**LINES OUT TO GET SUBASHIS** In the sixth over of the first day Subashis Roy had prematurely rejoiced at picking up Kusal Mendis's wicket first ball, only for the eventual centurion to be recalled after replays showed that Subashis had overstepped the line. In the seventh over of the second day, Subashis was again celebrating what he thought was Mendis's wicket, only to be let down again. The best guess doing the rounds is that Tamim thought the ball had gone past the keeper, but on a day of gifts he may have wanted to thank the keeper for dropping him on 28.

HATHURU'S BANGLA TURN When Hathurusingha, the prodigal son, returned to his native land in charge of the opposition and faced up to the press at the post-day press conference yesterday, the Sri Lanka media manager (who runs the pressers for both teams) asked for questions in English first, which meant that questions in Sinhalese would follow. It seemed a bit odd that a

Bangladesh coach would be answering questions in a language that the Bangladeshi scribes would not understand. When the English questions ended, it was asked whether Hathurusingha would mind questions in Sinhalese, and he agreed. When no more questions were forthcoming, the media manager jokingly asked whether he knew any Bangla, to which Hathurusingha said 'a few words'. Then, before he got up, he said 'Dhonnobaad' with a mischievous smile. At least we know where his allegiances lie as long as he is wearing a Bangladesh jersey.

### THE TOWN ON THE EDGE

It must be counted as a stroke of good fortune that a tourist's first stop in Sri Lanka is the seaside city of Galle. It is often thought that the cities of the Indian subcontinent are culturally similar, but Galle, the administrative capital of the Southern Province, seems to be occupying an alternate reality and presents a bit of a culture shock to those coming from Bangladesh.

The city is dominated by the Galle Fort, and that is where the alternate reality is at its most vivid.

Nestled inside walls first built by the Portuguese in 1588 and then fortified by the Dutch from 1649 onwards is a town within a city, and to put it simply it is a surreal blend of European architecture with a subcontinental way of life, with each influencing the other. Narrow, cobbled streets weave between houses built closely together in an old-world colonial style. The streets are uncommonly neat for the subcontinent, with primly maintained shop fronts and restaurant seating out on the street.

Walking through the old-world streets among people of multiple ethnicities, it is easy to imagine that you are in a place on the edges of the harsher world. In a sense that is exactly where the Galle fort is -- to its south is

the vast expanse of the Indian Ocean, and beyond that, no major landmass in the southward direction for more than 5,000 miles -- and even then it is the near uninhabitable Antarctica.

### THE CRICKET GROUND

The Galle International Stadium is one of the most picturesque grounds in the world and can easily give the Adelaide

# North Zone win maiden title

BCB North Zone became the new Bangladesh Cricket League (BCL) champions after earning three points from their drawn game against

In addition to that, the four-day competition ended with yet another achievement from veteran Tushar Iman. Although he got the opportunity to bat just two overs in Prime Bank South Zone's second innings at the BKSP, he became the highest run-getter in a single season by eclipsing Liton Das's 1232 runs.

As expected, both games ended in draws with a hundred from Nazmul Hossain at Fatullah and a 113-run effort from Shadman Islam at BKSP being the highlights of the day apart from Tushar's unbeaten 12-ball 28 -featuring five fours and one six -- which saw him finish the season with record a 1249 runs.

Tushar, who scored 731 runs in the six matches at an average of 91.37 and also hit two double hundreds, was quite conscious that he was chasing another record. That is why he decided to open the innings and went for the kill, ultimately finishing the job in style.

"It was all about the team effort and that helped clinch the title. We were consistent in our performances," said Jahurul.

Jahurul said that it was not easy to secure results this season as the wickets were

"I am not a hundred per cent sure but maybe the omission of bonus points encouraged teams to draw out the first innings as long as possible for a lead, which ultimately made it difficult to get a result. Overall the standard of the tournament was good but in my opinion it could have been much better had there been

sporting wickets," Jahurul added. At Fatullah, Nasir Hossain assisted Nazmul Hossain with 63, steering North Zone to 295 for 8, at which point they declared. Chasing an improbable 454, East Zone ended at 128 for 3 in 36 overs. Shafiul finished with a match haul of eight wickets.

# 'All I can say is brain-fade'

Bangladesh's endof-day and end-ofsession blues continued yester-

day. Openers Soumya Sarkar and Tamim Iqbal had held off Sri Lanka's opening burst, although both survived chances, and were looking comfortable on Bangladesh's fourth century-plus opening stand.

However, Tamim Iqbal's 'brain-fade' as described by coach Chandika Hathurusingha after stumps, took a bit of the gloss off the effort. The picture grew much duller when Mominul Haque stepped back to a sharp turner from Dilruwan Perera and was trapped in front with six overs to go to the close.

From 118 for no loss Bangladesh ended the second day of the first Test against Sri Lanka in Galle on 133 for two, 361 runs adrift of Sri Lanka's 494 all out. "He [Tamim] hasn't

jovial mood, as both sets of media personnel knew Bangladesh's Sri Lankan coach well. However, he rued the lack of experience in his bowling ranks.


"I am not quite happy with the young bowling attack we have. You take Shakib [Al Hasan] out, the other bowlers have played · 15 Test matches between them.

"I am disappointed in the no-ball [Subashis Roy's no-ball dismissal of Kusal Mendis on the first day], but you can't do anything about it. On a flat wicket, losing the toss and keeping them under 500 is a fairly good effort. Obviously, would have liked to get that wicket; it would have been different."

Despite the end-of-day wickets and the missed opportunity on the first day, Hathurusingha seemed in a confident mood ahead of the third day.

"I would think it's an even day for both teams. There is a long way to go in this Test match. And it's too early to predict something. Getting 133, we are 360-odd runs behind.

"The wicket is still good. The wicket is going to get slower and a little more spin-



friendly and that's a challenge ahead for us."

He was also pleased with the batting of Soumya Sarkar who, after being dropped on four by Dilruwan Perera at gully off Surnaga Lakmal, ended the day unbeaten on 66, his second Test half-century.

"It's up to the batsman to decide how he wants to approach his innings," Hathurusingha said when asked whether Soumya should continue batting the way he did on the second day. "But the way he batted was encouraging, knowing that he is normally a strokemaker and he played according to the situation. The Sri Lankan spinners came back well and pulled our runrate back; that's what they do well here."

In keeping with a more confident Bangladesh team, the coach was bullish about his team's chances. "I'd like 600, if we can," he responded when asked about a safe score. "The first innings is crucial; we are trying to get as close as possible or more than what they have got. I think we are good enough to get over 500, that's what we think. Whatever runs we score tomorrow are going to help us either to win or draw on the fifth day."

## Shakib top in all formats

Bangladesh all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan has overtaken India's Ravichandran Ashwin as the top-ranked player in the International Cricket Council's (ICC's) Test All-Rounder Rankings. The change in the rankings was announced by the ICC through a press release sent yesterday.

Ashwin, who scored 20 runs in his last four innings against Australia, now has 434 rating points while Shakib has 441 and is on top. He received his highest rating, 443, during the recent Test against New Zealand in Christchurch. At the moment, Shakib is rated as the best all-rounder in all three formats of the game according to ICC rankings.

Although the left-hander only managed to take one wicket in the first innings of the ongoing Test between Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, he has had a relatively good time in recent Tests. He scored a double hundred against New Zealand in Wellington and then scored two half-centuries in the next two games. However, while he has been among the wickets column recently, he is yet to record decent bowling figures this year.
