# Shakib void being felt

Only three among the current Bangladesh squad touring South Africa had experience of playing Tests in the country – Mushfiqur Rahim, Tamim Iqbal and Imrul Kayes. There could have been a fourth, but he withdrew from the tour to rest his mind and body from the demands of continuous cricket. He may have been physically absent, but Shakib Al Hasan was the name ringing out in the pre-match press conferences, both South African and Bangladeshi, yesterday.

That's a big loss for them. Shakib is a fantastic player. He has been the top all-rounder in the world for quite some time. He is a senior player, and someone who performs well in different conditions. So it will be a huge loss for them," said South Africa skipper Faf du Plessis, before adding with a laugh: "I am very happy that he will not play."

Shakib is singularly crucial in the context of this country's cricket. Very few other players become a two-in-one player for their side to the extent that the left-arm has over the past decade. He is the second-highest run-scorer in Bangladesh cricket history, and the top wicket-taker by a margin of 88. With Shakib in the side, Bangladesh is virtually playing with 12 players, and his absence on such a crucial tour has the coach Chandika Hathuringsha seemingly at a loss.

"You only can play with 11 players, not two," said the coach when asked who he was looking at to fill the gaping hole left by Shakib both in the batting and the bowling. "We are looking at either at a batsman or bowler to replace him. That's the challenge we have. So we will decide tomorrow about the 11. I think Shakib has been scoring a lot of runs lately, probably the [second] highest run-scorer in Test cricket. That's why we need a batsman at this stage."

A player of his calibre, everyone is going to miss him. And definitely we don't have another player like him, to replace him will be a big test for us," said the skipper. "He's been playing a lot of cricket. After the break hopefully he will return fresh and do the same job as he has done over the past 10 years. He's been representing our country and he has also been playing in 120 franchise overseas. He has been a great ambassador for Bangladesh, playing overseas, and also I think for that Bangladesh cricket will be known in other parts of the world."

Evidence of that was that, for a change, foreign journalists were asking after a Bangladeshi cricketer.

## 'Can win if we're at our best'

There is a stark difference in mood between the lead-up to Bangladesh's previous series against Australia and the one about to get underway with the first Test against South Africa at Senwes Park today.

Bangladesh's home series against the equally mighty Australia started with forecasts of 2-0. It was a forecast that, halfway through the two-match series, was halfway to coming true and there it remained. Yesterday, however, the bluster had departed along with the home comforts the Tigers left behind.

However this was not the wide-eyed, awed Bangladesh team that may have toured here in 2008 when they completed the second pair of innings defects in the country. Skipper Mushfiqur Rahim was sure of Bangladesh's place in the cricketing world, and while agreeing with counterpart Faf du Plessis's suggestion that Bangladesh will not to prove their newfound prowess

by performing overseas, also issued a reminder that Bangladesh have played well away from home in recent past.

"In the last few years we have been playing so well and consistently at home, this is our next challenge," Mushfiqur responded when told about Du Plessis's comments at the pre-match press conference yesterday. "I would say we have not been doing badly in the couple of Tests we played this year. In Sri Lanka we drew the series. In India we were competitive for three days. In New Zealand we were very good in the first Test."

"It's difficult for subcontinent teams because when you are used to playing on slow and low wickets back home and when you are coming abroad to play on bouncy tracks, it is not going to be easy. But I don't think it's going to be too difficult if we can apply ourselves, which we have done in a couple of Test matches against New Zealand, especially in Wellington."

"We are not among the top three teams in world cricket and it's not like that we will go and show everyone, and win the match. We are lower down the

ladder. It's a challenge for each of us and we have to represent ourselves differently. We have to give our 200 per cent to win. But we have the ability," said the Bangladesh captain.

Perhaps by necessity, the pre-series rhetoric has been toned down, but beneath the modest utterances, there was still confidence to be found. When asked

whether beating South Africa will be Bangladesh's biggest ever state-ment, he said: "I think so; in the last two years we have given big examples [statements]. Many may say that coming to South Africa and beating them is impossible. In truth, I don't think so. If we can play to our best, we can beat any side in the world. We had never beaten Australia or England before

even at home, but that happened."

Part of the confidence may stem from the pitch at Senwes Park, which Mushfiqur had a good look at before coming to the press conference.

