CROSSING HIGHWAY A family perishes on the road

5 more killed in 2 dists

Three members of a family were killed in a road accident on Dhaka-Tangail highway at Delduar upazila in Tangail yesterday.

The deceased are Fahima Akter, 35, wife of Saudi Arabia expatriate Tara Miah, and her daughter Tarina Akter, 13, and son Tanvir Ahmed, 7. The family lived in Nallapara village of the upazila.

Police said the accident took place in Dubai area around 1:30pm when a Dhaka bound bus from Sirajgaj ran over the three when they were crossing the highway, leaving them dead on the spot.

The driver of the bus fled the scene, but locals seized the vehicle and caught the helper and supervisor and handed them over to the law enforcers, they said.

Fahima, a mother of three, along with her two children, was going to enjoy a sporting event in Mohera Police Training Centre, in neighbouring Mirzapur upazila, said Mosharaf Hossain, officer-in-charge of Delduar Police Station.

The bodies were handed over to the relatives without autopsy following legal procedures, he added. After the bodies reached home, Fahima's elder daughter Taslima Akter, 16, lost consciousness, said locals.

In Narsingdi, four people were killed and 15 others injured as a covered van hit a bus on Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Kandhail area near Madhobdi Police Station.

The deceased were Abdur Rahman, 48, his son Robiul Islam, 18, and one Suma Aktar, 16, and Hena Begum, 28, all residents of the sadar upazila.

In Moulvibazar, a motorcyclist was killed as a truck hit him from behind in Shurovipara area of Sreemangal upazila.

The motorcyclist, Mofazzal Mia, 28, lived in the sadar upazila.

CTG NURSING COLLEGE TEACHER ANJALI MURDER IN 2015

Investigation heading nowhere

Over two and a half years have gone by since Anjali Devi, a senior teacher of Chittagong Nursing College (CNC), was hacked to death in broad daylight in Chittagong city on January 10 in 2015, but police are yet to find any clue.

Police said they did not get any eyewitness of the murder.

Moreover, police claimed the victim's family was not interested to go ahead with this case and was not cooperating with the investigation officer (IO).

On January 10, 2015, Anjali Devi, 57, was hacked indiscriminately by four masked assailants at Telipatti Road of Chawkbazar on her way to college around 8:45am, said police, adding that the attackers had fled the scene without taking away her mobile phone, money and handbag.

The teacher died at Chittagong

Medical College Hospital (CMCH) at around 12:00 noon on that day.

The detective branch (DB) of Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) was assigned to investigate the case after the victim's husband Dr Rajendra Chowdhury filed a murder case with Panchlaish Police Station.

Students and colleagues of Anjali said the spot of the murder was always abuzz with pedestrians and vehicles. But the miscreants fled the scene immediately after committing the crime, they added.

They expressed their resentment over "failure" of police to unearth the clue.

Meanwhile, police arrested Md Reja, 50, a former law affairs officer of a madrasa in Patiya upazila of Chittagong, on June 13 the same year in connection with the case.

"Reja served a legal notice to

Anjali in 2012 terming her an anti-Islamist," said Inspector Keshab Chowdhury, former investigation officer (IO) of the case, adding, "Reja accused Anjali of speaking against Islam in the classroom but during our investigation, after talking with students and teachers, we did not find any truth of the allegation."

"Reja's involvement in the

murder was not found in our investigation," said Keshab.

Contacted, Romena Akter, a colleague of Anjali at CNC and president of Chittagong divisional nurses' association, said they formed human chains to arrest the criminals but there is no headway in two and a half years.

"Can you think of a civilised society where a woman is murdered in broad daylight but law enforcers cannot find out any clue in two and a half years?" she asked. "It seems none killed her (Anjali)!" she vented her frustration.

Asked, Inspector Habibur Rahman of DB, also the IO of the case, said although they did not find out any clue of this murder, they did not give up.

"Our investigation is going on," he said.

"We are not getting proper cooperation from the victim's

family members," he claimed, adding, "The victims' husband and two daughters, all doctors, reside outside Chittagong."

Asked, whether it is the failure of police as they could not find out any clue in all these years, the additional commissioner (crime and operation) of CMP Saleh Mohammad Tanvir said, "It's not a failure of police."

