A Test cricket great to retire

Veteran Pakistan batsman and former captain Younis Khan announced on Saturday he will retire from international cricket after the upcoming Test series in the West Indies.

The 39 year-old has captained Pakistan in all three formats, and in 2009 led them to their only World Twenty20 title in England.

"I will be retiring... with my head held high," he told a press conference in Karachi. "I think this is the right time as every sportsman has to take this decision in his career."

Younis hit a hundred in his first Test against Sri Lanka in Rawalpindi in 2000, which started a glorious career during which he also scored a double hundred in Pakistan's series-levelling win against India at Bangalore in 2005.

He needs only 23 runs to reach 10,000 Test runs, a milestone he missed out on after his team's disastrous tour of Australia in January this year, when Pakistan lost all three Tests.

He has scored 34 Test centuries in 115 matches -- the most by any Pakistani batsman -- and is set to become the first Pakistani and 13th batsman overall to score 10,000 or more.

"I was planning this for few months," he said, but added that he "always tried to play for my team and for my country". One of the worst moments of Younis'

career was when Pakistan lost their coach Bob Woolmer during the 2007 World Cup in West Indies, he said.

Younis is the second high-profile player to retire this month after his team mate Misbah-ul-Haq also announced his decision to quit on Thursday following months of speculation.

Former Pakistan captain Wasim Akram paid rich tribute to Younis.

"He is still fit but there is always a time

when you have to decide about leaving," said Wasim. "He has set many records which prove his greatness. Whenever he played he played with his heart and commitment.

"It will be tough to replace players like Younis and Misbah, so Pakistan will have to work hard in Tests without them."

Maxwell fires Punjab to win



Captain Glenn Maxwell led from the front with a quickfire knock to fashion a sixwicket win for Kings XI Punjab in their Indian Premier League opener against Rising Pune Supergiant here today.

Maxwell made short work of the 164-run target by blasting 44 off just 20 balls as Kings XI cruised to victory with six balls to spare.

His unbeaten 79-run stand with David Miller (30 off 27) took the game away from the opposition in front of a packed Holkar Stadium. Maxwell's fireworks came after Ben Stokes led Rising

Pune Supergiant's recovery with a blistering 50 off 32 balls, helping his team post 163 for six. With the win, Kings XI have begun the competition on a

promising note after finishing at the bottom in the previous two editions. It was the first loss this season for Pune, who had beaten Mumbai Indians in their tournament opener on Thursday.

With Kings XI 73 for two in 10 overs and needing another 91

for victory, the match was hanging in balance. Then Maxwell came and ran away with the match with some brutal hitting. The Australian, made captain of the side ahead of established names like Eoin Morgan, hammered four sixes and as

"I think he was happy about losing the bet. But generally Nikki Lauda is not happy about losing money overall," Wolff said, prompting laughs.

"I think he thought, either I win money or I am happy about being on pole. So it was a win-win situation for him." "I said 'give me the 10 Euros. I will spend it all tonight." Mercedes, the defending

constructors' champions, hope to avenge the surprise defeat handed to Hamilton by Sebastian Vettel and Ferrari in the season opener in Melbourne. Lauda earlier told Sky

Sports that he bet on Vettel for the pole because "he really looked quick in the car, everything was right."

"But Lewis, thank God, pulled out one of his special laps," he was quoted saying.

Finest Caribbean one-day moment

If you are a West Indian fan and took the trouble of staying up late in front of your television in the early hours on Saturday, it was worth the time. It is for the fact

that a non-descript West Indies side have done something extraordinary that their big name predecessors or the current highprofile cricketers, presently featuring in the money-spinning IPL, had not done it before.

They toppled Pakistan's 308 to win the first one-day international by four wickets at the National Stadium in Guyana and thus created a small piece of history. The successful chase meant that the Caribbeans, now languishing at number nine in the one-day rankings, toppled a 300-plus target for the first time ever following previous 31 failed attempts over a 44-year period.

Jason Mohammed was the hero of the match with a scintillating unbeaten 91 off 58 balls as the home side reached the target with an over to spare. The right-hander came into the match on the back of three consecutive half centuries. But his fourth one was special. He turned the tide when Pakistan, with a high-profile bowling line-up which was bolstered by the introduction of sensational young leg-spinner Shadab Khan, appeared to have been running away with a victory.

Mohammed may be small in stature; he may not be muscular. But his clean-hitting against the likes of Mohammad Amir and Wahab Riaz was something to behold. He kept the scoreboard ticking when wickets fell at the other end. The decisive flip in the match came when Ashley Nurse walked in to the middle after the departure of West Indies captain Jason Holder, who perished at long-off while trying to hit Shadab out of the ground for a second successive six.

That was a situation from where West Indies have lost so many games before. But with 49 required off 33 deliveries and Mohammed hitting the length ball to the distance or smashing an Amir bouncer for six over long-on, Nurse

turned the fear into the Pakistan camp when he picked up a leg-spinner from Shadab outside the off-stump for a massive six over mid-wicket. It was also a game when Mohammed-Nurse pair shunned the flamboyance as the equation came down to 17-off 15 balls.

Mohammed struck 11 fours and three sixes in his magnificent knock while Nurse's explosive 15-ball 34 contained five fours and six.

"I knew it was going to be difficult against Shadab," Mohammed said after receiving the man of the match award.

"I decided to go after the fast bowlers and where to hit them. That clear thinking paid off today."

Pakistan captain Sarfraz Ahmed said he was disappointed with the way they bowled at the end, reflecting on the first time Pakistan have

failed to defend a total in excess of 300 outside of sub-continent.

"Jason batted brilliantly but we need to come

back stronger for the second match on Sunday," Sarfraz said. Both teams are battling for important ranking

points to confirm automatic qualification for the 2019 World Cup in England as one of the top eight teams by the cut-off date of September 30 this year.
