Khaleda's motorcade attacked

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Chittagong around 7:00pm.
After overnight stay at the port city's circuit house, she will leave for Cox's Bazar today to visit four Rohingya camps at Balukhali, Boalmari and Jamtali in Ukhiya upazila.
She will be back in Dhaka on Tuesday.
Khaleda left her Gulshan residence at 10:40am yesterday, accompanied by BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir and Vice Chairman Shamsuzzaman Dudu. Party leaders and activists joined her from the Nayapaltan central office.
Around a hundred vehicles, including that of different media outlets, were in the convoy. Hundreds of activists and supporters carrying banners, festoons and placards thronged the roadsides on her way to Chittagong.
Led by BNP Senior Joint Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed, the party and its front organisations attempted to bring out a procession in front of BNP's Nayapaltan office yesterday evening to protest the attack on Khaleda's convoy.
But police dispersed them by charging batons and arrested three party men from the spot, a BNP press release said. Pro-BNP student body Chhatra Dal called a nationwide protest programme for today.
The BNP blamed ruling Awami League men, including Chhatra League and Jubo League activists, for the Feni incident, saying the government became fearful of Khaleda's public support. It also alleged that the attack was aimed at blocking people's wave on roads during her trip.
"The BNP chairperson's trip to

refugee camps was planned on humanitarian grounds. Government's men attacked such a programme," Mirza Fakhrul told The Daily Star at Feni Circuit House.
On the assault of newsmen, Fakhrul said it proves that the government does not believe in media freedom.
Not only in Feni, he alleged, the ruling party also attacked BNP men and created obstacles at different points on Khaleda's way to Cox's Bazar.
Earlier, before leaving the capital, Fakhrul said the party sought cooperation from the police and the administration to make Khaleda's trip a success.
Enamul Haq Shamim, AL's organising secretary for Chittagong division, claimed the internal feuds of BNP's Feni district unit led to the attack and that no AL man was involved in it.
Talking to this correspondent, he also said the government had taken all measures to make Khaleda's tour a smooth one but BNP men launched an attack on newsmen's cars to get media attention.
Kusum Dewan, additional deputy inspector general of police (Chittagong Range), said they were probing the incident and the culprits would definitely be found out.
Following the attack on Khaleda's motorcade, when some journalists went to a restaurant at Lalpur in Feni town to take lunch, a group of rowdy youths ransacked the hotel and asked the journalists to leave immediately.
Kazi Abul Bashar, general secretary of Dhaka South City BNP, who is with Khaleda, said the ruling party goons damaged nearly 15 vehicles

that were under his supervision and beat up a number of leaders and activists of his party.
Eyewitness said miscreants attacked the tail end of Khaleda's motorcade. The BNP chief's vehicle was at the front.
According to multiple sources, 40 to 50 men, who had gathered at Star Line filling station, about a hundred yards from the place of occurrence, were involved in the attack. Some of them carried firearms, said eyewitness.
Shafiq Ahmed, a senior reporter of Ekattor TV, said he and his cameraperson were assaulted by the attackers during the incident in Feni. Their camera was damaged too.
Our Feni correspondent reports that big logs were put on roads at different points of Dagonbhuia upazila, including Tulatoli, Dudhmukha and Beker Bazar, apparently to stop BNP men from going to Feni Sadar upazila to receive Khaleda.
Locals had to suffer immensely as plying of passenger vehicles on Noakhali-Feni route got suspended due to the barricades.
The ruling party men also tore up BNP's posters and banners at different parts of Feni Sadar upazila, alleged Mizanur Rahman, president of BNP Feni district unit.
In Mirsora upazila in Chittagong, unidentified people hurled brick chips on a microbus of private TV channel nTV around 7:00pm injuring its senior reporter Hasan Mahmud, broadcast engineer Sayeed Ahmed and cameraperson Ajit.
In Comilla, ruling party activists reportedly attacked BNP men who gathered on different roads to welcome their leader.

