Chhau is Purulia's folklore based dance form in West Bengal and the form was used in the play, source

Written and directed by Dani Karmakar, the show was organised by Ensemble Theatre, a leading theatre group in Mymensingh.

The cast of the play were Dani and Sangeet Jana. Subol Karmakar assisted the play.

Talking to The Daily Star, Dani said the play based on William Shakespeare's tragedy "Macbeth" was a multi-lingual production in Bangla, Hindi and English.

"Through the play, we want to present the importance of Shakespeare

and his writings," the director said.

Macbeth is a tragedy that drama-

tises the damaging implications of political ambition when one wants power for its own sake. Set in the seventeenth century, Dani says the story is still relevant in the present social scenario.

This conflict is the prime subject of the play and sheds light on gender-based preconceptions from Shakespearean times to the present day, he said.

The capacity packed auditorium was gratifying for the performers.

Troupe members said it was a rare experience to visit the culturally rich Mymensingh.

Earlier, a discussion was held. Prof Yusuf Khan Pathan, chairman of Mymensingh Zila Parishad addressed the discussion, among others.

IMRAN KHAN ready to turn director

Imran Khan, who was last seen in Nikkhil Advani's 2015 romantic-drama"Katti Batti" is all set to turn director. Mirror has learnt that the 34-year-old actor is currently penning a script with Ayesha DeVitre who has earlier written films like the Sidharth Malhotra-Alia Bhatt-Fawad Khan starrer "Kapoor & Sons" and "Ek Main Aur Ekk Tu" with Imran and Kareena Kapoor. The duo has also been friends for 20 years.

"It's a character drama revolving around several people and their lives. It's still being developed. Imran is extremely excited about the project and completely focused on it," says a source close to the actor. Circulating rumors claim several A-list actresses have shown interest in it. The source however insists that Imran who will not be acting in his directorial debut because he wants to concentrate on one thing at a time - will only begin casting after he has locked the script. The film isn't expected to roll this year.

Meanwhile, he's on a self-imposed hibernation as far as acting is concerned. Earlier he had said that it's important for him to like the script and the director since he will be spending six to eight months working on a film. "I ask myself if I'd watch the film and be entertained by it. If the answer is 'yes', then maybe it's a 'yes' from me
