Early marriage even earlier

BBS survey finds women's average marital age drops to 18.8yrs; experts say poverty, insecurity main reasons



Sylhet division records highest marriage age both for men and women

Women getting married earliest in Rangpur division and men in Rajshahi division

Experts attribute poverty, safety concerns for women's early marriages

Over the last five years, more women got married at a younger age while men's average age of marriage kept going up.

Last year, women's average age of marriage was 18.8 years, dropping from 19.3 in 2012. During the period, that for men rose to 26.3 from 24.7.

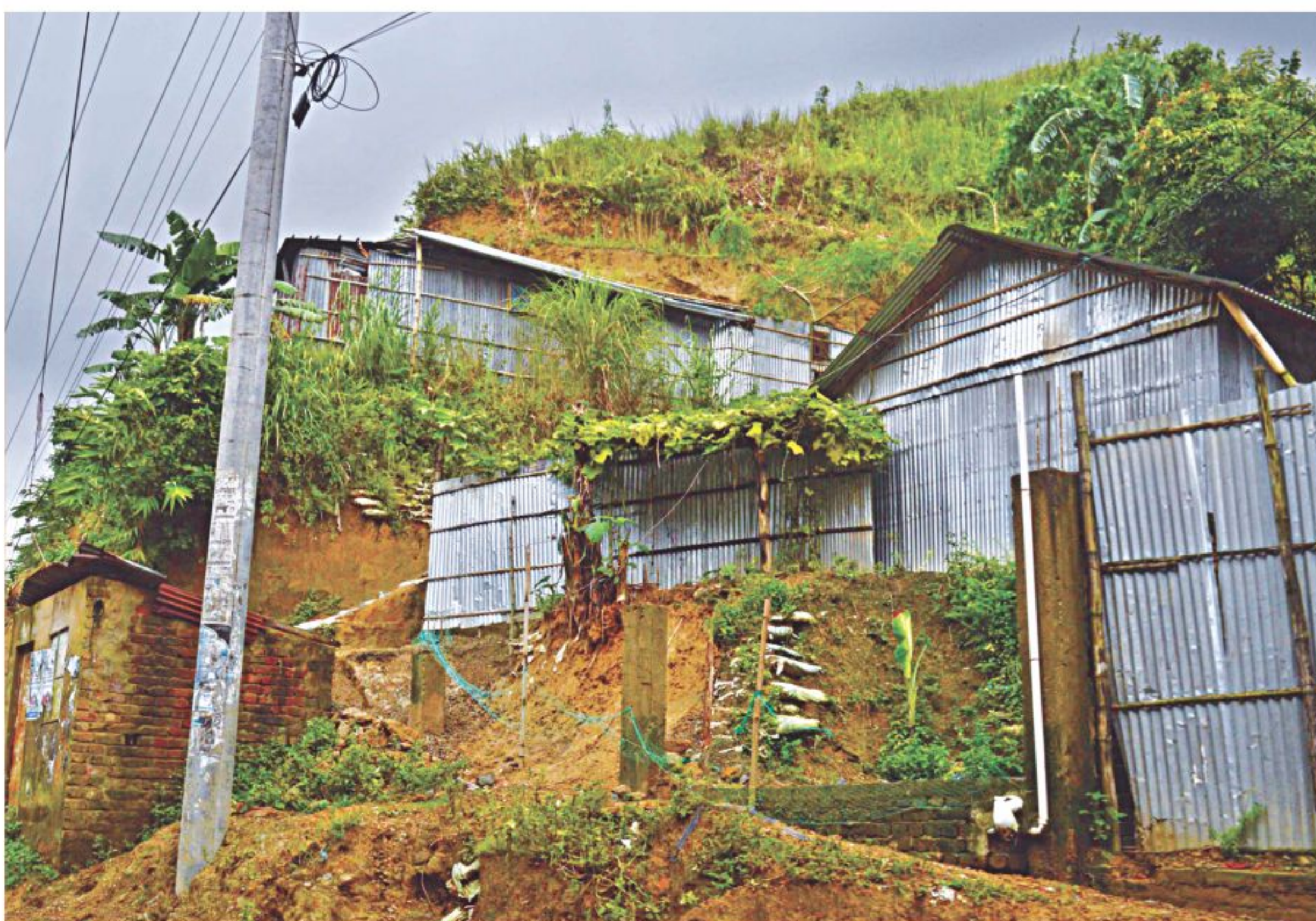
A recent Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS) survey titled "Bangladesh Sample

Vital Statistics 2016" also found that rural women got married at an average age of 18.3 and urban women at 19.9.

Population experts, rights activists, and policy planners attribute women's early marriage to poverty and social security concerns.

The minimum age of marriage for men and women are 21 and 18 years in the country. But, a special provision in the child

What can we do?

Ctg DC appears helpless in preventing illegal hill-dwelling

The local administration has expressed helplessness as if it did not have the capacity to prevent the loss of lives in Friday's landslide at Jungle Salimpur in Sitakunda upazila of Chittagong.

That was its position even five weeks ago after the death of 170 people in the country's hill districts in rain-induced landslides. Environment experts at the time suggested that only permanent eviction of hill dwellers from risky areas would prevent such deaths.

Chittagong Deputy Commissioner Zillur Rahman Chowdhury said he had failed to evict vulnerable

Stern city governance, lot more power for it

Renowned former Delhi CM offers two tips for city corporations to get messy Dhaka in order

Stern governance and empowered elected local bodies should help alleviate Dhaka city's current messiness and the stigma of poor liveability, said former Delhi chief minister Sheila Dikshit in an interview with The Daily Star.

"Just tighten up the governance system and fix the responsibilities of all concerned," said Dikshit, who earned the image

of a tough administrator while ruling the Indian capital for 15 years at a stretch.

"Either you change the present state of city governance or you empower the two Dhaka municipalities [city corporations] with much more power; give them more power and funds to enable them to deliver the public services," she said in the interview on Wednesday in Dhaka.

On brink of losing lights

Chances of Siddiquir's full recovery dim after his eyes got hurt during Thursday's police action in Shahbagh; family appeals for help

Siddiquir Rahman, who suffered serious eye injuries during a police action at Shahbagh on Thursday, stands little chance of full recovery, doctors say as efforts are on to have his eyesight back to normal.

"The chances of his full recovery are slim," Associate Professor Dr Iftekhar Md Munir of the National Institute of



Ophthalmology said following a surgery on the victim's right eye yesterday.

Siddiquir, a third-year political science student at Titumir College, suffered injuries in both eyes when police lobbed a teargas shell on the students of seven colleges, who were demonstrating for the announcement of their examination schedules.

Police claimed he was wounded when hit
