#### **HC** halts DNCC mayoral by-polls

AL, BNP trade blame after 3-month stay order

STAFF CORRESPONDENT The High Court's three-

month stay on the process of Dhaka North City triggered a blame game between the Awami League and the BNP.

The voting was scheduled to take place on February 26.

The BNP held the AL and the Election Commission responsible for the situation while the ruling party claimed that the BNP was "guilty of the same crime".

The HC also questioned the legality of the schedule of the DNCC mayoral bypolls and the elections to 18 new wards under the city corporation on February 26. Besides, it issued two rules asking the authorities concerned of the EC and the government to explain in four weeks why the schedule should not be declared illegal.

## LGRD ministry holds the key

A move by the ministry could remove legal complexities

: It appears the mayoral by-polls to the DNCC have become uncertain following yesterday's High Court stay order. But Corporation polls yesterday · the legal complexity can be removed and the LGRD ministry holds the key.

> Newly added wards, the root cause for the polls process · to grind to a halt, could be excluded from the Dhaka North : City Corporation for the time being so that the elections could be held.

This will not be something new.

Sixteen years ago, the LGRD ministry swiftly removed all legal complexities over redrawn boundaries of three city corporations, including Dhaka, clearing the way for the polls.

The same ministry in 1998 increased the number of wards in Dhaka, Rajshahi and Khulna city corporations. In September 1998, the Election Commission redrew the boundaries of the wards issuing a gazette notification and : moved for holding the polls.


But it faced legal hurdles. At least 10 writ petitions were filed challenging the new boundaries, five of the petitions were filed in Dhaka.

In response to those petitions, the HC stayed all work related to the elections and the stay order was extended several times. As a result, the polls to the three city corporations could not be held on time. The first elections in the three corporations were held in

January 1994 when the BNP was in power. Fresh elections were supposed to be held in 1999 when the Awami League was in power. Assuming office on October 10, 2001, the BNP moved to

### Minimum age now only 12.5 years!

The liberation war affairs ministry has once again lowered the minimum age for being recognised as a freedom fighter.

The ministry yesterday issued a gazette notification fixing the minimum age at 12and-a-half years, down from 13, to be eligible for earning the status of a freedom fighter.

Under the revised age limit, people who were aged at least 12-and-a-half years on November 30, 1971 will be eligible for applying for the status.

The decision to reduce the age limit was made at the 50th meeting of Jatiya Muktijoddha Council (JMC) on October 19 last year. This is the third time the minimum age limit has been revised.

Sources said Liberation War Affairs Minister AKM Mozammel Huq at the meeting opposed the proposal of lowering the age limit, but the decision was reached under pressure from an influential minister and a former Awami League state minister.

# They tried to kill me

Mayor Ivy says about Tuesday's attack on her; will take legal steps against those responsible

Narayanganj city Mayor Selina Hayat Ivy yesterday alleged that an attempt was made to kill her from just "two yards away" during Tuesday's mayhem on Bangabandhu Road in Chashara.

"I will take legal steps... 100 to 150 people were wounded. I suffered injuries in my leg. I was unarmed and so were my people," she told reporters at her Nagar Bhaban office.

The mayor was briefing journalists a day after supporters of local Awami League lawmaker Shamim Osman allegedly attacked Ivy and her followers over eviction of street hawkers, leading to a fierce clash. Ivy

and around 50 others were injured.

Meanwhile, Awami League General Secretary Obaidul Quader said the party high command summoned Ivy and Osman for explanation over Tuesday's incident.

Giving an account of the incident, Ivy said she did not go there to fight, rather she wanted to tell hawkers to clear the street and sell goods at the hawkers' market built by the city corporation.

"We walked down the footpath to the press club to hold a press conference there. But we came under attack before we could reach there. Brickbats started raining down on us. An attempt was made to kill me SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

#### TK 137CR MISAPPROPRIATION ACC sues ex-MD

The Anti-Corruption Commission yesterday filed a case against former managing director Kazi Fakhrul Islam of BASIC Bank Ltd and Managing Director Faisal Murad Ibrahim of Bay Navigations Ltd for misappropriating around Tk 137 crore.

Mohammad Sirajul Huq, assistant director of the ACC, filed the case with Motijheel Police Station, Pranab Kumar Bhattacharya, a spokesman for the ACC, told The Daily Star.

This is the 58th case filed related to BASIC Bank loan scams that took place between 2009 and 2014 when Sheikh Abdul Hye Bacchu had chaired the board of the state-owned bank.

According to the case statement, Faisal opened letters of credit worth \$95 lakh with the Dilkusha branch of BASIC Bank in November, 2011, to import a ship, MV Crystal

Sapphire. After getting the loan, the client failed to repay.

The bank then kept the imported ship as mortgaged property against the loan.

But according to an assessment in December 2016, the ship was estimated to be worth around Tk 20 to Tk 22 crore, much lower than the disbursed loan.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday told parliament a vested quarter has once again become active ahead of the next election and it wants to go to power through unconstitutional means.


"There is a section of people who are the real problem for the country and its people," she said responding to a supplementary question from opposition lawmaker Fakhrul Imam.
