NY attacker linked to IS

Uzbek-origin man ploughs pickup into cycle path killing eight; 'domestically radicalised' suspect shot, arrested

The Uzbek immigrant who killed eight people in New York's worst attack since September 11, 2001 was associated with the Islamic State jihadist group but became radicalised after moving to the United States, it emerged yesterday.

The driver, who moved to America in 2010, mowed down pedestrians and cyclists over a mile-long stretch of a bike path on Lower Manhattan's West Side, as children and their parents prepared to celebrate Halloween on Tuesday afternoon.

Police shot the 29-year-old suspect, Sayfullo Saipov, in the abdomen after he crashed into a school bus and exited his pickup truck, brandishing paintball and pellet guns. He remains in custody but is expected to survive the shooting.

"He's a depraved coward is what he is, and he was associated with ISIS, and he was radicalized domestically," New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo told CNN.

The governor confirmed "a note that referenced ISIS" was found at the scene. US media said it was written in Arabic and pledged allegiance to the jihadist group. Saipov also reportedly shouted "Allahu akbar" ("God is greatest").

"After he came to the United States is when he started to become interested about ISIS and radical Islamic tactics," Cuomo told CNN.

SPBn takes charge of PMO security

Special Security and Protection Battalion, a special police unit, yesterday took over the charge of the security of the Prime Minister's Office (PMO).

SPBn-1, which has 700 members, has replaced a Dhaka Metropolitan Police unit with 200 personnel. The members of the new unit would be stationed outside the PMO fence.

Haider Ali Khan, special superintendent of SPBn-1, told The Daily Star last night that they took the charge as it is their duty to provide security to the PMO.

SPBn was formed to ensure security to the AVTPs, including the prime minister, the president and foreign guests of same status, he said, adding that the members of the new unit would provide a two-tier security to the PMO.

"The SPBn members yesterday replaced the DMP personnel," a top official of the PMO headquarters told this newspaper.

46m mobile phone users' data stolen

Malaysia probes largest data leaks in Asia

Malaysia is investigating an alleged attempt to sell the data of more than 46 million mobile phone subscribers online, in what appears to be one of the largest leaks of customer data in Asia.

The massive data breach, believed to affect almost the entire population of Malaysia, was first reported last month by Lowyat.net, a local technology news website. The website said it had received a tip-off that someone was trying to sell huge databases of personal information on its forums.

The country's internet regulator, the Malaysian Communications and Multimedia Commission (MCMC), was looking into the matter with the police, Communications and Multimedia Minister Salleh Said Keruak said yesterday.

"We have identified several potential sources of the leak and we should be able to complete the probe soon," Salleh told reporters at parliament.

The leaked data included lists of mobile phone numbers, identification card numbers, home addresses, and SIM card data of 46.2 million customers from at least 12 Malaysian mobile phone and mobile virtual network operators (MVNO).

Cybersecurity researchers said the leaked data was extensive enough to allow criminals to create fraudulent identities to make online purchases.

Justin Lie, CEO of Cashshield, a Singapore-based anti-fraud company, compared the Malaysian case in its 'degree of complexity' to the cyber attack on US credit-scoring agency Equifax Inc, which said in September that cyber criminals had stolen sensitive information from 145.5 million people.

"Now these hackers have more quality information such as birth dates, IC numbers, mobile numbers, email address and passwords," Lie said about the Malaysian attack.

MARCH 7 SPEECH Hasina hails recognition by Unesco

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said recognition of Bangabandhu's historic March 7 speech as a world documentary heritage by the Unesco is a matter of great pride for the Bangalee nation and Bangla language.

In a statement, she also termed the recognition another milestone in the continuation of global amalgamation.

Bangabandhu's speech has been included in the Memory of the World International Register, a list of the world's important documentary heritage, maintained by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (Unesco).

Unesco Director General Irina Bokova announced the decision at its headquarters in Paris on Monday.

On March 7, 1971, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in his fiery speech called on freedom-loving Bangladesh to wage a decisive struggle against the Pakistani oppressors. The speech set the tone for the Liberation War that would

Singaporeans get 'rage room' relief

Bad day at the office? In high-pressured Singapore there is now a solution -- a "rage room" that lets stressed-out people take a baseball bat to items ranging from glass bottles to televisions.

The "Fragment Room" consists of a bare, cell-like space with concrete walls, where customers pay to indulge in an unusual form of destructive stress relief.

After being given overalls, helmets, gloves and shoes, people proceed to smash up items ranging from plates to printers.

The set-up opened six months ago and inhabitants of the city-state have shown they have an appetite for destruction. Anxious office workers have given it a go, as well as students and retirees in their 60s.

Forgetting a dark past

Old habits die hard, so the saying goes. Chances are, for a time like this, Motiur Rahman, from remote hilly Borochoekhula village in Chittagong's Rangunia upazila, a more honourable occupation will always evade him. Like many in his village, Motiur used to make his living selling illegally felled timber sourced from the nearby Dudupukuria-Dhupachori sanctuary. But in Motiur's case a life of thievery was not to be his destiny; and all it took to convince him otherwise was a little intervention, from a helpful snake.

"One fateful night I was busy cutting trees in the deep forest," he recalls. "Suddenly I felt something in the dark bite my leg. It was really painful. By the time I realised it was a snake, the log I was carrying on my shoulder had knocked me over, leaving me unconscious."

When Motiur came to his senses, he really came

'PLOT BY PILOT' PM's residence was the target

Rab tells Dhaka court

Biman Bangladesh Airlines Co-pilot Sabbir Emam Sabbir had planned either to hit the residence of the prime minister with an aircraft or take a plane along with passengers to the IS base in Syria, a Rab official told a Dhaka court yesterday.

Investigation officer Sub-Inspector Animul Islam of Rab-4 made the claim in the remand prayer for First Officer Sabbir, who was suspended following his arrest. Later, the court placed the accused on a seven-day remand.

During yesterday's hearing, the 31-year-old refuted the allegation and claimed that he was innocent.

Sabbir said he had been working at Biman since 2015 and he operated his last flight on October 30. "There was no complaint against me during my service. And all of a sudden, I was detained on the night of October 30 over militant links."

He also claimed that he did not even visit his parents' house, raided by the Rab on September 4-8, in the last five years except for one day after the arrest of his father.

"How come they [Rab] said I went to my Darussalam home and met Abdullah," he said.

The Rab arrested Sabbir, his mother Sultana Parvin, their relative Asifur Rahman Asif, and local tea stall owner Alam after raiding several places of worship on Tuesday. According to the force, the four had close links with Abdullah, an alleged JMB leader.

Sabbir is the son of Habibullah Bahar Azad, the owner of the building in the capital's Darussalam area. During the Rab operation, Abdullah alias Meer Akrabul Karim was killed along with his two wives, 53-year-old and 47-year-old.
