

Yesterday's morning brought renewed hope to the nation as some of the brightest young minds promised to take the country to a new height excelling in education and making the best use of their knowledge.



Bangladesh are a few steps away from creating history in their 100th Test match. That may be a tempting way to see the situation that currently prevails in Colombo before Bangladesh's attempt to take the two Sri Lankan wickets as early as possible today and minimise the hosts'

lead which currently stands at 139 in order to walk away with a share of the spoils in the two-match series, but if they manage to pull it off today, the enormity of the achievement may even exceed the significance of the 100th

From the debacle of the 259-run loss in the first Test, which in turn led to selection confusion, which then led to interference from every quarter that resulted in a pro-

foundly divided touring party before this current Test, Bangladesh are on the cusp of eyeing a Test win against a team they have never beaten before and on a ground which has produced only innings-defeats for them in the past.

That they have gotten to this position, given the context, is impressive. But they

still have to add the finishing touches to prove to themselves, more than anyone, that they have the will to overcome the fifth-day jitters that have afflicted them in all of their recent foreign Tests.
