



Nightmare on ferries

Thousands suffer for hours due to poor navigability of Padma

It was a journey Rafiqul Islam Nasir and his family members were not prepared to make on their return to the capital from Eid vacation at their hometown in Bagerhat.

On reaching Kathalbari Ferry Ghat Tuesday midnight after a six-hour-long bus journey, they came to know that most of the ferries were not operating across the Padma river for lack of navigability due to siltation.

What they would have to do was take their bags and belongings and board a small ferry to get to the other side of the river.

So, Nasir, his wife and two kids left their bus and squeezed into a ferry jam-packed with people. The ferry carried only people and light vehicles so that it didn't run aground on the shallow Kathalbari route.

Waiting for enough space even to stand in the crowd, some passengers were locked in acutes with others in the one and a half hour's journey. Rain and humid added to their suffering.

"I never faced such a hassle. Had I known that ferries would not carry our bus, I would not have travelled on this route and brought those heavy bags," said Nasir, a resident of Hasnabad in the capital.

The authority should have been aware of silt accumulation in the route and should have completed dredging beforehand to avoid such a situation, he added.

"It was very difficult for me and my children to travel on

Six workers electrocuted, killed

Six workers were electrocuted while dismantling a motor garage located inside a filling station in Raipura of Narsingdi yesterday.

The deceased have been identified as Barkat Hossain, 22, Hakim Mistry, 50, Awal Miah, 20, Kawser, 30, Zakaria, 25, and Abul

Faiz. Of them, Faiz died at a hospital in Bhabanipore after being rushed there for treatment. Bodies of the other five were recovered from the spot.

Officer-in-Charge of Dewhar Hospital confirmed the incident.

The OC said police recovered the bodies and sent them to Narsingdi Hospital Morgue for autopsies.

Locals said the incident took place around 4:35pm at Tabassum Motors located inside Lal Mia

FARUK MURDER

Charges framed against MP Rana, 13 others

A local court yesterday framed charges against Awami League lawmaker Amanur Rahman Khan Rana and 13 others in the murder case of freedom fighter Faruk Ahmed.

Judge Abdul Mansur Miah of the Additional District and Sessions Judge's Court-I framed charges against them under sections 34, 120 and 302 of the Penal Code said Court Inspector Anwarul Islam.

The court fixed October 18 for hearing testimonies of the witnesses.

On February 3 last year, the Central Bench of Tangail police pressed charges against the 14 accused. Of them, lawmaker Rana, Samir Miah, Anisul Islam Raja and Mohammad Ali are behind bars and Farid Ahmed, Nasir Uddin Nur and Masudur Rahman are on bail.

The seven others accused – Jahidur Rahaman Kakan, Shahidur Rahaman Khan Mukti, Saniyat Khan Bappa, Kabir Hossain, Babu Miah, Alamgir Hossain Chan and Sanwar Hossain – have been on the run.

Jahidur, former president of Tangail Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Shahidur, ex-Tangail mayor, and Saniyat, former vice-president of Chhatria League, are Rana's brothers.

Meanwhile, Faruk's wife Nahar Ahmed yesterday expressed satisfaction with framing charges in the case. She demanded justice for her husband.

Some supporters of Faruk brought out a procession in the court area demanding justice for Faruk Ahmed's killing.

The lawmaker was brought to the court from Kashimpur Central Jail in Gazipur around 9:00am. The MP from Tangail-3 (Ghatal) had filed three petitions with the court seeking exoneration from the case, a re-investigation and medical facilities in prison.

Outcry in India over outspoken journo murder

Senior journalist-activist and a strident critic of Hindutva politics, Gauri Lankesh was shot dead by unidentified assailants just outside her residence in southern Indian city of Bengaluru on Tuesday night.

Gauri, 55, editor of a Kannada language tabloid 'Gauri' based in Bengaluru, was returning home by her car after opening the gate when the assailants riding a motorcycle opened fire on her indiscriminately from close range. Two bullets hit her on the chest and forehead, police officials said, adding she died instantaneously.