Get good governance

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Sustainable Urban Development in Bangladesh" at the Dhaka Sonargaon Hotel.
Balakrishna underscored the need for empowering the elected city mayors.
"Strong urban governance is what we need," said Rene Holenstein, the Swiss ambassador to Bangladesh.
Qimiao Fan, World Bank country director, said only well-managed urbanisation could lead to sustainable economic growth, allowing productivity and innovations.
In recent years, Bangladesh has experienced an annual urbanisation growth of 3.3 percent with 5.4 crore people living in the urban centres and the number is predicted to double in the next three decades or so, he said.
Urban areas contribute 60 percent of the country's GDP, and Dhaka and Chittagong together share 47 percent of the total output, Fan said.
This urbanisation is expanding job and manufacturing opportunities, he said, adding that more work was needed to fully capture the enormous benefits of urbanisation.
Bangladesh needs to address the critical challenges brought about by the massive unplanned urbanisation, characterised by high-level poverty, and generally poor housing conditions and liveability.
More than one out of five urban dwellers in Bangladesh lives in poverty, Fan said.
According to Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics, nearly 62 percent of the urban population, which is about 3 crore people, currently live in informal settlements and slums.
The country's urban centres need a minimum of \$2 billion annual investment for basic infrastructure, such as roads, water and sanitation, to meet the demand of the rapidly growing urban population, Fan said.
In Bangladesh, only three percent of the total public expenditure is on urban infrastructure development, which is very low by global standards. Bhutan spends 16 percent, Nepal 10, Indonesia 34 and South Africa 52 percent, he said.
Dhaka South City Corporation Mayor Mohammad Sayeed Khokon said lack of adequate urban planning

has led to today's civic woes, traffic congestion and flooding.
Narayanganj City Corporation Mayor Salina Hayat Ivy said there had always been an effort to keep the local government institutions submissive.
"We as the elected mayors cannot exercise the power provided by the present law and cannot play our mandated roles," she said.
Different municipalities have different problems and the government needs to address them separately, she said.

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my home," Sattar said, and outright denied that his daughters could do something like stealing a phone.
Two days later, however, Beauty's mother Tanuza Begum suddenly came to their house and said that she came to know through witchcraft that Aziza and her sister Mabiha had stolen the phone, Sattar said.
An intense altercation followed, although Tanuza and her other family members left Sattar's house soon afterwards.
Then around 8:00pm on Friday, Sattar went to the poultry farm, leaving Aziza and his son home.
On his way home about an hour later, Sattar saw a fire nearby and rushed there.
Finding that it was Aziza, he then took her to a nearby hospital with the help of locals. She was later shifted to the DMCH as her condition worsened.
Quoting Aziza, Sattar told The Daily Star that Beauty's cousin Rubel picked up Aziza from their home.
"She was taken half a kilometre away from the house at a jackfruit orchard where three more youths were waiting. Later, they tied her to a tree and beat her badly."
At one stage, the four set her alight as they failed to coerce her into admitting the theft, Sattar said.
Police arrested Tanuza in this connection and are trying to arrest the other suspects, said Syeduzzaman, officer-in-charge of Shibpur Police Station.
Sattar filed a murder case last night against seven people, including Beauty, Rubel and Tanuza.

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even went to school with Coburn's older brother. But, it wasn't until 1978, when he directed a play that she was taking part in, that they got to know each other better.

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"We normally go overseas," he told The Straits Times. "But I decided to make it special this time."
The couple, who have no children, went to several Rohingya refugee camps in Bangladesh -- including the Kutupalong refugee camp in Ukhiya -- along with a Singapore-based volunteer group called SG Qurban.
More than 600,000 refugees have fled into Bangladesh from Myanmar since August.
During their week there, they distributed aid to hundreds of refugees from 8:00am to 5:00pm daily.
"We gave out rice, bottled water, milk, bread, biscuits and snacks and toothbrushes," said Firdaus, who has been with the Singapore Police Force for nine years.
"For the women, we also arranged to buy sarongs [a traditional dress in

Southeast Asia]."
Firdaus, who has gone on aid missions before as part of his work and also privately, said he was worried about Najihah, 32, who was doing such work for the first time.
"She has asthma and is not that sporty. And Bangladesh can be tough. It was very hot, I was quite concerned, but she did well."
Firdaus and the other volunteers distributed 2,400kg of rice a day.
"But that was not enough," he said.
He said after reaching Bangladesh, they visited a designated area where volunteer groups get approval from the authorities.
The group brought its own aid supplies bought with donations they received. "Even \$1 can mean 2kg of aid," said Mr Firdaus.
The couple returned to Singapore on Oct 27.

