Govt moves to get UN recognition

At the end of his ruthless massacre and war against an unarmed people, General Amir Abdullah Khan Niazi who led the Pakistan army in the killings, described the genocide of Bangalis in his book "Betrayal of East Pakistan" as "a display of stark cruelty more merciless than the massacres at Bukhara and Baghdad by Chengis Khan and Halaku khan or Jallianwala Bagh by the British General Dyer."

Mosque founder

The founder of a mosque and a madrasa was stabbed from behind while he was offering Maghrib prayers at a mosque in Chittagong's Fatikchhari upazila yesterday evening.

The victim, Hafez Moulana Mohammad Shah Alam Noimi, 57, is the founder of Imam Abu Hanifa Rahmania Jame Mosque and Moinia Sunniya Madrasa in Paindong union of the upazila.

He was receiving treatment at Chittagong Medical College Hospital, police said, adding that he was out of danger.

The attacker, Mohammad Salauddin, aged around 20, is in police custody.

Quoting locals, Abu Yusuf Mia, officer-in-charge of Fatikchhari Police Station, told The Daily Star that Salauddin stabbed Shah Alam from behind while he was offering Maghrib prayers at Imam Abu Hanifa Rahmania Jame Mosque.

9 deals on defence during PM's visit

Dhaka, Delhi expected to sign more than 40 agreements, MoUs in different areas

Two agreements and seven memorandums of understanding on defence cooperation would figure prominently among more than 40 deals expected to be signed between Bangladesh and India during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's Delhi visit next month.

India is likely to commit a new line of credit of around \$4 billion for 20 projects in Bangladesh, say sources at the ministries concerned.

Hasina is all set to embark on a four-day visit from April 7. Delhi's readiness to sign a defence pact with Dhaka remains the centrepiece of all discussions in the run-up to her first state visit to India in seven years.

The two agreements and seven MoUs that are on the cards fall under the defence ministry. They include a "Defence Cooperation Agreement", a technical agreement between the Bangladesh Navy and the Indian Navy, and seven MoUs on issues ranging from enhancing cooperation in the field of "National Security and Strategic Studies" to research.

Though there has been no official disclosure yet on the defence pact, it is being widely reported that India is eager for a comprehensive deal with Bangladesh on defence, while the latter is preferring a MoU to an agreement.

Bangladeshis are happier than Indians and Sri Lankans, according to World Happiness Report 2017 released yesterday coinciding with the United Nations' International Day of Happiness.

Bangladesh ranked 110th among 155 countries surveyed for the report while Sri Lanka and India came in at 120 and 122. Pakistan ranked 80th, Bhutan 97th and Nepal 99th.

Norway is the happiest place on earth, says the report prepared by the Sustainable Development Solutions Network (SDSN), a global initiative launched by the United Nations in 2012.

Bangladesh was in the same position among 157 countries in last year's report, which had Denmark at the top.

Says mother of missing man 'picked up'; Victim Sohel's friend Hanif died in Rab custody after being detained near Ashkona 'suicide blast' scene

It was hard not to be left wanting more as Bangladesh's Test season drew to a close in the best possible fashion - a four-wicket win over Sri Lanka in the country's hundredth Test match at the P Sara Oval in Colombo on Sunday. While there has been much talk about Bangladesh's glut of Tests this season, when taking a wider view seven Tests starting with the two-Test series against England in October 2016 and ending with the two Test series in Sri Lanka can hardly be called a glut, especially as the national team endured a 15-month gap between Tests before October 2016.

But more than a thirst for the longer form, it was Bangladesh's performance in their 100th Test that makes one think that a few more Tests in this vein would have been instructive. All the four away Tests before Sunday's historic triumph in Colombo had one common feature --Bangladesh competing for large parts of Test matches in New Zealand, India and Sri Lanka before the fifth day would see the players washing it all down the drain.
