### BNP will come back strong after leaders' nationwide tours

Fakhrul tells reporters after meeting with chiefs of 51 teams STAFF CORRESPONDENT

BNP will come back as a strong unit once 51 organisational teams led by senior and central leaders conclude their countrywide

BNP secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir told this to reporters emerging from a meeting with the chiefs of the teams at the party's Naya Paltan central office. The teams, however, had

started their 15-day visit to the party's 75 organisational districts on April 22, said Fakhrul, adding that the teams were formed as per the decision of the party's standing committee. The tour will conclude on May 7.

"The 51 teams will go to our all 75 organisational districts to hold formal and informal meetings with grassroots leaders and activists, and give them necessary directives to reinforce the party activities," Fakhrul said.

Besides, the teams will work to eradicate internal conflicts and misunderstandings among the party men, said the party insid-

The teams will also give the district leaders directives to simultaneously take preparation for participating in the next general election, likely to be held in January 2019, and waging a tougher movement to force the government hold the polls under a neutral administration.

As the election to six city corporations -- Rajshahi, Sylhet, Khulna, Barisal, Gazipur and Rangpur -- are likely to be held in mid-June next year, the teams will take special care of those city units to ensure BNP's success using the strategy it used in Comilla city polls, the insiders

added.

When it comes to addressing the waterlogging problem in Dhaka city, Wasa is a "failed organisation", said Dhaka South City Corporation Mayor Sayeed Khokon yesterday.

"Wasa is not working properly to solve the waterlogging problem. Rather, they are busy with projects involving hundreds of crores of taka," he said

while speaking at the inaugural ceremony of "Dhaka Uthshab-2017"at TSC of Dhaka University. Dhaka Debating Society organised the programme.

The mayor said it is necessary to merge Wasa (Water Supply and Sewerage Authority) with the two city corporations in Dhaka or change its leadership to solve the crisis.

Though it is the duty of Wasa to address the problem, Khokon said, they are not paying attention to it.

"This cannot go on. We want a proper management in Wasa as there is no alternative," the mayor said.

### Maitree Express travel time to come down to six hours

The passengers who travel by Maitree Express will soon enjoy direct journeys on Dhaka-Kolkata-Dhaka route that will cut down travel time from the existing nine hours to about six hours.

The nonstop service of Maitree Express, launched in 2008, is expected to begin from August next, a diplomatic source told the

news agency. This will bring an end to a longstanding grievance of passengers travelling by Maitree Express, who have to get down both at Darshana and Gede stations, said Indian High Commissioner in Dhaka Harsh Vardhan Shringla.

# 560 model mosque project approved

Ecnec also okays 12 other projects

UNB, Dhaka

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) yesterday approved the construction of 560 model mosques-cum-Islamic cultural centres at district and upazila levels with an estimated cost of Tk 9,062.41 crore.

The approval came from the weekly Ecnec meeting in the NEC conference room in the city with Ecnec Chairperson and Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

Briefing reporters after the meeting, Planning Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal said a total of 13 projects were approved today involving an overall estimated cost of Tk 20,402.75 crore.

Of the approved 13 projects, 11 are new while two are revised ones.

The planning minister said Bangladesh Islamic Foundation under the Ministry of Religious Affairs will implement the con-

struction of some 560 mosques-cum-

Islamic cultural centres by December 2019.

Of the total project cost of Tk 9062.41 crore, the government will provide Tk 892.62 crore while the rest Tk 8,169.79 crore will come as grant from Saudi Arabia.

The Ecnec meeting also approved the Introduction of 3G Technology and Extension of 2.5G Network of State-run Teletalk with an estimated cost of Tk 675 crore to be entirely borne by the government.

The meeting also gave nod to the establishment of IT/Hi-tech park (in 12 districts) involving an estimated cost of Tk 1,796.40 crore to be completed by June 2020.

The Bangladesh Hi-tech Park Authority under the ICT Division will implement the project at Kuet in Khulna, Barisal Sadar, Rangpur Sadar, Chittagong Port, Lalmai in Comilla, Ramu in Cox's Bazar, Mymensingh Sadar, Jamalpur Sadar, Singra in Natore,

## Janata Bank test question leaked Allege a group of candidates, demand scrapping of exam

A two-day ultimatum was issued yesterday by a group of jobseekers to cancel the written test for a position at state-run Janata Bank as the question paper for the test was allegedly leaked.

The jobseekers under the banner of "general students" also demanded a fresh written test for the Executive Officer position and punishment of the ones involved in the question leak that took place on the night

before the test day. The demands were made at a press conference at the office of Dhaka On April 21, around 9,400 candi-

dates attended the two-hour-long written test at city's Eden College,

Lalmatia College and Ideal College venues. Dean of social science faculty at Dhaka University Prof Farid Uddin Ahmed, the controller of the test,

however, denied the question leak allegation. At the press conference, the candidates claimed that the question paper was leaked on the night before the test

and the questions were available on

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Rakibul Hossain, spokesperson of the complainant jobseekers, displayed several screenshots of the leaked questions that were available on the social media on the night before the "We went to Prof Farid with the
