UNFIT BUSES 66 cases filed on first day of DSCC drive

Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) yesterday filed 66 cases against drivers and imposed a fine of around Tk 1.27 lakh on the first day of a month-long drive against unfit buses.

Three mobile courts in association with Bangladesh Road Transport Authority and Dhaka Metropolitan Police carried out the drives in Golap Shah Mazar, Motijheel City Centre and Khilgaon Khidmah Hospital areas.

They also sent two unfit old buses to dumping stations and seized papers of 14 buses, said a DSCC official.

The crackdown was launched following a recent meeting between 26 service providing organisations and DSCC Mayor Sayeed Khokon.

The penalties were imposed as many of the drivers did not have licenses or were aged below 18. Some of the buses were also parked illegally while others had unauthorised additional seats installed, he added.

Old, unfit buses are increasing the risk of accidents and adding to traffic congestion, he said.

Noakhali univ student loses life in road accident

A brilliant student of Noakhali Science and Technology University died as a pickup hit her on Sonapur road in Takkar area of Noakhali yesterday.

Fauzia Moslem of pharmacy stood first in every academic examination, said the university students.

Witnesses said after taking class, Fauzia, a final year student and a daughter of Moslem Uddin, was returning home in West Shahapur village by an auto-rickshaw.

When the vehicle reached Takkar area, a CNG-run auto-rickshaw rammed it from behind, leading Fauzia to fall on the road.

Immediately, the pickup fatally ran her over.

She was declared dead at Noakhali General Hospital.

Our Jhenidah correspondent reports, a college student was killed as a bus hit him from behind while he was returning home from Barobazar by riding a motorbike on Jhenidah-Jessore road in Baishakhi intersection area of Kaliganj upazila on Saturday night.

Pranto Saha, 20, son of Prokas Saha, was a student of BMCC college in Jessore.

Our Chittagong correspondent reports, Bahadur Karigor, 40, a rickshaw-van puller, was killed as a truck hit him in the city's Bayezid area yesterday.

A Bagerhat correspondent adds, Akkas Fakir, 36, a driver of a Nosimon, was killed as a bus hit his vehicle on Bagerhat-Khulna highway in Bagerhat Sadar upazila yesterday.

Of dead and dying dighis

Once Sylhet city was known for its dighis (large ponds) -- flowing uninterrupted under the open sky without any fear of encroachment or pollution.

But over the years, most of these vital organs have fallen victim to urban sprawl. Now, they either exist in papers or as a name of an area. Meanwhile, the existing ones are struggling to survive due to a lack of care.

The centuries-old ponds Ramer Dighi and Machu Dighi are long gone but the areas -- Ramer Dighir Par and Machu Dighir Par -- still bear the names of the reservoirs.

The ponds were owned by the family of one Bimalendu Das alias Sadhu Babu, an influential landlord.

The around 10-acre Machu Dighi was situated in the greater Taltola area. It was sold to a businessman whose family eventually filled it up completely by 2000.

On the other hand, Ramer Dighi (around 10 acres) was sold to a contractor. It was filled up by 2010.

Locals with the help of rights organisations tried to put up a resistance but to no avail as the authorities concerned continued to turn a blind eye when it came to saving the water bodies, they alleged.

The family of Sadhu Babu had another pond, Sadhu Babur Dighi. The around 2-acre reservoir was sold in the 80s and was replaced by concrete structures.

Not just these three, many other dighis in Sylhet city had suffered the same fate.

If anyone visits Bara Bazar in Amberkhana area, she or he would be surprised to learn that the urban maze there used to be a huge pond. According to historians, the around 20-acre Rajar Mar Dighi (King's mother's pond) was named after King Gour Govinda's mother and was dug up around eighth century.

But over the years, the reservoir was filled up and buildings were erected upon it. Now all that remains is a small ditch filled with garbage.

Besides, Chhara Dighi at Chhara Dighir Par, Janur Dighi in Zindabazar, Lal Dighi at Lal Dighir Par, Beka Dighi near Lal Dighi,

Sagar Dighi at Sagar Dighir Par and many other ponds in the city only exist in history books or as sign boards.

Meanwhile, due to unabated encroachment and dumping of waste, the reservoirs such as Dhopadighi at Dhopadighir par, Dastidar Bari Dighi at Subidbazar, Lala Dighi at Laladighir Par, Majumdar Bari Dighi at Majumdar Bari, Murari Chand Dighi inside Murari Chand College and Kajal Dighi at Niorpul are now struggling to survive.