Four bullets hit the compound wall of her building in Rajarajeshwari Nagar, the officials said.

Gauri, who owned some other publications, was known for her forthright views against hardline Hindutva politics and pro-Left leaning.

Bengaluru Police Commissioner T Sunil Kumar said he could not immediately ascertain who carried out the killing and the motive behind it.

Police suspected that she had been closely followed by the assailants.

Life once existed on Red Planet!

Scientists claim breakthrough

Researchers have discovered another clear indicator that life once existed on Mars.

Nasa's Curiosity rover has found evidence of boron on the red planet's surface.

Boron is a key ingredient for life, and scientists say the find is a huge boost in the hunt for life.

"Boron has been playing an important role in making RNA—one of the building blocks of life—finding boron on Mars further opens the possibility that life could have once arisen on the planet," said Patrick Gasda, a postdoctoral researcher at Los Alamos National Laboratory and lead author on the paper, said.

Turkish FM, first lady fly in to visit Rohingyas

Turkish First Lady Emine Erdogan and Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu arrive in Dhaka early today to meet Rohingyas who have fled to Bangladesh in the face of ethnic cleansing in Myanmar's Rakhine State.

Foreign Secretary Shahidul Haque yesterday commended the visit of the two dignitaries from Turkey.

Both the leaders will travel to Bangladesh in separate special chartered flights, said diplomatic sources in Dhaka.

"First Lady Emine Erdogan will travel to Bangladesh today where she will meet our Muslim brothers who fled oppression in Rakhine State," Deputy Prime Minister Hakan Cavusoglu told Turkish private broadcaster ATV yesterday.

Cavusoglu said the first lady would have "close contact" with Rohingyas

Minister hints at power price hike

State Minister for Power and Energy Nasru Hamid yesterday said a proposal had been sent to Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission seeking adjustment to the electricity tariff, indicating a hike by Tk 0.30 percent.

"It's a regular phenomenon to submit proposal to the regulator. Now, it's up to the regulator to take the decision," he told reporters at his ministry.

Pressure alone won't resolve N Korea crisis

Says Putin, calls for talks after meeting his S Korean counterpart

Resolving the North Korean nuclear crisis is impossible with sanctions and pressure alone, Russian President Vladimir Putin said yesterday after meeting his South Korean counterpart, adding that the impact of cutting oil would be worrisome.

Putin met South Korea's Moon Jae-in on the sidelines of an economic summit in the eastern Russian city of Vladivostok amid mounting international concern that their neighbour plans more weapons tests, possibly a long-range missile launch before a weekend anniversary.

Putin denounced North Korea's sixth and largest nuclear bomb test on Sunday, saying Russia did not recognise its nuclear status.

"Pyongyang's missile and nuclear program is a crude violation of UN Security Council resolutions, undermines the non-proliferation regime and creates a threat to the security of northeastern Asia," Putin said at a news conference.

"At the same time, it is clear that it is impossible to resolve the problem of the Korean peninsula only by sanctions and pressure," he said.

No headway could be made without political and diplomatic tools, Putin said, later telling the TASS news agency that Russian and North Korean delegations might meet at the Vladivostok forum.

9.5 tonnes relief rice missing!

Rab seizes two trucks, spots discrepancies

Rapid Action Battalion has found a huge discrepancy in rice being released for relief from Tejgaon central storage depot (CSD) in the capital yesterday.

A team of Rab-2 stopped two trucks carrying 30 tonnes of rice in front of CSD gate around 9:00pm Tuesday. The trucks were carrying rice meant for flood-affected people in Jatiya Party lawmaker Syed Abul Hossain's area. The food directorate officials were present during the time.

"Measuring the trucks around 2:00pm, we have only found 20.5 tonnes of rice in the truck, meaning 9.5 tonnes of rice was missing from it," Sarwar Alam, executive magistrate of Rab, told The Daily Star.

Each of the sacks was supposed to contain 30kg of rice but Rab found that some sacks had 12kgs
