively controlled based on the floor area ratio (FAR) and maximum ground coverage (MCG), said Salma A Shafi, vice-president of Bangladesh Institute of Planners (BIP).

The institute organised the discussion on "Density Planning for the DAP" on its premises.

"Dhaka is a city with the highest density but lowest liveability," said BIP General Secretary Prof Md Akter Mahmud.

At present, population density in the revised 1,624-square-km area of Dhaka master plan is controlled primarily by FAR provision of the building construction rules that allow vertical growth of buildings leaving some

open space. But under this regulation, the density of population went up compared to the facili-

ties, the experts said. As a result, living quality went down, said Md Ashraful Islam, Rajuk deputy town plan-

ner and project director of DAP. This trend should be tailored by desired population size per unit of land -- 350 people per acre or six people per Katha -- for a healthy living and sustainable economic

growth, he added. "It has to be examined how much housing is really needed in the capital and on what rationale the designated wetlands, flood flow zone and agricultural lands have been converted," he said.

The DAP boss said they are scrutinising the survey reports for the final plan.

Pointing to the usefulness of people's participation in the planning process, he said the locals came up with the idea of connecting a canal from Ashkona with the proposed 100 feet canal along the 300 feet road for the neighbourhood's drainage solution.

BIP President Prof AKM Abul Kalam conducted the discussion.
