Two militants killed, raid on

One detonated suicide vest when shot by commandos; militants still in hideout with huge stash of explosives

Two militants were killed during the army-led operation inside the terror den at Atia Mahal in Sylhet yesterday, as the raid to take on the terrorists holed up there entered its third day, making it one of the longest anti-terror operations.

However, the operation codenamed "Operation Twilight" was far from over as more militants were believed to be still inside the five-storey apartment.

The Para Commandos are taking time because of the high risk involved as the militants have planted a huge stash of Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) in the building, mostly on the ground floor and the staircase, the army said.

"We have seen that two militants were killed. We assume there might be one or more militants in there," said Brig Gen Fakhru Ahsan, who briefed reporters about the operation in the afternoon yesterday.

"They [militants] are well-trained and equipped," Fakhru said, adding that the terrorists knew well how to make a place inaccessible. "That's why it is taking time to complete the operation."

One of the two militants killed detonated his suicide vest after being shot by the commandos, he added.

Explaining how well-trained the terrorists are, Fakhru said when the commandos charged grenades at the militants, they lobbed those back at the troops. The terrorists also lit fire to protect themselves from teargas.

Police probing dead, injured

Saturday night's Sylhet blasts leave cops scratching heads

Investigators are looking into the conducts of the people who died and were injured in Saturday's twin blasts in Sylhet.

Six people were killed and more than 50 were injured and police are looking into why they were there and their background.

Besides talking to doctors and the injured admitted to Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital, police have kept the bodies of Shahidul Islam and Khadem Shah at the morgue, saying they were collecting information on them.

"Some of the injured and the dead have apparently raised suspicion. We are collecting their addresses, why they were there and if they were residents of Sylhet. We are trying to see if they had any connection [to the attacks]," Additional Commissioner Rokonuddin of Sylhet Metropolitan Police (SMP) told reporters in Shibbari area.

The first of the two bombs went off in Shibbari area around 7:00pm on Saturday, minutes after Brig Gen Fakhru Ahsan finished briefing newsmen on Operation Twilight. The spot was about 400 metres north of Atia Mahal, where militants are holed up. The second blast was

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Joy turns into sorrow

Police inspector Monirul Islam left for his workplace in Sylhet on Saturday morning after attending a family function at his village home in Noakhali.

Little did he know that it would be his last visit to his family home.

He was among the six persons killed in two bomb blasts that evening while army personnel and law enforcers were raiding a militant hideout in Sylhet city's Shibbari area.

His elder brother Abdul Wahab said Monirul, the fourth among seven siblings, came home to attend the wedding ceremony of their younger brother on Thursday night after taking part in a three-day training in the capital.

But the family's joy turned into bereavement when they learnt that Monirul died from his wounds at Ibn Sina Hospital in Sylhet around 2:00am yesterday.

Married in 2010, Monirul left behind his wife Parvin Akhter and an 18-month-old son.

He joined the police as a sub-inspector in 2003 and went to the US the following year for a two-year training on bomb deactivation. Later, he was made an inspector (investigation) at Jalalabad Police Station in Sylhet.

Monirul would be buried at his village home in Noakhali Sadar upazila, reports our correspondent in the district.
