# Lack of collaboration among ministries, NGOs main hurdle

A lack of collaboration between related ministries and nongovernment organisations, and institutional and financial capacity gap are the major challenges to achieve sustainable development goal (SDG) in education within 2030, said Global Education Monitoring Report 2016.

Climate change impacts and natural calamities such as flood and cyclone are other challenges for Bangladesh in attaining the SDG as the climate-related challenges also affect the schooling system, said the report prepared by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco).

Unesco Bangladesh and the need for such programmes to

for Unesco (BNCU) jointly organised a programme at BANBEIS Bhaban in the capital yesterday to disclose findings of the report presented by Maki Hayashikawa, chief of Section for Inclusive Quality Education at Unesco, Bangkok office.

"With increasing frequency of floods and climate change impacts, many environmental migrants from rural areas become slum dwellers in Dhaka. Unsurprisingly, the school system is routinely affected by climate-related challenges," said the report.

# Fight extremism with counter-narratives

Experts suggest at BIPSS conference

Circulation of effective counter-narratives is a must to combat violent extremism as militant outfits often use distorted narratives as a tool to recruit, experts told a conference yesterday.

extremist groups, hence they must be included in antiterrorism strategies.

The Bangladesh Institute of Peace and Security Studies (BIPSS), with support from Canadian High Commission in Dhaka, organised the conference at a hotel in the capital.

"Force is not the right weapon against violent extremism. Violent extremism is a battle of ideal, and countering it is also a battle of ideal," Brig Gen (retd) Shahedul Anam Khan said in his keynote paper entitled

"Countering the Extremist Narrative". He stressed the need for focusing on vulnerable groups, those on the path of being radicalised, and those already radicalised, while formulating the counter-narratives.

The state, former terrorists who returned to the right path, families, and youths should act as messengers to reach the targeted audiences with the narratives, said Anam, a security expert.

Speaking as the chief guest, Canadian They said youths were the main targets of High Commissioner in Dhaka Benoît-Pierre Laramée shared his experience of an extremists' attack in Canada and emphasised increasing awareness among people and coordination among law enforcement and security agencies to combat terrorism and

extremism in Bangladesh. Shafqat Munir, a research fellow at BIPSS, highlighted how youths get involved in militancy through the internet, especially social media platforms that are full of narratives of violent extremism. He laid stress on circulating more and more powerful alterna-

tive narratives online. BIPSS president Maj Gen (retd) ANM Muniruzzaman and BIPSS research fellow Prof Abu Zayed Mohammad also spoke.
