



Airtel, which recently merged with Robi, deactivated 3.70 lakh SIM cards, the second highest.

Its 4,616 SIM cards were deactivated through the joint operations, 3,130 through the detection system and 362,688 through the operator's self-regulation process.

Market leader Grameenphone's 3.31 lakh SIMs were deactivated and of them, 3.28 lakh connections were blocked under its self-regulation process.

Robi deactivated 3.13 lakh SIM cards in 2016-17, up from 2.51 lakh the previous year.

In the last two years, Banglalink established a cleaner image. Some 24,777 of its SIMs were found being used in running illegal activities in 2016-17, down from 86,981 a year ago.

Citycell's 27 SIM cards were deactivated last fiscal year, showed the BTRC report.

In the last few years, the telecom watchdog deactivated over 2.5 crore SIMs. A senior executive of a mobile operator said they paid a few hundred crore takas in taxes against all these SIMs.

He said connections being used in running illegal businesses hurt the operators' incomes. So the operators themselves have been deactivating SIMs in the last few years, he said.

## ADP spending goes up 40pc

On the other hand, some ministries and divisions that have been implementing a number of mega projects saw their implementation rate progressing at a single digit.

One of them is the bridges division, which is implementing a number of mega projects including the Padma bridge. But the division could spend only 7.13 percent of the allocation it received in the July-November period.

The division's biggest project is the Padma bridge one, which got Tk 5,524 crore for the current fiscal year. But only Tk 342 crore was spent in the first four months. The total cost of the priority project is Tk 28,793 crore, of which 49 percent has been spent till November ast year.

The railways ministry also imple- percent of the total allocation. mented only 9.63 percent in first five months against an allocation of over Tk Russian contractor has prepared a 12,000 crore. Of the allocation, Tk 7,000 crore has been allocated for the Padma rail link project.

An official of the ministry said China Exim Bank would finance the Padma rail link project. But as the loan agreement has not been signed between the railway ministry and the Chinese Exim Bank, the work is not progressing at the desired rate.

The budget set aside Tk 10,502 crore for the science and technology ministry in the current fiscal year, with a majority of the fund going to the Rooppur nuclear power plant project. In the first five months, the ministry

spent only Tk 527 crore, which was 5

A finance ministry official said the schedule for construction work of the power plant and the work is going on as per the schedule.

"So, the progress of the construction work seems slow now but at the end of the fiscal year the implementation rate will improve," he said.

# Revenue rises 18pc in Jul-Nov

Earnings from VAT, the biggest source of revenue for the NBR, rose 16 percent year-on-year to Tk 29,054 crore in the five months to November.

Income tax receipts grew 16 percent to Tk 21,645 crore in the period, up from Tk 18,724 crore in the same period a year ago.

The NBR official said field-level data

reflects that revenue receipts would grow about 20 percent in July-December.

Towfigul Islam Khan, research fellow of the Centre for Policy Dialogue, said the NBR's statistics showed that higher revenue collection in FY2018 has been driven by high import growth.

Income tax collection, on the other hand, is found to be less than expected, particularly in view of improvements in

the number of taxpayers, he said. Khan said it is critical for the NBR to

be vigilant against tax evasion arising from trade.

Besides, in the wake of the deferment of the VAT and Supplementary Duty Act 2012, the NBR should emphasise settlement of disputed revenue claims in order to reduce the potential revenue shortfall, he said.

#### Siemens to gauge interest of state funds in Healthineers IPO

Siemens will test the appetite of sovereign wealth funds ahead of the planned listing of its healthcare unit Healthineers next year, its chief executive told a German weekly, possibly to secure anchor investors for the flotation.

The listing of a minority of the unit, which makes X-ray and MRI machines, is set to take place in the first half of 2018 and is expected to value Healthineers as a whole at around 40 billion euros (\$48 billion).

Siemens is expected to sell 15-25 percent of Healthineers, sources have said, implying stock worth 6-10 billion euros could be sold -Germany's biggest share offering since Deutsche Telekom in 1996.

# Remittance slumps to six-year low

Ahmed said the latest volatile situation in the banking sector eroded the clients' confidence that left an adverse impact on the banks' deposit mobilisation, including remittance inflow.

Migrant workers sent their hard-earned money to their near and dear ones through the illegal channel to get higher rates than those offered by banks, he said. "The export of human resources has recently increased but the majority of workers are unskilled. So, it is not bringing any good outcome."

MA Halim Chowdhury, managing director of Pubali Bank, said the income of many expatriate Bangladeshis decreased recently, which hit remittance flow adversely.

He said the central bank has strengthened its surveillance over cross-border financial transaction through hundi, giving a boost to remittance income. Syed Mahbubur Rahman, managing direc-

tor of Dhaka Bank, said the increased trend in

remittance would continue in the coming months if the exciting exchange rate prevails.

The central bank should continue its monitoring of hundi in the best interest of remittance flow, he said.

Remittance is a major source of foreign

remittance to relatives of expatriate Bangladeshis through mobile services, which have resulted in a fall in the amount of money sent through banking channels, said the Bangladesh Institute of Bank Management in a report in December.

In November, an inter-ministerial committee came up with 18 proposals to boost remittance flow through formal channel and ward off the rising menace of digital hundi. Remittance income stood at \$1.16 billion

in December, posting 21.74 percent year-onyear growth.
