Berizzo's emotional dose of inspiration

Sevilla staged an incredible comeback against Liverpool, reminiscent of the famous 'Miracle of Istanbul' in their Champions League match at the Ramon Sanchez Pizjuan Stadium in Seville yesterday.

Three goals down heading into halftime on the back of a Roberto Firmino brace and a Sadio Mane goal, Sevilla came out with renewed vigour in the second half, which culminated in Guido Pizarro smashing home a stoppage-time equaliser and sending the crowd into frenzy.

The players immediately rushed to the sidelines in a storm of celebration and engulfed coach Eduardo Berizzo, who Sevilla confirmed after the match had been diagnosed with prostate cancer.

And although Berizzo made no statement on his health while speaking to reporters after the match, at a time when the news had not yet broken, local media reported that the coach disclosed the information to his players at half-time in a bid to fire them up for the ensuing 45 minutes.

The 48-year-old's uniquely emotional dose of inspiration worked wonders, with the players giving their

all for their beloved coach and playing their hearts out to deliver a memorable result for the Argentine, with the Albiceleste's Ever Banega saying that they had come out in the second half to play for 'the boss'.

"We had to come out with a different attitude for the fans and for the boss; he made us play like that," said Banega. "He turned the situation around in the second-half."

Spanish football has also rallied round Berizzo with numerous clubs, including his former side Celta, sending their support.

"All our strength and support for Berizzo," the Galicians posted on Twitter.

"Be strong boss, you are in the best place in the world to not give in because there they never give up," said Sevilla's legendary former sporting director Monchi.

A former centre-back for River Plate, Marseille and Celta Vigo among others, Berizzo is in his first season as Sevilla boss after three successful years in charge of Celta.

It remains to be seen whether Berizzo will need to take time away from his duties as coach to concentrate on his treatment, but even if he does step away, this result will mean more to him than anything else the players could have possibly done.

Shot clock and 16 seeds in new rules

Tennis chiefs have agreed to reduce the number of seeds in the four Grand Slam tournaments from 32 to 16 as part of a raft of rule changes aimed at widening the sport's appeal.

From 2019, Wimbledon and the Australian, French and US Opens will have only 16 seeded players in the men's and women's draws.

Halving the number of seeds is an attempt to make the early rounds of the majors more interesting as it will open the possibility of higher-ranked players facing off before the last 16.

There were 16 seeds at Grand Slams until after Wimbledon in 2001, when the US Open asked for 32 in the hope that stars would still be in contention in the closing rounds.

The Grand Slam Board meeting in London also approved the Australian Open's request to implement a 25-second "serve/shot clock" system in line with the scheme trialled at the 2017 US Open to speed up play.

The board has also moved to tackle the problem of play-

ers withdrawing from or purposefully lacking effort in first-round matches and still getting their full prize money.

Grand Slams will now give the injured who pull out on site before their opening match 50 per cent of the first-round prize money, with the other 50 per cent going to the "lucky loser" who replaces them.

HAWK-EYE REPLACING LINE JUDGES IN ADELAIDE

Adelaide's World Tennis Challenge will be the first professional tennis event to totally rely on Hawk-Eye Live camera technology -- bumping line umpires from the court.

It means the players' right of challenging line calls will be scrapped and all computer ball tracking decisions will stand.

The technology was trialled at the Next Gen ATP Finals in Milan earlier this month -- where the eight best young players of 2017 competed -- and the chair umpire was left as the sole official on the court.

Hawk-Eye Live will be used on all lines throughout every point at the WTC and when triggered it will generate an automated "Out" call.

Postecoglou leaves Socceroos

An emotional Ange Postecoglou quit as Australia coach Wednesday, just days after guiding the team to a World Cup spot and leaving them only months to find a replacement for the tournament in Russia.

The 52-year-old Australian did not reveal the reason behind his decision, which had been widely expected after he repeatedly refused to deny reports he was about to step down.

His departure, at the end of a five-year contract, leaves the Asian champions in turmoil ahead of the June-July World Cup, where they will hope to improve on their three straight defeats in 2014.

Postecoglou gave no details about his future plans, beyond saying he hoped to coach a club overseas. But he said he felt it was "the right time" to leave.

"After a great deal of thought and soul-searching, I've decided that the journey for me ends as Socceroos coach," he told a press conference in Sydney.

"It's been the biggest privilege of my life and probably not the ending I had envisaged when we started, but at the same time, knowing it's the right time for me and the right decision."

Postecoglou brushed aside questions about whether he had been affected by media criticism, and denied any conflict with Football Federation Australia.

Real back on song

Cristiano Ronaldo scored twice as holders Real Madrid thrashed APOEL 6-0 to reach the Champions League last 16 on Tuesday.

Zinedine Zidane's Real bounced back from their 3-1 loss at Tottenham Hotspur last time out by crushing APOEL, with four of the goals coming before half-time.

"It was a very good evening for us," said Zidane. "We're on the right track."

Karim Benzema put worries about his recent form to bed with a double either side of a Nacho effort, before Ronaldo got in on the act after the break.

SPURS BOOT OUT DORTMUND

Tottenham Hotspur striker Harry Kane hailed his side's "massive" achievement of winning their Champions League group after defeating Borussia Dortmund 2-1.

Spurs clinched top spot in Group H and consigned holders Real Madrid to second place in the group with a game left. Dortmund, with two points from five

games, are tied with APOEL and they will be fighting for a spot in the Europa League.

The result also means that one unlucky team who finish top of their group will have to face reigning European Champions Real in the next round.

Pep targets milestone

Pep Guardiola set Manchester City the target of becoming the first English club to win all six of their Champions League group matches after they secured top spot in Group F.

Raheem Sterling struck in the 88th minute to give City a 1-0 win over Feyenoord on Tuesday, which -- allied to Shakhtar Donetsk's 3-0 loss at Napoli -- guaranteed City first place in the group.

Guardiola now wants his team to finish the job by winning away to Shakhtar on December 6 and is mindful that the Ukrainian club are still vying with Napoli for the one remaining last 16 berth.

"We respect the competition. We respect Shakhtar and we respect Napoli," Guardiola said. "We play to win the games and after we will see how we finish. We have one game left and we're going to see what happens."

"The important thing is 15 points. We are now going to finish good in Shakhtar and win the game. The draw, we'll see. Last 16, it doesn't matter which one. Always will be complicated."

Only six teams have previously won all six of their group games: AC Milan in 1992, Paris Saint-Germain in 1994, Spartak Moscow in 1995, Barcelona in 2002 and Real Madrid in 2011 and 2014.

The result means Feyenoord cannot rescue even the consolation prize of a berth in the Europa League.
