Prof Jamilur Reza gets lifetime award

Prof Jamilur Reza Choudhury has been given the Bangladesh Development Initiative's (BDI) Lifetime Achievement Award-2017, said a BDI press release.

The award will formally be presented at BDI's international conference tentatively scheduled for August-September 2018.

Established in 2012, the BDI award is designed to honour outstanding individuals or organisations who have contributed to understanding the challenges and the ideals that have led to Bangladesh's development.

Prof Jamilur Reza, the incumbent vice chancellor of the University of Asia Pacific, is a foremost civil engineer, professor and researcher.

Born in Sylhet, Jamilur obtained BSc-in-civil engineering degree in 1963 from the University of Engineering and Technology, Dhaka.

Later, he completed MSc engineering and PhD from the University of Southampton.

Dr Jamilur joined the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) as a lecturer in 1963 and was promoted to a professor of the civil engineering department in 1976. He served as the department head in 1978-'79, and 1981-'83.

In March 2001, he joined Brac University as its first vice chancellor.

Prof Jamilur has written about 70 papers in international journals and conference proceedings related to, among others, tall buildings, low-cost housing and earthquake resistant design.

He was awarded Ekushey Padak in science and technology category this year.

Alternative energy plan can save \$19b

Says Nat'l Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports

He said this at an event organised at the capital's Jatiya Press Club where the committee disclosed the draft of their alternative proposal.

The proposal has been prepared following a year-long research conducted by a panel of local and foreign experts including from the USA, Australia, and India, the committee leaders said. The experts' names were revealed at the programme.

The draft proposal is environment-friendly as 55 percent of electricity under it would be generated from renewable resources such as solar, wind and waste energy (municipal waste, manufacturing waste, landfill gas, etc).

Natural gas would be used to produce 37 percent of the electricity while the remainder, eight percent, would be generated using oil and from rental plants from regional countries.

Their proposal would save the country's environment and it aims to free the

country from foreign debts by relying on local resources, Prof Anu said.

In contrast, the government plan would cause harm to the environment and it relies on imports and foreign loans, he argued.

In the committee's draft proposal, renewable energy resources and natural gas have been given priority over coal, liquefied natural gas (LNG) and nuclear energy as fuel to run the power plants.

Besides, "...the government's present master plan does not incorporate drilling in deep and shallow areas in the sea for natural gas," to increase the country's fossil fuel reserve, Prof Anu Muhammad said.

The government must increase the capacity of Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration and Production Company Ltd (Bapex) to meet the country's demand, he added.

Communist Party of Bangladesh President Mujahidul Islam Selim

said they were not given any opportunity to discuss on the issue before the government adopted its power generation master plan.

The government should accept the committee's alternative power generation plan for the sake of the country's wellbeing as it is "positive and people-oriented", he also said. "The government aims to make money with its master plan..."

Zonayed Saki, chief coordinator of the central executive committee of GonoSamhatiAndolon, said rather than relying on natural gas, the government chose to import liquefied natural gas that is costlier.

Prof Abdul Hasib Chowdhury of electrical and electronic engineering department at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) said the government's energy policy should be studied before the committee prepares its final power generation master plan.

Bangladeshis detained, harassed at Malaysian airport: Adilur

A good number of Bangladeshis are being detained and harassed at Kuala Lumpur airport despite having legal documents to visit Malaysia, said Adilur Rahman Khan, secretary of Odhikar, a human rights organisation.

At a press briefing at the organisation's office in the capital yesterday, he said many Bangladeshis are being held at the airport for days, and even months before they were sent back.

"Even the Malaysian authorities did not bother to explain the reasons behind the detention or not allowing them to enter the country," said Adilur, who was detained at the airport on July 19 and sent back the following day.

The immigration authorities detained him at the airport after he reached there to attend an international seminar. The Supreme Court lawyer still did not know the reason behind it.

However, he said he came to know that he was barred from entering Malaysia on instruction of the "higher authorities". Without elaborating, he said the matter was under investigation by the Malaysian National Human Rights Commission.

"Many Bangladeshi detainees did not have money to buy

Education comes to a halt

623 pry and high schools in 5 dists of Rangpur region remain submerged for a month; 100 more under threat of river erosion

Academic activities at 623 primary and high schools in Rangpur region have been suspended for more than a month due to flooding caused by heavy rainfall and an onrush of water from the upstream, said education officials.

Of them, 562 are government primary schools and 61 high schools in five districts -- Rangpur, Kurigram, Lalmonirhat, Gaibandha and Nilphamari, they said, adding that the number of students of these schools were more than 200,000.

Of the 562 primary schools affected by flooding, at least eight are in Pirojghata, Gangachara and Kaunaupi upazila of Rangpur district; 380 in Kurigram Sadar, Ulipur,

devoured by rivers.

His office would write to ministry soon on completion of the assessment, he said.

However, the activities of a few schools had started last week, according to the education officials.

Teachers of the primary schools in those areas where flood water has receded have been instructed to restart the academic activities as soon as possible and help their students make up the lost classes, Mahbub Elahi added.

In addition, more than 100 government primary schools and high schools in the five districts of the region are under threat of river erosion.
