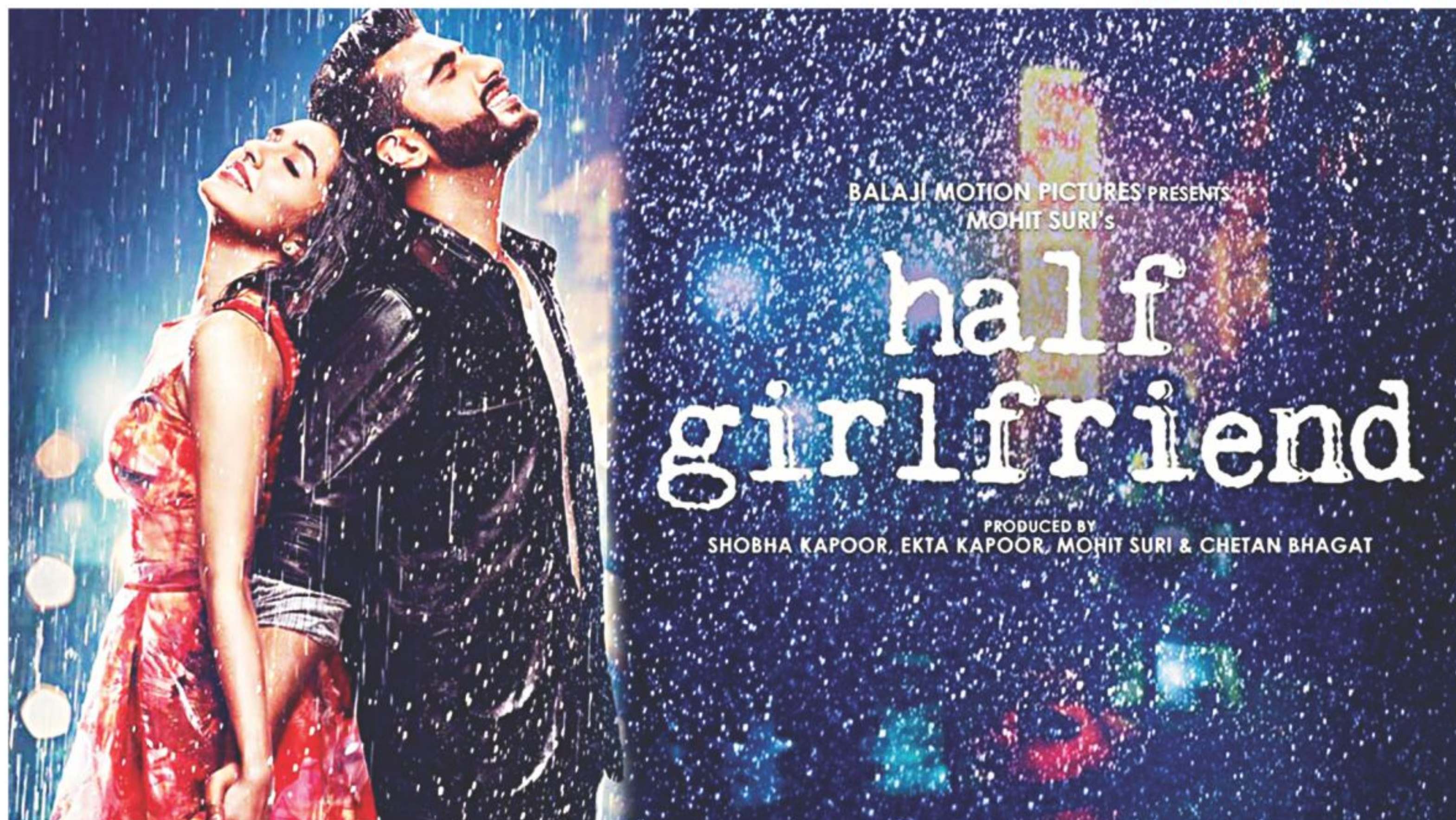

But destiny has other plans for the star-crossed lovers and their love story continues four years later when they meet again.