Humiliated, college girl

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Kajol said Shekor and his accomplices reached Karmaker Para, the area of the incident, on their motorcycles at 11:00 in the morning. At the time, the location was almost deserted. They then snatched her scarf.
At one stage, the miscreants assaulted her physically and cut off her hair with a pair of scissors. Joyshree's cries led to local people gathering on the scene and that is when the criminals fled.
Makhon Mondal and her sister-in-law Tripti Mondal said, after reaching home, Joyshree wept for a long time. When they asked her about the cause, she narrated the incident to them.
Makhon Mondal said as her marriage was set for the coming Bengali month of Aghrahan, they tried to suppress the matter.
But in the evening, Joyshree entered her room and attempted to hang her-

self. Upon discovery, she was rushed to Shyamnagar upazila hospital. As her condition deteriorated, she was being shifted to Satkhira Sadar Hospital but died on way to the hospital.
Makhon Chakraborty, on October 27, two days after the incident, filed a case against the stalker Shekhor Mondal and three to four unnamed accomplices with Shyamnagar police station.
When this correspondent went to Shekhor Mondal's house at Barokupote village, it was found locked.
Shyamnagar police station OC Syed Mannan Ali said, the incident took place on October 25 but they were informed of the matter on October 27. The OC said, as Joyshree's family informed them later, by then the accused had fled. He said several police officers have been working to arrest the accused persons.

Urme Binte Salam is the UNO of Kuliarchar upazila and the recipient of the best UNO of Dhaka and Mymensingh divisions award this year for standard primary education.
The quality of education and attendance are the two main elements to achieving this, said Urme, who completed her honours and masters in English from Dhaka University in 2005 and joined the service in 2006. She also got a PhD from Malaysia later.
The UNO provided bicycles to 300 meritorious students so that they can commute to school easily. She also organised Science and ICT practical classes for students from fifth to seventh grades. The classes were participated by some 3,200 students of the upazila in January.
Taslima Ahmed Poly, the first female UNO in Kishoreganj upazila, is reputed for her services towards people in the remotest of areas.
Upon completing her masters from Bangladesh Agricultural University (BAU) in Mymensingh, Taslima joined cadre services in 2010.
The people of the haor suffer mostly for poor communication, and surprisingly, it is better during monsoon as they can use boats to go from one union to the next, said the only female employee at the upazila office.
When the rains subside, commuting becomes next to impossible in some upazilas, as the roads are muddy.
There is a dearth of playing grounds for children though authorities distribute sports equipment to the schools in the upazila.
"The conditions are extreme, but I still visit the unions using row and speed boats for my work," she said.
Sultana Akter, UNO of Tarail, acquired masters in Public Policy from the United Kingdom and joined the service in 2008.
"Although I grew up in Dhaka and studied abroad, I was mentally prepared to work for rural Bangladesh. The people of these upazilas still view the UNOs as the solver of all problems and they come to me with their personal and social problems. I try to find

remedies with the support of departments concerned," said Sultana.
Both men and women here feel more comfortable speaking to a woman about their issues as they crave empathy and understanding, she added.
Annapurna Debnath, UNO of Pakundia, is a change maker.
Out of some 150 families at Shailajani village of Chandipasha union, one or two members each from 30 families have been trained in some form of handicraft to make a living. Many more will be brought under the initiative by December, said the UNO.
There are some 194 primary schools in the upazila and all the schools will be brought under a mid-day meal programme by December, said Annapurna, who did her honours and masters from BAU. She will be the first to introduce this government programme in the upazila.
Mohammad Alaaddin, a sharecropper of Khama village in Agarsindhur union, said the UNO arranged Tk 10,000 from the upazila administration for his daughter's admission into Rangamati Medical College. "She has given my daughter an opportunity to pursue her dreams."
Annapurna approached Jangalia Union Parishad Chairman Sarder Shamim Ahmed to distribute uniforms for some 120 students of local primary school Pathkoli Shishu Kallanyan Bidhalaya.
Shohana Nasrin, Israt Jahan Keya and Mahmuda have joined as UNOs in three upazilas of the district this year.
Shohana completed her education from BAU, Keya from Jagannath University and Mahmuda from Eden College in Dhaka.
They enjoy life in the remote haor areas with their families and are rewarded with immense job satisfaction by helping the vulnerable people. Their biggest asset is the support from their families, they added.
Zillur Rahman, chairman of Kishoreganj Zila Parishad, said there are no allegations against these UNOs as they work with perseverance.
