EMBANKMENTS IN HAORS

Projects turn into plights

DWOHA CHOWDHURY, back from Sunamganj

Ashik Miah, a 45-year-old farmer of Jaladhartupi village, was staring helplessly at his inundated paddy field as he sat beside Dekhar Haor at Dakshin Sunamganj upazila.

"I cultivated Boro on around one hectare of land taking loans from a local lender. But the flash flood washed away all my investment. How will I repay the loan and where will I stand with my family now?" lamented Ashik.

He was talking about his miseries when he threw a desperate glance at this correspondent and asked, "Who is responsible for the loss?"

Like Ashik Miah, 70-year-old farmer Rashid Miah, Rahim Uddin, Abdul Khalik and many others of Sunamganj experienced the same fate. Most of them had borrowed money either from local lenders or from different nongovernment organisations.

As they have lost their lone crop, their annual earning, the farmers can now see only a bleak future ahead.

Some of them have tried in vain to harvest the underwater crops dipping into waist-deep water. Most of them eventually found that the water level was much deeper than what they had anticipated.

Boro, the only crop of the haor areas in Sunamganj, has submerged due to untimely heavy rain followed by the flash flood that hit the areas on March 27, around 15 to 20 days before the harvest.

Though the government has taken an initiative to implement several projects of re-sectioning submersible embankments and repairing the damaged ones through the Water Development Board (WDB), the contractors who got the work allegedly did not deliver.

Vogue model's body to be exhumed

A Rajshahi court yesterday ordered the Criminal Investigation Department to exhume the body of Raudha Athif for a second autopsy.

Metropolitan Magistrate Mahbubur Rahman passed the order to exhume the body in presence of an additional district magistrate after hearing a petition filed by CID Inspector Asmaul Hoque on Monday.

"We will fix a date for exhuming the body after we can arrange the formation of a medical board and ensure presence of the magistrate," Asmaul, also the investigation officer of the case, told The Daily Star.

Cruel twist of fate

Man from Gazipur dies near Petrapole border while bringing back son's body from Indian hospital; shell-shocked wife returns home with son's body, now waits for husband's body

In a tragic turn of events, a father died on Monday, failing to bear the pain of his only son's premature demise in a Kolkata hospital the day before.

Twelve-year-old Asad Mondal, son of Mohammad Rafiq, 45, and Asma Bibi, 35, of Gobindabari village in Kashimpur union of Gazipur, had been suffering from blood cancer for about five months.

After primary investigations, he was admitted to the National Institute of Chest Diseases and Hospital (NIDCH) in Dhaka where he underwent

treatment for nearly two months. With no progress, his parents decided to take him to India and they reached Kolkata on April 15. He was admitted to Renaissance Hospital in Teghoria there.

"Shockingly, he [Asad] died the next day [Sunday],"

Asad's uncle Amirul Islam told The Daily Star

On Monday, Rafiq and Asma were bringing back the body of their son in a microbus. As they were approaching Petrapole border, Rafiq fell unconscious several times, relatives said.

EC to open talks with parties in July

ROADMAP TO JS POLLS

Election Commission will hold dialogues with political parties from July in order to make the next parliamentary polls a participatory one, according to a draft roadmap prepared by the EC Secretariat.

The draft roadmap stipulates amendment to electoral laws and rules and demarcation of the constituencies between August and December this year, EC sources said.

"We submitted the draft roadmap to the EC on April 8 for a review," EC Secretary Muhammad Abdullah told The Daily Star.

New political parties will be able to register with the commission between November this year and March next year, EC officials said.

The EC will issue public notifications seeking application for registration of new political parties.

The draft roadmap has 22 major points regarding the next parliamentary polls scheduled for early 2019, Muhammad Abdullah added.

Canadian river vanishes in 4 days

Scientists have witnessed the first modern case of what they call "river piracy" and they blame global warming. Most of the water gushing from a large glacier in northwest Canada last year suddenly switched from one river to another.

That changed the Slims River from a 10-foot (3 meters) deep, raging river to something so shallow that it barely was above a scientist's high top sneakers at midstream. The melt from the Yukon's Kaskawulsh glacier now flows mostly into the Alsek River and ends up in the Pacific Ocean instead of the Arctic's Bering Sea.

US VP reassures Japan; Mattis pledges to work with China to reduce tensions in Korean peninsula

US Vice President Mike Pence reiterated his country's commitment to the security of Japan yesterday, as North Korea intensified concerns over its weapons programme with a vow to launch missile tests "every week".

The North, which is intent on developing a nuclear-tipped ballistic missile capable of reaching the mainland United States, defied international pressure Sunday with a test that failed immediately after launch. As fears grow that it may also be preparing
