Mayur river in peril

Encroachment, pollution go on unchecked; dissolved oxygen level falling

October last year.

UNB, Khulna

Rampant encroachment and unchecked pollution have put the Mayur river, one of the freshwater rivers in Khulna, at stake destroying its resources and ecosystem.

Due to a lack of proper drainage system, the 22-km river flowing beside the northwestern side of the city receives most of its waste.

The river is also obstructed by sediments as its natural tidal flow is prevented by gates at various

points. Once a storehouse of freshwater fish, the river water was used for agriculture but unplanned urbanisation and unchecked disposal of waste severely polluted it making its water unusable, locals said.

Also, the dissolved oxygen (DO) level in the river is falling day by day due to release of waste into its water.

Conservation Rules, 1997, the DO level must be at least 5 parts per million (ppm) in water to support

Environment (DoE), Khulna data shows that the DO level has now declined to 2 ppm in the Mayur DoE senior chemist deadriver.

Kamruzzaman Sarkar said the river's DO level is decreasing gradually. It was 1.1 ppm in January while 1.3 ppm in February.

Under the circumstances, he said, the Mayur could be declared biologically dead.

Says Prof Anisuzzaman after receiving 'Ananda Puraskar' in Kolkata SUBRATA ACHARJEE, Kolkata

The more the people of Bangladesh and India would know each other, the closer they would come, overcoming confusion and fear, and literature could play a pivotal role in this regard, eminent educationist and writer Prof Anisuzzaman said yesterday.

He said this after receiving prestigious "Ananda Puraskar-1423", a literary award given by the Anandabazar Patrika, a noted Bangla newspaper published from India's Kolkata.

Anisuzzaman, professor emeritus of Dhaka University, received the award for his autobiography "Bipula Prithibi" (The Vast World). Eminent poet of India's West Bengal Shankha Ghosh handed over the award at a ceremony at a hotel in Kolkata yesterday evening. "We the people of the

two neighboring countries have been maintaining a good relation for years. But some confusion and fear still exist," Prof Anisuzzaman said. "I think the confusion and fear stem from the ignorance of not knowing each other. Reading literature is the best way to know the people."

Prof Anisuzzaman received the award for the second time. In 1994, he got the award for publishing a series of 14 cassettes titled "Oitijjher Ongikar" containing Bangla poetry, songs and plays.

Anandabazar Patrika has been giving the award every year since 1958.

FROM PAGE 3 Yesterday, Taslima was telling the heartbreaking story of horror of Jupihati village at Uzirpur in the home Wednesday early hours only to unleashed on her on Wednesday early hours to this correspondent lying on the bed of burn unit at Barisal Sher-E-Bangla Medical College Hospital (SBMCH), with tears rolling down her cheeks.

With critical injuries, Taslima remained chained to the bed until her parents appeared in the very morning for her rescue after her eldest son -- an eighth grader -- informed them over the phone of the incident.

Taslima's mother Nurjahan said one of Badal's relatives even waylaid them when they were taking their daughter to hospital.

Badal was paid Tk 2,00,000 at the time of marriage and 1,00,000 last year as dowry, said Nurjahan, but he was demanding more.

Father, daughter 'commit suicide'

Depressed about not getting justice, a man with his eightyear-old daughter allegedly committed suicide by jumping before a train in Gazipur yesterday, claimed the family.

The bodies of Hazrat Ali, 45, a farmer, and his adopted daughter Ayesha Khatun, of Karnapur Sitpara village, were found near the rail tracks at Sreepur Railway Station, said Shahjahan Mian, station master of Sreepur, who also suspected that the two might have taken their own lives by jumping before a train of Teesta Express.

Hazrat's wife Halima Begum said her husband and Ayesha set off for Sreepur Bazar around 8:00am and after sometime, she heard the news.

Halima claimed that their only child Ayesha was sexually abused by a neighbor some three months ago. Hazrat informed the matter to Goshinga Union Parishad member Abul Hossain but he did not take any step which depressed her husband.

However, Abul claimed that he was not informed about any such incident. Police yesterday evening detained Abul for interrogation.

education ministry, said none of the SDGs would be achievable without achieving the education goal.


As per SDGs, education is a human right and a public good, said CAMPE executive director Rasheda K Choudhury, adding that 535 million children including those in Bangladesh were still



The official, seeking anonymity, said an orderly of the dormitory first noticed the body sitting on the sofa around 9:30am after he had opened the window. He was asked by an officer to bring shaving foam from the room, he said. Another officer said police found a paper in his wallet where someone wrote, "I love you" with blood. The commissioner, Shafiqul Islam, said they did not find any suicide note in the room.