"It's a different track, looks like it's a bit drier and spin will probably come into play as the days go on. We'll have a look and in our group, we have a couple of good quick bowlers also who can bowl a consistent line and length so we are looking forward to this challenge," Mushfiqur said when asked about the pitch.

Coach Chandika Hathuringsha, sitting beside the captain, seemed to be looking at the positives and opportunities of the challenge ahead, perhaps uncharacteristically so for a man known for his conservative utterances in pressers. "If you want to play South Africa then I think this is the best time. They've got a new coach, a few injuries."

"You always try to win, as Mushy said we need to play every session well. If we can continue to play good cricket for long periods, then winning is not out of the card."

# We want pace and bounce: Du Plessis

For all the talk about Bangladesh's steep upward curve in international cricket, there is a Jekyll-and-Hyde situation going on depending on whether a team playing Bangladesh at home or away. Over the last two years, visiting teams coming to Bangladesh often talk about how tough it is to play there. The scenario is a little different when Bangladesh are the visitors.

A clue may lie in the fact that Bangladesh's current tour of South Africa will skip the big money cities of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban. As visitors, Bangladesh are not quite up there yet. And that is an assessment with a lot of merit – Bangladesh's desperately poor away record proves it.

South Africa captain Faf du Plessis gave his opponents due credit, but there was enough in his words to suggest that South Africa do not really expect to be beaten by Bangladesh over the next two Tests, the first of which starts today at Senwes Park, Potchefstroom.

"Bangladesh's cricket has really improved in the last two years and they are as tough as any other team to play against. Every single nation will tell you that. We have been there [to Bangladesh] and it's really, really tough to get there. This test will be a real opportunity for them to show to the world that they can perform outside of their home. And that's also the challenge. You only get measured when you play well away from home," Du Plessis told reporters at the pre-match press conference yesterday.

Africa on top. And that view is reflected in high definition in the Test rankings – South Africa are second while Bangladesh are second from last among current Test nations.

From South Africa's point of view, at the start of a new season under a new coach, it is time to fill their boots against a lower-ranked opposition and get a much-needed confidence boost after a Test series defeat against England last season.

"For a start, just to draw a line in the sand after the England series," said Du Plessis when asked what he was looking for from this series. "We've played some really good cricket the last year, and that one tour, one tough conditions tour doesn't change the quality that we have in our setup."

## U-19s begin Afghan series today

The Bangladesh Under-19 team's wait for international matches will end today when they take on their Afghan counterparts in the opening game of the five-match Youth ODI series at the Sylhet International Cricket Stadium (SICS).

The U-19s are preparing for the ICC Under-19 World Cup to be held in New Zealand from January 13 next year. The Bangladesh U-19 team will play against England, Namibia and Canada in the Group C matches of the World Cup.

The board hired Australian Damien Wright to fill the position of head coach and the youths for the tour's rough challenge ahead, where they will face trying conditions in New Zealand.

With another World Cup fast approaching, the U-19 boys were lacking in international matches – which can provide valuable experience ahead of the looming challenge in the mega-event in January next year – although the youths started their preparations for the tournament more than 10 months ago.

The Bangladesh U-19 team had a tremendous build-up to the last ICC Under-19 World Cup, which took place in Bangladesh in January 2016.

# England seal series despite Lewis show

England beat West Indies by six runs under the Duckworth-Lewis method to win the rain-affected fourth one-day international at the Oval on Wednesday.

Victory saw England take an unbeatable 3-0 lead in the five-match series, with just Friday's finale in Southampton to come.

England, set 357 to win after West Indies made 356 for five, were 258 for five when rain stopped play 35.1 overs.

That left them just ahead of where they needed to be on D/L to win at that stage.

Moeen Ali, who made a blistering 102 in England's win in the fourth ODI in Bristol on Sunday, helped get England above the required run-rate with a dashing 48 not out.

Together with Jos Buttler (43 not out), he put on an unbroken 77 in eight overs after recalled opener Jason Roy made 84

on his Surrey home ground.

Defeat was cruel on the West Indies for whom Evin Lewis (176, retired hurt) and Alzarri Joseph (five for 56) produced ODI best performances.

Having been dropped on 122, Lewis was on course for a double century until, in the 47th over, he deflected a delivery from paceman Jake Ball into his ankle and collapsed to the turf.

Writing in agony, the 25-year-old Trinidad left-handed opener required prolonged on-field treatment before being wheeled off on a stretcher to sympathetic applause from a capacity crowd.
