# Govt working to restore golden fibre's glory

Hasina tells National Jute Day programme

Expressing hope that the lost glory of jute will return through the present government's initiatives, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the conspiracies to destroy the jute sector would not work anymore.

She said this while addressing a programme marking National Jute Day at Krishibid Institution in the capital.

The prime minister said, "The fate of country's people, including farmers and workers, is interwoven with it. So, we're giving due importance to it. The golden days of jute will make a comeback."

Hasina said like the export potentials of RMG and ICT sectors, there was also a bright prospect for boosting jute production and its exports through diversified jute products.

Research is necessary for diversification of the use of jute, Hasina said, adding that Bangladesh had also invented "polythene from jute", which would not pollute the environment as it was bio-degradable.

The prime minister said research was now going on to boost the production of jute, increase its diversified use and enhance various area-wise productions.

Hasina regretted that the jute sector had witnessed massive disasters after the assassination of the Father of the Nation in 1975 as most of the jute mills were then sold out at nominal prices.

She said the BNP-Jamaat alliance fulfilled the last episode of the attempt of destroying the jute sector by closing down the biggest Adamjee Jute Mills in 2002. The government has taken various steps to give the sector a new life and reopen the closed jute mills, she said.

Earlier, the prime minister handed over awards to different organisations and individuals in 10 categories for their contributions in advancing the jute sector.

#### IN JAIL FOR OVER DECADE Why under-trial prisoner should not get bail HC asks authorities

The High Court yesterday asked the authorities concerned to explain in 10 days as to why Kamol, who has been in jail for 12 years with his case pending, should not be granted bail.

The court also directed the assistant attorney general of the court to seek report from the public prosecutor of the trial court as to why Kamol was shown fugitive although he was in jail.

The HC bench of Justice Md Rezaul Haque and Justice Muhammad Khurshid Alam Sarkar passed the order after a panel lawyer of Supreme Court Legal Aid Office (SCLAO) drew the court's

attention to the matter. Bahesti Marjan, the penal lawyer of SCLAO, also drew attention to a report of The Daily Star on Kamol, an accused of a double case.

According to the report, although Kamol alias Kamol Khan has been languishing in jail for 12 years, according to the jail authorities, his case documents show he has been

absconding since 2011. Meanwhile, the HC yesterday directed a trial court concerned to complete trial proceeding of Saiful Islam Khokon within

four months, said Marjan. Saiful, 29, is in Comilla jail for the last 10 years with the case against him pending.

On February 14, Marjan drew the court's attention over the current case status of eight prisoners, including Kamol and Saiful, who have been in jail for more than 10 years.

watchdog also conducted an audit on 3,000 registered voters from 100 electoral areas under two city corporations, 20 municipalities and 38 unions and found 90 of them appeared to be dead.


Of the 3,000 registered voters, 55 individuals remained unrecognised while 283 migrated. Of the unrecognised voters, 31 were from urban and 24 from rural areas.

According to the audit, some 3.4 percent voters had their names spelt wrong and 7.9 and 7.1 percent voters had flaws in the spelling of their husband or father's name and their mother's name respectively. The audit team used data of updated voter lists used during different city corporation, municipality and union parishad polls in 2015 and 2016, said EWG Director Abdul Alim. The EWG collected city corporations and municipality lists published by the EC on January 31, 2015 and union parishad lists published on January 31, 2016. The audit is an effort to ensure good governance, enhance the country's democratic process and bring transparency to the electoral system, said EWG

member Numan Ahmed Khan. The EWG also came up with some recommendations such as the EC should conduct special update for correction of voter information; ensure 100 percent presence of field level data collectors, and engage civil society or independent organisations to conduct audit of the electoral roll.

Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu yesterday said the meetings and proceedings of the parliamentary standing committees should be open to public and the wealth accounts of the public representatives should be published to make the right to

information (RTI) more effective. "Not only that; the Election Commission should print the wealth accounts of the public representatives and distribute those among the people," he told a seminar on RTI act and in-depth reporting at Dhaka University's Social Sciences Faculty auditorium. DU Mass Communication and Journalism Alumni Association organised the event with DU Vice-Chancellor Prof

AAMS Arefin Siddique in the chair. Lauding the use of RTI, Inu requested the Information Commission to bring amendments to the law to expand its scope and jurisdiction. He said militants, fundamenamong others, spoke.

talists, bureaucrats and autocrats do not want free flow of information and the RTI is a tool against them.

Chief Information Commissioner Prof Golam Rahman said private hospitals, universities and organisations should be brought under the purview of the RTI act as what he said internal corruption and nontransparency are high in these organisations. He also said the use of the law has not increased as people are not aware of it seven years after its enactment.

### Pry govt headteachers demand grade 10


Head teachers of government primary schools yesterday submitted a memorandum to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina through deputy commissioners of all districts to press home their five-point demand including elevating their entry level salary scale to 10th grade in the national pay scale.

They demanded that the enhanced pay should be given to both the trained and non-trained head teachers with a retrospective effect from March 9, 2014. They submitted the memorandum under the banner of Bangladesh Government Primary School Head Teachers' Association, said SM Sayed Ulla, the association's senior joint secretary. The trained headmasters are getting their pay in the 11th

grade while the non-trained ones in the 12th grade, he said. The head teachers of the state-run primary schools have been staging demonstrations for the last several years over the elevation of their status and pay enhancement.

The teachers said the premier had announced the promotion of government primary school head teachers to second-class gazetted officials on March 9, 2014. But the order is not implemented as the primary and mass education ministry has not published a gazette notification yet.

In Dhaka, the teachers led by Riaz Parvez, president of the association, submitted the memorandum to Mojibor Rahman, assistant deputy commissioner.
