Park complains against Hamid

South Korean swimming coach Park Tae Gun yesterday brought allegations of non-cooperation against

local coach Abdul Hamid regarding preparation for next month's 4th Islamic Solidarity Games which will be held in Azerbaijan from May 12 to 22.

Six swimmers -- SA Games gold medallist Mahfuza Khatun Shila, Nazma Khatun, Romana Akter, Naima Akter, Jewel Ahmed and Ariful Islam - have been training under Park and Hamid since January 10 after the South Korean convinced Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) to increase the number of swimmers from two to six.

"It is not possible for me to do everything alone and I can't develop swimmers on my own," Park told reporters yesterday. "Hamid is an Olympic coach like me but he is not helping me in training."

Park also complained that the federation Saturday," Hamid defended himself.

is not responding regarding re-arrangement of accommodation of the swimmers, who have to spend their nights at the dormitory of the swimming pool amid scorching heat.

It has been learnt that Hamid, who is a joint secretary of Bangladesh Swimming Federation, spends whole day reading newspapers and doing other things instead of maintaining schedules of the swimmers.

Besides, Hamid, who once termed gold medal winner Shila as 'a Muktijoddha quota player,' is allegedly demoralising the swimmers saying 'It is impossible to win medals" in the Islamic Solidarity Games.

Having denied the allegation, Hamid said, "I don't have any work other than training. My job is to train the swimmers. And I did not say anything that can demoralise them.

"However, he [Park] may have complaints regarding accommodation but I don't have any hand in that matter. The federation will take a decision on it on

Outgoing Barcelona coach Luis Enrique turned on his misfiring stars after "reliving a nightmare" with his side's 3-0 humbling by

Juventus in the first leg of their Champions League quarterfinal. Barca produced the biggest

Champions League comeback of all time in the last 16, overturning a 4-0 first leg deficit by scoring three times in a crazy final 10 minutes to beat the French champions 6-1. However, a downcast and visibly angry Enrique said he found it "harder to

believe in a comeback" than even the night in Paris that precipitated his decision to step down at the end of the season eight weeks ago. "The first-half was a disaster, like it was

the third half of the PSG game," said Enrique, who then took an out of character shot at the Barca players' attitude. "I haven't been able to transmit my

ideas well to my players because that was nothing like what I asked for. I feel very sad and impotent. What we saw was very serious.

"The positioning with the ball is my responsibility, but without it the intensity has to be different."

Enrique was filmed banging a table in his dugout in anger after watching a replay of Pablo Dybala's second goal in the first 22 minutes. In a recurring theme of Barca's season

Giorgio Chiellini then exposed a weakness from set-pieces to add Juventus' third just after half-time.

"Crucified," ran the headline of Barca daily Sport alongside a picture of Enrique.

Enrique's announcement that he would not be renewing his contract a week after defeat in Paris appeared to have released the bubbling tension between players and coach as Barca's improved form provoked dreams of the possibility of a second treble in three seasons under the Asturian coach.

Indeed, after Saturday's 1-1 draw between Real Madrid and Atletico Madrid, Barca had the La Liga title race back in their own hands.

However, they kicked off a disastrous three days with a shock 2-0 defeat at Malaga to once again hand Real the initiative in the title race in which Neymar saw his first red card for the club. And the Brazilian's sarcastic applause of


the officials as he left the field has seen him hit with a three-match ban, meaning he will miss next weekend's potential title decider with Real at the Santiago Bernabeu. Barca's hopes of a third straight

Spanish title depend on winning that match, but defeat in Turin was just a continuation of the Catalans' poor away form this season. They have now been beaten five times

on the road in 2017 and have conceded at least three goals in three of their last four Champions League games away from home. Producing another remarkable comeback against a Juventus defence that has

conceded just twice in seven Champions League games this season seems even more unlikely than Barca's historic feat against PSG.

Yet, as bad as they have been away from the Camp Nou, the force of nearly 100,000 fans and a front three of Lionel Messi, Luis Suarez and Neymar means Juventus will not relish their trip to

Dortmund fans opened their doors to stranded Monaco rivals in a heartwarming show of solidarity after the

Borussia Dortmund team bus attack. But many Monaco supporters still

ended up sleeping in their cars after the attack which forced the postponement of the Champions League quarterfinal between the two sides. The game was held up for 24 hours

as a precaution after three explosions hit the Dortmund team bus, injuring defender Marc Bartra. Many Monaco supporters, who had

planned to travel back to France after the game, found they had nowhere to sleep when the game was postponed.

The Monaco contingent of about 3,000 were praised for their gesture in chanting "Dortmund, Dortmund" after the attack was announced in the stadium.

And a heart-warming spontaneous initiative from Dortmund fans meant many found a place to sleep for the night under the Twitter hashtag #bedforawayfans.

"We have received solidarity across a wide range of society," Dortmund

broadcaster ZDF. "Dortmund fans were ready to go to

the Monaco fans to offer help," he added, revealing a friend of his had spontaneously offered to accommodate ten away fans. Borussia Dortmund's official

account promoted the initiative to "Dear supporters of AS Monaco". Several Dortmund fans posted pictures of themselves at home with relieved Monaco supporters. "It is self-evident, if we were stranded

somewhere abroad, we would have also wanted to have some accommodation made possible," Dortmund fan Renke Reichler told Munich-based paper Sueddeutsche Zeitung. Reichler and his wife took in five

Monaco fans for the night.

"We wanted to offer them a classic German beer, but they are Muslims and don't drink anything," he said, before adding the ice was quickly broken.

The couple have been invited to Lille as a thank you.

The Monaco chants of support and the free beds received a lot of praise.

"I was proud of the solidarity shown by the red and white fans," Pascal Pedro, a Monaco fan "for more than 40

years", told AFP. Former Arsenal and England striker

Bartra has wrist surgery

Spain international Marc Bartra underwent wrist surgery on Tuesday after being injured when the Borussia Dortmund team bus was rocked by a series of explosions that forced the postponement of their Champions League match against Monaco.

Dortmund's press spokesman confirmed the 26-year-old Bartra needed an operation on his right wrist. "Marc Bartra will be

operated on, he has broken the radius (bone) in his right wrist and there are foreign bodies in the arm," said Sascha Fligge. "The Borussia family has

shown that we close ranks in difficult times and that's what we also want to do for Marc." A police spokesman con-

firmed that Bartra's status had been changed from 'lightly' to 'badly injured'. Fligge said that with

Dortmund scheduled to play Bayer Leverkusen in the Bundesliga on Saturday, before next Wednesday's return leg at Monaco, there was no alternative but to reschedule the first leg for Wednesday.

The Dortmund spokesman also confirmed the team bus had strengthened glass in its windows, but the force of the blasts still shattered several panes.
