Bags promise banana boost

Farmers eye spotless chemical-free bananas for export

For a long time the banana plantations in Rajshahi and Chapainawabganj have relied on pesticides. Now, ecofriendly bags to protect the ripening fruit promise to revolutionise the industry and make chemical-free bananas the marketplace standard. Moreover, the new 'safe' bananas open the door to exports.

"Most bananas [skins] are full of spots, which indicates chemical use," says senior scientific officer from the regional horticulture research station in Chapainawabganj, Sorof Uddin. "In many cases, immature bananas are ripened in shady trenches using smoke and harmful carbide." The scientist has long been seeking a healthier production alternative.

During his three-year stay in China as part of his PhD study, Sorof observed a bagging method to produce safe fruit. Polythene-paper bags are used to cover the fruit as it ripens, offering protection from strong sunshine, rain, fog and pest attack without the need for chemicals. From 2015, after his return to Bangladesh, Sorof worked to popularise the idea among mango growers. He also had an eye on the banana industry. Sorof hoped to find banana-growers willing to give the new system a try. In 36-year-old pesticide trader Sujammel Haque, Sorof

found an unlikely ally. Sujammel owns two pesticide shops in Baya market of Poba upazila in Rajshahi. Selling pesticides is the mainstay of his livelihood but the inherited business has never pleased him.

Sujammel's nephew Momin who works in one of the shops said, "My uncle says pesticides are killing us.

"He says commercial bananas are laced with chemicals and he's always wished for an alternative."

Women rebuilt Rwanda from ashes of genocide

Lawmaker Gakuba shares her thoughts with The Baily Star

The twilight on April 6 in 1994 appeared darker than the night in Rwanda.

A plane carrying the then presidents of Rwanda and Burundi was shot down over Kigali, the country's capital, leaving no survivors.

It could not be known who were responsible. But within an hour, the presidential guards together with the members of the Rwandan armed forces and Hutu militia groups set up roadblocks and barricades and began slaughtering the Tutsis and moderate Hutus with impunity. Among the first victims of the massacre was the then Hutu prime minister who was killed the next day.

An estimated one million Rwandan men, women and children were killed by their fellow citizens only in three months between April and July in 1994.

The country's social, economic and political institutions were wiped out by the genocide. Rwanda plunged into a deep crisis.

A different chapter of the country's history then began in 1998 as Vice President of Rwandan Senate,

Rescuers race to reach survivors

Death toll tops 254; hundreds missing; state of emergency declared to speed up aid ops

A grim search for the missing resumed at dawn yesterday in southern Colombia after surging rivers sent an avalanche of floodwaters, mud and debris through a small city, killing around 254 people and leaving many more injured and homeless.

People pried through piles of rocks and wooden planks that entombed homes. Streets were covered in thick sand, mud and tree limbs from the rivers and rainforest that surround the town of Mocoa.

At the Vatican, Pope Francis said he was "profoundly saddened" by the disaster, which struck the town with little warning late Friday after days of torrential rains that caused flooding of three area rivers.

"I pray for the victims and want to assure those who weep for the missing of my closeness to them," the pope said in a

The Colombian army said in a statement that 254 people were killed, 400 people had been injured and 200 were missing. More than 1,100 soldiers and police officers were called in to help dig people out in 17 affected neighborhoods, reported Reuters.

The Pacific rim of South America has been hard hit in recent months by floods and mudslides, with scores killed in Peru and Ecuador as well.

President Juan Manuel Santos was scheduled to return to Mocoa yesterday along with cabinet ministers to supervise rescue efforts in the heavily forested region.
