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# A puzzling punishment

Man, already in police custody, given jail sentence by mobile court; HC summons UNO, four cops

In a blatant violation of the law, a man has been punished by a mobile court when he was in police custody, and the High Court has summoned the executive magistrate and the police officials involved to explain why.

Victim Belal Uddin, 35, was arrested by Lohagara police in Chittagong on October 13 last year in a criminal case and was produced before a trial court in the port city on October 14, said Belal's counsel Manzill Murshid.

The same day, Belal was sentenced by a mobile court to eight months in prison for smoking and possessing some cannabis, he said, terming it illegal and unconstitutional.

The mobile court was conducted by Lohagara Upazila Nirbahi Officer Md Mahbub Alam, also an executive magistrate.

It was not clear if the mobile court was conducted before or after Belal was taken to the trial court, which ordered the police to send him to jail.

Following a writ petition by Belal, the HC bench of Justice Syed Muhammad Dastagir Husain and Justice Md Ataur Rahman Khan ordered the UNO and the police officials concerned to appear before it on January 28. The bench also issued a rule asking the respondents to

explain why Belal's jail sentence should not be scrapped and why legal action should not be taken against those involved in his sentencing.

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### They will get MPO but on conditions

Says Muhith about new institutions

The government will soon bring new private educational institutions under its Monthly Pay Order facility but with some conditions, said Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday.

A meeting will be held this month to discuss the MPO enlistment, he told reporters in reply to a query at his ministry.

The minister, however, termed the ongoing movement of a section of school and college teachers of MPO-enlisted institutions over nationalisation of private education as "bogus", saying they will not accept their demand as the government follows a policy to nationalise institutions.

Several hundred teachers of non-MPO secondary educational institutions from across the country started a six-day hunger strike in front of the Jatiya Press Club on December 26 demanding MPO benefits. They called off the programme following Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's assurance that the demand would be met.

Yesterday, the finance minister said the MPO enlistment stalled as the education ministry never took any step to reform the existing MPO policy, despite his suggestions and insistence.

"The MPO-enlistment is a bad policy. I wanted it reformed, but [that] did not taken place. That is why I stalled giving MPO [enlisting new institutions under MPO scheme]. This time we'll have to give MPO and I will give it with conditions," Muhith said.

Explaining the conditions, he said a certain percentage of the money will be earmarked for the development of infrastructure, adding, "I will earmark a certain percentage for purchasing necessary materials."

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### Joint Working Group meets in Naypyitaw

'Physical arrangement' for Rohingya repatriation likely

The Joint Working Group, responsible for overseeing the repatriation of the Rohingya refugees from Bangladesh, meets in Naypyitaw today amid doubts over safe return and resettlement of the Rohingyas in Rakhine.

A 14-member delegation of Bangladesh, led by Foreign Secretary Shahidul Haque, will meet the Myanmar team led by Permanent Secretary at Myanmar foreign ministry Myint Thu.

Bangladesh and Myanmar are likely to finalise an agreement on the "physical arrangement" to begin the repatriation.

There are 30 officials in the JWG, 15 from each country. This is the first meeting of the JWG since its formation on December 19.

The group was formed following a deal signed between the two countries on November 23, amid global outcry over

# Baby Milk Scare Bangladesh among 83 affected countries

A salmonella scandal at French dairy group Lactalis has affected 83 countries, including Bangladesh, according to reports of agencies.

Twelve million boxes of powdered baby milk are being recalled from these countries, the company's CEO said yesterday in an interview with French media, reports AFP.

Emmanuel Besnier, scion of the secretive family behind one of the world's biggest dairy groups, was speaking publicly for the first time since an outcry erupted over claims the company hid the salmonella outbreak at a plant making the product.

#### Ebtedai madrasa teachers want PM's assurance

Ebtedai madrasa teachers, who are on a hunger strike unto death, rejected education minister's call to end their demonstration yesterday and said they would go on until the prime minister assured them of meeting their demand.

They want nationalisation of all registered madrasas.

The teachers met Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid twice. Nahid asked them to return to their homes calling off

twice. Nahid asked them to return to their homes calling off the strike and assured them that their demand would be placed before the prime minister and the finance minister. "He [Nahid] told us to withdraw our strike but did not make any promise. It was nothing but a farce," said Qazi

Ruhul Amin Chowdhury, president of Bangladesh Swatantra Ebtedai Madrasa Shikkhak Samity, the organisation leading the movement. "We don't expect such words from him. We want a specific announcement from the prime minister." he told The

cific announcement from the prime minister," he told The Daily Star.

Ruhul Amin said they did not get any salary from the

government for decades.

"We don't have any other option but to continue our agitation," he said.

Yesterday, the education ministry had a meeting around 12:30pm at its technical and madrasa division's office room to discuss the issue. State Minister Quazi Keramat Ali was also present.

The meeting decided that the matter would soon be moved to the prime minister and the finance minister.

The president and general secretary of the samity were called in and informed of the meeting decision.

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
