May no nation experience genocide

President Abdul Hamid hopes for a world of peace as he recalls Pakistani attrocities in 1971

UNB, Dhaka

Bangladesh hopes that no part of the world would experience genocide like Bangladesh did during the Liberation War of 1971, President Abdul Hamid said yesterday.

"We do not want see any genocide or collapse of humanity in the world. We want global peace, freedom and humanity," he said while addressing a tree plantation programme

at Bangabhaban, his official residence. Anti-war crimes campaign group Ekattorer Ghatak Dalal Nirmul Committee organised the planation, marking Genocide

Day yesterday. While inaugurating the programme Hamid recalled the martyrs and genocide victims of Bangladesh and the world.

The Nirmul Committee will plant 30 lakh saplings across the world, including Bangladesh, in memory of as many martyrs of Bangladesh's Liberation War. As part of the programme, 25 saplings were planted

on the premises of Bangabhaban.

The president said this programme would not only recall the brutalities of the Pakistani forces, but also help spread the message across the golobe about the genocide they committed.

He hoped that the "Shaheed Smrity Tree Plantation" would discourage such mass killings both at home and abroad by creating awareness among people all around the world.

About the importance of tree plantation, the president said global climate was changing due to aggressive industrial and energy policy taken by many developed countries, contributing sea-level rise.

Referring to predictions of environmentalists, he said if sea level rise was not checked, one third of Bangladesh, many islands and localities would go under seawater in the next 30-40 years, hoping that the international community will play a more responsible role in checking global warming.

cerned. One of the slum dwellers on condition of anonymity said she cleans the memorial when the authorities ask them to do so before the special days.

Babla Bon mass grave

"Most of the time, it [memorial] remains without care," she said.

Every day, hundreds of people from the city and elsewhere visit the Sreerampur T-groyne area -- a tourist attraction near the mass grave -- to enjoy the beauty of the Padma river. But the memorial hardly attracts any of those visitors as it is left in a neglected state.

A young visitor recently walked over the memorial stone -- oblivious to the presence of the mass grave.

"I didn't know it was a mass grave. I

walked over it on previous occasions too," said the student of Rajshahi Government College, requesting

anonymity. Water Development Board has set up a barbed wire fence to protect a road to the T-groyne, but people have cut the fence adjacent to the memorial to

be able to enter the T-groyne area. The slum dwellers also dry their clothes on the fence, blocking the view of the memorial.

Moreover, a drain carrying raw waste from the slum flows by the memorial and pollutes the air with an overpowering stench -- enough to distract people from paying any attention to the memorial.

US citizens, Australians cautioned UNB, Dhaka

The US Embassy has advised US citizens living here to take appropriate steps to enhance their personal security.

"Be vigilant and take appropriate steps to enhance your personal security," the Embassy said in a security advisory for US citizens posted on its website.

A man was killed when a bomb attached to his waist exploded near a police box close to Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport on Friday evening.

"Please review your personal security plans, remain aware of your surroundings, including local events, and monitor local news stations for updates," the message reads.
