The Inter-Parliamentary Union has made a clarion call to parliaments across the globe to take measures to protect the political system from influence of money and organised lobbies.

In a communiqué issued at the end of a five-day conference in Dhaka yesterday, the IPU urged measures to enhance transparency and strengthen anti-corruption legislation.

It emphasised ensuring effective limits to private funding of candidates and political parties.

The IPU, a forum of parliaments around the globe, made the call amid ongoing

discussions worldwide stressing the necessity of curbing influence of money in politics. Undue influence of money has long been blamed for manipulation of elections, corruption in politics and undermining of democracy.

Political analysts and many watchdogs have been saying that private funding of candidates and political parties is giving rise to corruption. And those who donate money to election funds for candidates and parties control them in many ways.

Residents in the capital suffered yesterday after moderate rainfall took the city under ankle to kneedeep water.

It was mostly a cloudy day before the downpour began around 4:00pm and continued for over an hour.

Roads, lanes, and bylanes in Green Road, Tejturi Bazar, Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue and other low-lying areas were inundated. Many places were submerged by knee-deep water, once again exposing the poor drainage system in the city.

According to the Met office, the capital faced 33 millimetre rain from 3:00pm to 6:00pm.

Commuters suffered mostly because motor vehicles and rickshaws were not available in many parts of the city due to the rain, while many roads saw severe traffic congestion as major portions of them were under water.

Bangladesh have shared the Test series against Sri Lanka. They also shared the ODI series against the Lankans. And today the Tigers will get an opportunity to make

To achieve that the Tigers are already motivated enough at least to give a fitting farewell to their inspirational captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, who will walk in the middle to play his final T20I. Bangladesh lost the first T20I by six wick-

ets at the same venue on Tuesday, the day when Mashrafe announced his retirement from the shortest format of the game. The 34-year-old took two wickets in that game but his effort was not enough to prevent a big defeat in a format which has been the weak-link for the Tigers. They got a start despite losing opener Tamim Iqbal early. But their inability to construct a T20 innings was once again exposed after the dismissal of Sabbir Rahman - who was undone by a brilliant direct hit. His dismissal not only dried up the runs but also

Today could be a tough day for city dwellers, especially HSC examinees, as two streets would be off limits to traffic and there would be diversions at 25 intersections centring the Bangladesh Islamic Foundation's (BIF) rally at Suhrawardy Udyan.

Around 3,000 buses with thousands of BIF officials, staff, imams and Olamas would be converging in the capital from across the country for the 3:00pm rally.

Such a large number of vehicles entering the capital and parked inside the city might trigger standstill traffic on major thoroughfares today and on top of this, there would be VVIP movements, which could make matters worse.

Against this backdrop, the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) asked people to avoid going to some shopping arcades -- Bashundhara City, New Market, Gawcia Market and markets on Elephant Road -- and getting their cars out near the venue.

Some officials of the education ministry recommended HSC examinees head out for their exam halls a few hours early.

Bangladesh 3-notch up

Progress made in some socioeconomic areas, including life expectancy, per capita income

Bangladesh moved up three spots and ranked 139th out of 188 countries in Global Human Development Index 2015 due to the remarkable progress it has made in many socioeconomic areas, including life expectancy and per capita income.

According to Human Development Report (HDR) 2016 released in Dhaka yesterday, Bangladesh is categorised as "medium human development" country, and achieved an HDI value of 0.579 in 2015.

The General Economics Division of the Planning Commission and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Bangladesh jointly organised the launching of HDR 2016 in Dhaka following the global launch in Stockholm, Sweden, less than two weeks ago.

Bangladesh maintained a higher average annual HDI growth rate -- 1.64 percent -- from 1990 to 2015, compared to all other South Asian countries, including India (1.52 percent), according to the report.

Despite the country's growing progress, Bangladesh is still fifth among South Asian nations in HDR rankings. Sri Lanka ranked 73rd, the Maldives 105th, India 131st, Bhutan 132nd, Nepal 144th and Pakistan 147th. Norway topped the list while Central African Republic

was at the bottom.
