



Law enforcers given licence to suppress opposition

Khaleda says about interference in meeting at ASM Rab's house

BNP chairperson Khaleda Zia strongly denounced law enforcers' "interference" in a meeting at Jatiya Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Rab) President ASM Abdur Rab's house yesterday, saying it manifested the state's current "vindictive and extremely anti-people nature".

In a statement, Khaleda alleged that the government had let law enforcers loose, and they had got desperate to suppress the opposition parties and alternative opinions.

"The current government has crossed all the limits after pushing the country into the dark depths of one-party misrule. Even, the indoor programmes of the country's political, social, and religious organisations are obstructed," she said.

Police on Thursday night took position in front of Rab's house in the capital's Uttara, as leaders of some opposition political parties sat in a meeting there. At one stage, the law enforcers stormed the house and asked them to cut the meeting short.

In the statement, Khaleda said police entered Rab's house with an ulterior motive to spread panic among people so that no one dare raise voice against the government.

"The government used police to foil the meeting at Rab's house as part of its ill-tactics to eliminate opponents. The rule of law is now absent in the country," she said.

"Social crimes are now on a sharp rise as the law enforcers have been given the licence to repress the opposition parties and control their views."

The former prime minister warned the government

Rule of law is the key

Pro-BNP platform's discussion on extra-judicial killing, forced disappearance told

There will be no end to forced disappearance, extra-judicial killing, and abduction until the rule of law is established in the country, a roundtable discussion of a pro-BNP organisation was told yesterday.

The speakers also said there would be no rule of law if there was no democracy.

Speaking as the chief guest, BNP standing committee member Moudud Ahmed said 118 people were killed extra-judicially, 137 people were murdered, 84 became victims of forced disappearance, and 697 women and children were raped in the last 10 months.

He, however, did not give the source of the information.

Moudud also highlighted the need for a national unity among those who want an end to "one person rule" in the country. It has to be the one-point demand, he said.

"We may have differences, complaints, and grievances among ourselves on different issues. But let's get united on the point that we will restore democratic exercise in the country," he called upon the leaders of the parties aligned with BNP.

"After creating a national unity, we can come to an agreement with the people on how to make our democratic institutions including

the Election Commission, Anti-Corruption Commission, Public Services Commission, and parliament stronger," he said.

The discussion on "enforced disappearance, extra-judicial killing, and abduction" was organised by Adarsha Nagorik Samaj at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

Turning to parliament issues, Moudud said it was his personal opinion that the president and the speaker should quit from their party once they assumed the positions, to ensure neutrality because they were like institutions.

He also regretted that no adjournment motion was accepted in any of the parliaments in the country.

The adjournment motion is a procedure which, if admitted, leads to setting aside the normal business of the House for discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance.

The senior lawyer said, "We will have to correct ourselves.... Otherwise there will be no meaning of coming to power."

In his speech, Nagorik Oikya coordinator Mahmudur Rahman Manna said those who wanted to get rid of the "present situation" would have to take to the street protesting the government's misdeeds. "The present

EC takes steps to increase number of women voters

BSS, Dhaka

The Election Commission (EC) has directed the field officers to engage public representatives and village police to increase the number of women voters in the upcoming voter list.

Assistant Secretary of EC Secretariat Md Mosharraf Hossain sent directives in this regard to field officers and local public representatives on Thursday.

The commission gave directives to specify eight problems for women to become voters and get over those problems to increase the number of women voters.

According to the EC, the eight problems included - reluctance to collecting birth registration certificates by paying fees, apathy in taking photographs in excuse of religion and unawareness of rural women and distant registration centres.

The EC asked the field officers to take cooperation from women public representatives especially members of reserved seats at Zila Parishads, Upazila Parishads, City Corporations, Pourasavas and Union Parishads.

The EC will collect information about citizens who are eligible to become voters from July 25 to August 9. The commission will collect information of those who will become 18-year-old on January 1, 2018.

Youth 'rapes' girl in Savar

Victim's father alleged one Shamim Hossen, 25, of Chandail area in Dhamrai convinced her daughter, 15, to go with him to his house making a promise of marriage.

One Friday around 11:00pm, the girl snuck out of her house when her parents were asleep and went to Shamim's house with him who later raped her after confining her to a room.

She was released around 3:00am yesterday, said the father, adding, while she

An Indian student of a private university in Chittagong city allegedly killed a fellow student of his country in Akbar Shah area of the port city early yesterday.

He later tried to kill himself by hanging.

The deceased is Ateef Sheikh, 25, son of Abdul Khalique of Guwahati of Assam in India.

The injured, who was rescued by his roommates, is Maisnam Winson Singh, son of Maisnam Menjor Singh of Imphal East of Manipur in India.

Both were fourth-year MBBS students of University of Science and Technology Chittagong (USTC).