A survey on the wetlands of Sylhet city

was carried out from 2007 to 2008 by the department of civil engineering and environmental science of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology as per request of the Sylhet City Corporation (SCC).

Prof Jahir Bin Alam of the department told The Daily Star that according to the survey, Sylhet city has lost most of its ponds at an alarming rate, and prompt action is needed to save the existing ones.

"We also recommended the corporation to take strict measures against the grabbers and re-excavate the dying ponds,

but to no avail," he said.

Mohammad Ashraful Kabir, coordinator of Bhumi Sontan Bangladesh, a rights organisation, said, "Once our city used to be adorned with dighis. Most of those are lost to urbanisation and the remaining ones are in death throes."

Abdul Karim Kim, general secretary of Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa) Sylhet chapter, said dighis are necessary to mitigate waterlogging crisis in an area and also useful during fire incidents. It is also beneficial for the environment.

nator of Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers' Association (Bela), Sylhet division, said the association has been working to save the ponds for years.

"We recently filed a writ petition to protect the Majumdar Bari Dighi from encroachment and pollution. What we need is a concerted effort to save the water bodies."

When asked, Enamul Habib, chief executive officer of SCC, said, "To save the water bodies, we will initiate an awareness campaign soon as the responsibility lies

with all to save the dighis."

Contacted, Ariful Haque Chowdhury, SCC mayor, said the city has already lost many of its dighis. "We have to protect the remaining ones."

"We have plans to save all the existing ponds from encroachment and pollution."

According to SCC, in August this year, the corporation undertook a project to beautify Dhopa Dighi by constructing a floating restaurant on and a walkway around it.

The journalists are Ziaul Gani Salim, Rajshahi correspondent of SA TV, and Abu Sayeed, cameraperson; and Hasan Adib, RU correspondent of the daily Jugantor. The reports were aired and published on November 9 and 10 respectively.

On Thursday, RU BCL vice-president Robiul Alam Milton and organising secretary Tahmid Tanmoy filed the cases with Rajshahi metropolitan magistrate's court. They said the reports defamed them by mentioning their names, and those were biased and false.

The journalists, however, said they have evidence of the duo's involvement, and the cases were filed to harass them.

'Robber' killed in 'gunfight' with Rab

A "top robber" enlisted by the home ministry was killed in a "gunfight" between his cohorts and Rapid Action Battalion in Cox's Bazar yesterday.

The elite force also claimed to have recovered 44 firearms and a huge cache of ammunition during the operation in Maheshkhali upazila.

Deceased Mokarram Hossain alias Jambu, 38, led local gang "Jambu Bahini", said Rab. He lived in the upazila's Kutubjom union.

Maj Ruhul Amin, commander of Rab-7 in Cox's Bazar camp, said Mokarram was accused in 12 criminal cases including murder, rape, robbery, abduction and extortion.

Maj Amin claimed that they were tipped off that a gang was preparing to conduct a robbery in the sea. For this they took position with firearms in Kutubjom. Sensing their presence, the gang opened fire on them, and the force retaliated in self-defence, he claimed.

After a 30-minute encounter, the gang fled and the criminal was found bullet-hit. He was declared dead in a local hospital, he said.

Sufia Kamal's anniversary of death today

The 18th death anniversary of Poet Sufia Kamal, founding president of Bangladesh Mahila Parishad and a pioneer of Bangalee women's emancipation will be observed today.

Social and cultural organisations have chalked out various programmes marking the day. Bangabandhu Sangskritik Jote along with noted cultural personalities will pay tributes to the poet by placing floral wreaths at her grave at Azimpur Graveyard.

A memorial meeting will be organised by Social Protection Committee, a platform of 72 social organisations, will be held at Bangladesh Mahila Parishad at 3:00pm.

Sufia Kamal was also instrumental in naming the first women's dormitory of Dhaka University as Rokeya Hall. During the Liberation War, she worked for helping women hurt during the war and campaigned for bringing to justice Pakistani war criminals.

Born on June 20, 1911, Sufia Kamal was awarded the Bangla Academy Award for Literature (1962), Lenin Centenary Jubilee Medal (1970) from the Soviet Union, Ekushey Padak (1976), Czechoslovakia Medal (1986), Jatiya Kabita Parishad Award (1995), Begum Rokeya Medal (1996), Deshbandhu CR Das Gold Medal (1996) and Independence Award (1997) for her works.

Poet Sufia Kamal died on November 20, 1999.
