# 'Neo JMB' made bombs there

Police claim as operation 'Southpaw' ends

The Jhenidah den that counterterrorism officials busted on Friday was a "Neo JMB" bomb-making factory from where explosives were supplied to other dens of the militant group, officials say.

Top "Neo JMB" leaders used to visit the factory, a two-room tin-shed house in the district's Porahati village. Key militants like Maynul Islam Musa, Sohel Mahfuz and Hasidur Rahman Sagor often held operational meetings there, according to investigators.

Musa is suspected to have been killed in a recent drive by law enforcers in Sylhet while two others are still at large.

Sohel is a former member of Majlis-e-Shura of mainstream JMB and Sagor is also an ex-leader of the outfit. The duo played an important role in supplying grenades and firearms to the offshoot -- "Neo JMB" as called by law enforcers -- for carrying out the Gulshan café attack last year.

Besides, Sohel is an uncle of top militant Nurul Islam Marzan and Sagor is Marzan's brother-in-law, investigators added.

Allegedly the operational commander of the Gulshan attack, Marzan was killed in a "shootout" on January 6 this year.

"Police detected the den after analysing communication devices recovered from the outfit's Chittagong hideout busted last month" Proloy Kumar Joarder, deputy commissioner of the Counter Terrorism and Transnational Crime (CTTC) unit of DMP, told The Daily Star. "But the militants managed to flee before the operation."

Proloy said it was the "biggest" bomb-making factory they have ever busted. From there, they recovered a large number of handmade detonators, a pressure cooker bomb and a 7.65mm pistol along with papers related to its purchase. Police also found 20 containers each having capacity of 30 litres -- all full of hydrogen peroxide.

The pressure cooker bomb was defused, said an official, adding its manufacturing technique was unique and it could be used as a time bomb.

Sanowar Hossain, additional deputy commissioner of the bomb disposal unit of CTTC unit, told this newspaper that 500 to 1,000 bombs the size of a grenade could be manufactured with the seized chemical.

# France votes today as far-right surges

Security tightened; terror attack to boost Le Pen as focus shifts from jobs and economy

France was on edge yesterday on the eve of its most unpredictable presidential election in decades, which will take place under heightened security after the jihadist killing of a policeman giving a boost to far-right camp.

The Islamic State-claimed slaying of the officer on Paris's Champs Elysees avenue thrust questions of security to the fore of campaigning after nine months of relative calm.

Nearly a quarter of voters are still undecided, and surveys showed until now the French to be more concerned about jobs and the economy than

terrorism. But analysts warned Thursday's shooting could change that. The top two vote getters in today's tight, four-way contest will head to a run-off on May 7.

Authorities in Paris have offered additional guards for hundreds of polling stations in the capital, which will come on top of an already major security plan across the country.

"An extra guard or reinforcement of staff will be provided to any polling station that needs it, " Paris town hall official Colombe Brossel said.

Around 50,000 police and 7,000 soldiers will be deployed today to protect voters around France. Voters headed to the polls yesterday in many of France's overseas territo-

ries like Martinique and Guadeloupe in the Caribbean, as well as in the US. France was still shaken two days after 39-year-old gunman Karim Cheurfi shot dead a police officer and wounded two others before being killed, in an attack that sent tourists on the Champs Elysees rushing for cover.

Far-right leader Marine Le Pen moved quickly to present herself as the strongest defender against Islamist radicals in a country under a state of emergency since a string of terror attacks that began in 2015, which have MORE ON PAGE 8 SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

Chhatra Parishad's (PCP) Rangamati unit. It remains unclear how the visually impaired youth died after army picked him up on the morning of April 5 from

Naniarchar Bazar. The circumstances of his funeral also remain shrouded in mystery, as different organisations, including PCP and several leftist student bodies continue to demonstrate in the capital and Rangamati.

Romel was picked up by the army in connection with two cases filed over torching a truck and looting two buses, Lt Col Mohammad Rashidul Hasan, director of ISPR, told The Daily Star over the phone yesterday.

They handed Romel over to the Naniarchar police the same day, said the Inter Service Public Relations Directorate (ISPR) official, adding that the young man died on April 19 at Chittagong Medical College Hospital where he was being treated in police custody.

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## Court dismisses case no one understands

Anyone dealing with India's overburdened legal system knows that the wheels of justice move slowly. But in one case, they have ground to a halt com-

pletely after Supreme Court judges said they were throwing out a lawsuit that used so much jargon it was incomprehensible.

"We will have to set it aside because one cannot understand this," the Hindustan Times daily quoted MB Lokur and Deepak Gupta as saying on Wednesday. Even the lawyers representing the two sides in

the row between a landlord and his tenant said they were unable to understand the original order issued by a lower court.

Mother fish spawn in rain

Spawn collectors were all smiles as indigenous freshwater fish released eggs in the Halda river yesterday. Heavy rain accompanied

by thunderbolt since Friday morning and strong current in the river had created a favourable atmosphere for mother fish to release spawn. The Halda is the coun-

try's largest natural breeding ground for indigenous carp, including ruhi, katol, mrigel and kalbaush. The carps usually release