"In our investigation, we have not found any enemy of the victim who might have been involved in the murder; moreover, we did not get any eyewitness of the murder," he said.

"The victim's family is not cooperating with us, but...our investigation is going on," he said. "We are cordial to unearth the clue of the murder..."

Anjali's husband Rajendra could not be contacted as his cell phone was found switched off.

Fresh survey going on to demarcate Shitalakkhya

The Narayanganj district administration and BIWTA have started a fresh joint survey of 2,198 pillars that demarcated the areas of establishments on the banks of the river Shitalakkhya, to save it from grabbers.

Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) has objected to these boundary pillars placed by a good number of industrial units -- including power plants, cement factories, jute mills and dockyards.

After the survey, BIWTA will replace the old boundary pillars with durable ones in a bid to prevent influential people from grabbing the river.

In June 2009, the High Court ordered the district administration and BIWTA to take necessary steps to protect four rivers, including the Shitalakkhya, around the capital.

Later, the two government organisa-

tions, in a joint survey, fixed the border of the Shitalakkhya.

In 2011, Public Works Department started installing boundary pillars to demarcate the waterbody.

On May 16, 2011 a 10-member taskforce was formed at a meeting with the then state minister for land Mostafizur Rahman in the chair, said BIWTA sources.

The taskforce inspected the activities of setting up the boundary pillars and took a decision to reinstall those considering different aspects, including BIWTA's objection.

BIWTA objected that 2,198 such pillars out of total 5,011 were not installed in right places.

Of the 2,198 pillars, 1,356 were set up on the eastern bank of the Shitalakkhya.

On September 6, 2015, the then National River Protection

Commission Chairman Ataharul Islam, at its meeting, asked for saving the river by setting the pillars in right places quickly, if necessary.

AKM Arifuddin, joint director of Narayanganj River Port under BIWTA, said the district administration and BIWTA, as per the directives of the prime minister, National River Protection Commission and the taskforce started a fresh survey of the 2,198 pillars.

BIWTA Chairman Commodore M Mozammel Haque inaugurated the work on August 9 after visiting Sonakanda area.

Arifuddin said, "We will set up strong boundary pillars so that none can grab the Shitalakkhya river."

He said implementation of the project requires much time. No timeframe was given for doing so, he added.

real and complex. We are committed to the achievement of universal health coverage. Every single country is making headway and we have powerful means to measure progress," she said.

Poonam said universal health coverage (UHC) is the best and most powerful means for changing peoples' lives through better health. "We must strive for a more equitable, effective and results-oriented health sector..." she added.

Mohamed Shainee, the special envoy of the Maldives' President Abdulla Yameen Abdul Gayoom, was present at the chief guest in the inaugural session. Nazim Ibrahim, health minister of the Maldives, also spoke at the meeting, which will end on September 10 with Malé Declaration.

Ministers, state ministers, officials from

the member countries and representatives of partner organisations also attended the programme. Rear Admiral Akhtar Habib, Bangladesh ambassador to the Maldives, represented Bangladesh.

Apart from climate change and its impact on public health, issues relating to strengthening primary health care and the health workforce and progress towards universal health coverage, efforts to end tuberculosis from the region will also be discussed, Poonam told reporters after the inaugural session.

The meeting will also discuss the ways to strengthen inter-country cooperation in areas such as medicine procurement and pricing, and regulation of medical products, the action needed to cut down road traffic injuries, controlling vector-borne diseases, she added.

absent in the court. Five other people are also accused in the case.

The ACC accuses the former premier and 15 others of causing a loss of Tk 159 crores to the state exchequer by awarding a contract for operation of Barapukuria coalmine to a Chinese company between June 2003 and June 2005, abusing power.

On October 5 of 2008, the ACC pressed charges against Khaleda and 14 others in the case.

Of the accused, two accused died earlier while two Jamaat leaders were executed for their war crimes.

Earlier on May 28 this year, the Supreme Court cleared the way for running the trial proceedings against Khaleda.

Banshkhali on July 22, 2013, and arrested Morshed. Later, the arrestee confessed that he had had the arm and cartridge there.

A sub-inspector filed an arms case with

Banshkhali Police Station and submitted the charge sheet on August 11, 2013. He was indicted on March 13, 2014.

The prosecutor said eight witnesses out of 11 had testified before the court in the case.
