SONARGAON CROSSING

Where traffic law is broken every moment

Police have put up signs warning buses of punishment for stopping near the roundabout at Sonargaon intersection in the capital's Kawan Bazar.

In what appears to be an attempt to deter unheeding drivers, a tow truck of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) is kept nearby.

Yet when The Daily Star videographers went to the spot on Sunday at 4:00pm and filmed the particular spot on Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue for 20 minutes, as many as 108 buses stopped right in front of the police signs, taking up a large portion of one of the busiest intersections.

At least five traffic policemen were present there. But the promised punishment was not being delivered.

Vehicles approaching the roundabout from Panthapath were forced to stop or slow down while the buses picked up and dropped off passengers. The place designated to do that remained empty only about a hundred metres away.

The Daily Star teams visited the spot on three days and

He left behind his wife, two sons and one daughter,

Defiant Mugabe vows to stay on

Gives televised speech after being replaced by his sacked VP Mnangagwa; he was asked to step down as president of Zimbabwe

Zimbabwean President Robert Mugabe, in a much-expected TV address yesterday, stressed he was still in power after his authoritarian 37-year reign was rocked by a military takeover.

"The (ruling ZANU-PF) party congress is due in a few weeks and I will preside over its processes," Mugabe said, pitching the country into further uncertainty.

Many Zimbabweans expected Mugabe to resign after the army seized power last week.

But Mugabe delivered his speech alongside the uniformed generals who were behind the military intervention.

In his address, Mugabe made no reference to the clamour for him to resign.

Instead he paid tribute to three pillars of power in Zimbabwe -- the military, the ruling party and the war veterans movement -- and urged national solidarity.

"Whatever the pros and cons of how they (the army) went about their operation, I, as commander-in-chief, do acknowledge their concerns," said Mugabe.

"We must learn to forgive and resolve contradictions real or perceived in a comradely Zimbabwean spirit," he said.

His address provoked immediate anger.

"That speech has nothing to do with realities. We will go for impeachment and we are calling people back to the streets," Chris Mutsvangwa, head of the influential war veterans' association, told AFP.

Ex-husband, cohorts 'rape' woman

A woman was allegedly abducted and gang-raped by her former husband and his accomplices in Laxmipur's Kamalnagar Upazila night.

Victim's mother on Saturday night filed a case against her daughter's ex-husband Abu Kalam, 35, and his two accomplices with Kamalnagar Police Station under the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act.

In the case statement, she said Kalam married her daughter around 10 years ago. Since then, Kalam had been demanding dowry from her family and they gave him money on different occasions. As they refused to give him more money last year, he beat up her daughter severely. Around five months ago, her daughter divorced Kalam, she added.

Kalam along with his two aides kidnapped her daughter from Torabganj on Friday evening and raped her. They cut off her daughter's hair and she was also beaten up, the woman added.

Police arrested one of the accused Babul

Own a dog for good health

A massive scientific study shows having a dog could mean you have a lower risk of dying from cardiovascular disease, the world's leading cause of death.

That's good news for dog lovers, especially if they fit into the 30 million Americans who found out this week they have hypertension after federal guidelines changed.

The research, published Friday in the journal Scientific Reports, claims to be "by far the largest investigation" into the links between dog ownership and health. The researchers used data from nearly 3.5 million Swedish people between the ages of 40 and 80 to compile their findings.

AVIJIT MURDER
Suspect gives confessional statement

A suspect in blogger Avijit Roy murder case yesterday confessed before a Dhaka court that he was among four Ansar Al Islam operatives who did a recce of the killing spot near TSC of Dhaka University five to six days before the murder.

Mozammel Hossain alias Saimon, in his confessional statement, said four more operatives of the banned militant outfit took part in the killing mission, a source in the court said.

The court of Metropolitan Magistrate Ahsan Habib recorded the version of his statement after he agreed to confess to his crime, said court sources.

Mozammel was arrested from Baunia embankment area of Turag in the capital on Saturday afternoon, said Masudur Rahman, deputy commissioner (media) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP).

Small school, big hope

Six Ctg youths running school for underprivileged children

Charulata Bidyapith, a school initiated by six youths studying at different educational institutions in Chittagong, gives a ray of hope for underprivileged children to get an education.

Domestic help Minara Begum and her day labourer husband Nagor Shikder are now happy as their two daughters, Nupur Akther and Jumur Akther, and their son Mohammad Shahadat are getting quality education.

"We cannot afford to send our children to such a school that offers students standard education. We all are really thankful to them [the founders]," said Minara.

In the mornings, Nupur, 13, and her younger sister Jumur, 11, work at a Fish Processing Factory in Gate-2 area in Chittagong city, on a temporary basis and in afternoons, they go to Charulata Bidyapith, where classes begin at 2:00pm and continue till 5:00pm.

The school, situated in Gate-2 area of Tulatali, started its journey around six years ago with the aim of providing quality education to underprivileged children.

Currently, 120 children are getting free education from the school, enrolled from nursery till class five.

Students from renowned universities and colleges in Chittagong conduct the classes.

Besides, the school provides students study materials free of cost, and the students are served quality food on special occasions.

Students also get new clothes and shoes during Eid and Durga Puja.
