Tigers repay Tharanga

It is generally thought that unless there are extenuating circumstances, it is always better to win

the toss and bat first. The Sinhalese Sports Club ground is a venue where the toss does not much matter, but it was a lucky one to lose yesterday. Before the third ODI between Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, the winner of the toss had lost the match 28 out of 52 times.

It became 29 out of 53 after Bangladesh have won the series as chasing 300 runs in

captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza won the toss and elected to field, which according to Sri Lanka skipper Upul Tharanga would have been the home team's choice. Both captains had thought the grass on the pitch would favour their three seamers early on and the rain forecast for the evening may have swayed the decision too.

In the end, it neither seamed nor rained, and on a belter of a wicket Bangladesh were all out for 210 to lose the match by 70 runs. Sri Lanka avoided the unwanted distinction of being the first team in a decade to go through a home ODI series winless and shared the series 1-1.

"The ball does something here in the first hour or so. We wanted to bowl first as well," said Sri Lanka skipper Upul Tharanga at the post-match press conference yesterday. "It was a good toss to lose in the end. We made the same mistake in Dambulla and this time Bangladesh made the same mistake here."

That gives the series a nice symmetry, reflecting the closeness of the two sides in terms of quality. Bangladesh won the first match by 90 runs and the second was washed out. While Sri Lanka did Bangladesh a favour in the first ODI after winning the toss, in hindsight Bangladesh captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza returned it yesterday.

Even though the series was drawn 1-1, the hosts should feel that they held the edge as they scored 311 before the second ODI was washed out. "[It was] Unfortunate that the second game was rained off. We could

A lot of the credit for yesterday's game should go to Bangladesh's perennial thorn, player-of-the-match Thisara Perera, who hit his second 50 of the series to propel Sri Lanka to 280 after Bangladesh had reined things in from 76 without loss in the first 10 overs to 203 for five after 40.

"We had a very good start and the momentum was lost after the two run outs. But I thought Thisara Perera was exceptional today. He showed a lot of maturity during his knock. He took his time and finished the innings well."

Sri Lanka's fielding has been a source of much ire among locals for most of the tour so far, so the players were determined to prove that they had gotten over the hump in yesterday's match. In the 24th over, Shakib Al Hasan, on 54, was batting untroubled. Off the first ball bowled by Dilruwan Perera, Shakib tried to hit to the left of Danushka Gunathilaka at

'First 10 overs went wrong'

The day before the match, on Friday, Mashrafe had said that the key would be keeping Sri Lanka below 300, and restrict them to 270 or 280. That is exactly what they did; Sri Lanka scored 280 for nine in 50 overs on a good pitch after being 76 for no loss in the first 10 overs.

But in the chase, Bangladesh were reduced to 11 for three with returning swing specialist Nuwan Kulasekara getting rid of Tamim Iqbal and Sabbir Rahman while Suranga Lakmal dispatched Mushfigur Rahim for a first-ball duck.

"If you had asked me before the match, I'd have said I was more than happy to chase 260-

270 on this sort of wicket. They changed their game with the two fast bowlers," Mashrafe said. "It was hard to come back from 11 for three but I think Shakib [Al Hasan] and Soumya [Sarkar] had a chance after getting set. I think Shakib got tired. He was cramping. We didn't get any partnerships after their stand broke."

Mashrafe had also said before the match that executing their plans would be crucial.

"I think our batting and bowling in the first 10 overs went wrong," Mashrafe said. "We were-



n't successful with our plan in the first 10 overs but overall, I think we left a gap of 20 runs which cost us. But I still feel we should have chased down 280."

Mashrafe won the toss for the first time since the New Zealand series in January, but it may have been a toss he would have preferred losing in hindsight. Seeing the grass on the pitch, and with rain forecast, Mashrafe chose to field, but whatever advantage the pitch may have provided was negated by wayward bowling.

"You can say both," Mashrafe said when asked whether it was the grass on the pitch or the possibility of rain that made him want to field first. "When we played the practice match, we understood that in Colombo the wicket becomes flatter in the second half. They perhaps made 20 runs too much, but if you followed [Mehedi Hasan] Miraz's batting you could see clearly that the wicket didn't have anything. Perhaps the new balls swung from both ends but if Soumya and Shakib could have dragged on their partnership a

bit further and if the next two batsmen could have made bigger contributions, we could have won the game.

"I don't know if it was nervousness [in the first ten overs]," Mashrafe said when asked about the run haemorrhage in the first 10. "We used five bowlers during that period. We were not as disciplined as we were in the first two games. I think we tried a few more things


because we weren't getting what we wanted early on. We didn't judge the wicket properly in regards to our areas.

An ODI series draw in Sri Lanka is still a good result, but what will rankle a team that has started to take pride in their execution of plans is that yesterday, they failed to execute most of them.

"The whole team is disappointed. It is true that it doesn't end here. We have a lot of cricket coming up in Ireland and then we have the Champions Trophy."

The 27-year-old used his powerful wrists to good effect to swat the bowlers around with a 40ball 52. The innings helped catapult the hosts to 280, and more importantly gave them a shot in the arm.

Hassan prescribes 10-day rest for Fizz before IPL

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan told reporters at the Sinhalese Sports Club in Colombo yesterday that

Mustafizur Rahman would be able to play in the Indian Premier League 'if he wants to' but that it will only be after 10 days' rest at home after the tour of Sri Lanka ends.

Speculation over Bangladesh fast bowler Mustafizur's participation in the IPL was drummed up on Thursday by Indian online news outlet Sportstar, who quoted Mustafizur as saying: "I don't think I will be able to make it for the tournament this time around."

Mustafizur himself told Bangladesh reporters during team practice on Monday that he was called by an Indian reporter at his hotel room through the hotel intercom on the evening of March 30, and that all he said was that he was not able to say either way if or when he would be playing in the IPL as it was the board's decision, and he could not say anything before the current tour ends.

"If Mustafizur is really eager, then of course, he will be allowed to play the IPL," said Hassan. "You have seen that he still has not regained full effectiveness after returning from injury. And he has been bowling non-stop on this tour, first in the Tests and then in the ODIs.

"In fact, all the players need 10 days of rest after this tour," continued Hassan. "That is why we have pushed back the Dhaka Premier League by five days."

Hassan added that since there is a tri-series in Ireland starting on May 12, Mustafizur's stint with defending Champions Sunrisers Hyderabad would be a truncated one anyway.
